A NEW INDUSTRY.

Jack Rabbits Bringing Money to Runnels County Folks.

Ballinger, Texas, Feb. 3.—A new industry has sprung up in West Texas in the traffic of rabbit pelts and furs. A Dallas firm represented here is paying high prices for the skins, in addition to the 5 cent bounty offered by the county. All this has resulted in many persons making a business of rabbit shooting. The fur is used in the manufacture of felt, while the meat is placed in cold storage, and later shipped to eastern markets. It is estimated that there are 1,000,000 rabbits in this county available for the new industry. A car load of rabbit meat was to be shipped from here tomorrow, while it is estimated that ten car loads will be shipped from this section within the next two weeks.

FOUR AUTOS PILE UP.

Double Auto Accident on Menard-Eden Road.

Saturday afternoon on the Eden road three and a half miles north of town, Bobbie Echardt in his big Pathfinder collided with W. M. Matthews of Eden, who was driving a big Buick. Shortly afterward Dr. Miller, driving a Ford car, ran into Ves Ford, who was driving his new Dort. All four drivers, it is understood, were driving at a rate of better than thirty miles an hour. The latter collision occurred within a hundred yards of the first one.

Mr. Echardt was coming to Menard after some medicine for his wife, who was very sick and in the car was Howard Crouch a boy of twelve. He was driving his big car, a Pathfinder, at what he acknowledged was better than thirty-five miles an hour. At the same time, Matthews, in his Buick, was returning home to Eden. With him were his two daughters and Mrs. Maggie Smith.

The two cars met in an open road just opposite the Joe Scholz ranch house. Bobbie turned to the right and, as the car tracks showed, was entirely out of the road. Just as the cars approached, Mr. Matthews seemed to lose control of his car and it turned to the left, meeting the Echardt car head on. Both cars were traveling at high speed and the collision threw one of the ladies and the girl clear over the other car. All parties were thrown from the wreck. Miss Lucille Matthews was seriously injured, as was Mr. Matthews. The former received an injury to the head from which she is slowly recovering. Mr. Matthews sprained his left hip, knee and ankle, besides badly lacerating the leg. Young Crouch was badly hurt, but will recover.

The Buick car was totally wrecked, pieces of the machinery and body being scattered all over the road. Mr. Echardt's car was badly smashed and it will cost him approximately four hundred dollars to repair it.

The second smashup occurred shortly after the first one. Dr. Miller was called to the scene of the accident and was driving his hardest. Just before reaching the wreck he overtook W. J. Jenkins and started to go around. Jenkins turned a little to give him room to go by, when Ford, coming from the other direction, and seeing plenty of room to the left of Jenkins, turned to pass him on that side.

Neither Miller nor Ford saw the other until too late Doc saw that it was impossible to avoid a collision, so he turned head on and hit the Dort in the side. Neither man was hurt, although the impact was terrific. Both cars were badly damaged. The Dort lost a door and a fender and had its innards badly thrown out of adjustment. The Ford suffered a bent axle, a

All progressive communities are now organizing their marketing associations, and everywhere they have been a wonderful success, opening new markets to the producer and bringing increased profits for products handled in such manner. There is no argument that can be offered against co-operative marketing. It is a success. The little town of Bangs is developing its berry industry along wonderfully profitable lines since the organization of its Berry Marketing association. Stephenville farmers are reaping increased profits from their co-operative marketing of hogs.

CITATION BY PUBLICATION.

The State of Texas, County of McCulloch—To the Sheriff or any Constable of McCulloch County, Greeting: You are hereby commanded to summon L. S. Shannon by making publication of this citation once in each week for four successive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in your county, to appear at the next regular term of the Justice Court of Precinct No. 1 of McCulloch County, to be holden at the court house thereof, in Brady, on the 6th day of March, A. D. 1916, then and there to answer this suit filed in said court on the 4th day of December, A. D. 1914, in a suit numbered on the docket of said court No. 1623, wherein James T. Mann and Duke Mann (who compose the firm of O. D. Mann & Sons) are plaintiffs, and L. S. Shannon and John Payne are defendants, the nature of the plaintiff's demands being in substance as follows: Suit upon a promissory note given by the defendant, L. S. Shannon, to O. D. Mann & Sons, dated April 4th, 1911, and due October 1st, 1911, for the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars, bearing interest at the rate of ten per cent per annum from date until paid, and providing for an attorney's fee of ten per cent on both principal and interest then due, in the event of default in payment of said note at maturity, and if placed in the hands of an attorney for collection, or if suit is brought thereon. Said note is long past due and there is still due and unpaid on said note a balance of ninety and 45-100 (\$90.45) dollars, and plaintiffs have placed said note in the hands of their attorney for collection, and this suit has been filed by said attorney for the purpose of collecting said note. And on the same day and date of giving said note the defendant, L. S. Shannon, in order to secure said O. D. Mann & Sons in the payment of said note, gave them his chattel mortgage lien upon the following described personal property, to-wit: A well machine, manufactured by the Rockford Iron Works and known as a combined single arm walking beam machine, with a 4 h. p. gasoline engine, auger stem, solid rope socket 6-inch club bit and drill rope, all purchased from O. D. Mann & Sons on the 4th day of April, 1911. A copy of said mortgage is filed herewith and made part hereof, and referred to for all purposes of this case.
