MAKE QUICK ARREST.

Man Arrested at Menard With Stolen San Antonio Auto.

Sheriff Wall was instrumental Sunday in securing the arrest of a man charged with theft of a big 7-passenger Packard touring car out of San Antonio, and the suspect is now in the Menard county jail awaiting the arrival of officers to carry him back to San Antonio.

Sheriff Wall Sunday received word over the phone from John W. Tobin, sheriff of Bexar county, that the Packard had been stolen in San Antonio, and the thief was supposed to be headed out this way. Tobin requested Wall to notify all sheriffs in adjoining counties to be on the lookout for the car and the thief. Fredericksburg reported the man having passed through that place inquiring the way to Brady and Menard, and stating that he was Menard bound, via Brady. Apparently the fugitive slipped through Mason unnoticed, as no report was had from him there, except from some men driving a car, who stated the Packard had passed them four miles beyond Mason and that it was traveling at a rate of about 40 miles an hour.

Sheriff Wall at once got in communication with neighboring sheriffs, and succeeding in communicating with Sheriff Spiller of Menard, who had just returned from his ranch. Late Sunday evening a man drove into Menard with the Packard, and inquired the way to some western point, stating he intended to drive straight through without stopping over night in Menard. About this time Sheriff Spiller walked up in his cowboy uniform and placed the stranger under arrest before he was aware that Spiller was an officer.

The man gave his name as J. M. McCabe, but no explanation of his actions or intentions has been learned. That the prisoner was prepared to resist arrest or at least ready for trouble, was evidenced by a double barreled shotgun which he carried in the car with him, and which was loaded to the muzzle.

WRESTLING MATCH.

Tony Bernard Secures Two Falls From Walter Klaerner.

The wrestling match proved a big drawing card last night, fully 200 people having witnessed the bout in the Syndicate building, the number including quite a crowd of ladies. As usual, the match was a clean, interesting exhibition of wrestling science, and the bout was thoroughly enjoyed by all in attendance.

Through a misunderstanding over the phone, the wrestlers were not evenly matched, Klaerner weighing in at 147 pounds, and Bernard at 163; consequently the latter had decidedly the advantage, and it was apparent from the start that the Fredericksburg man was outclassed. Dr. R. A. Lindley acted as referee of the bout.

Previous to the match, the wrestlers demonstrated the various holds and postures developed by both American and foreign champions.

Although Klaerner put up a good fight, and showed himself a decidedly clever as well as a game wrestler in his class, the preponderance in weight of his adversary forced him to be on the defensive throughout. The first fall was secured by Bernard in 33 minutes; the second in 13 minutes. Bernard announces having practically signed a match between himself and one of the best wrestlers in the country—a man who was defeated by Pet Brown only after one hour and forty-seven minutes wrestling. He hopes soon to be able to announce the date of the match.

CITATION BY PUBLICATION.

The State of Texas, County of McCulloch—To the Sheriff or any Constable of McCulloch County, Greeting: You are hereby commanded to summon L. S. Shannon by making publication of this citation once in each week for four successive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in your county, to appear at the next regular term of the Justice Court of Precinct No. 1 of McCulloch County, to be holden at the court house thereof, in Brady, on the 6th day of March, A. D. 1916, then and there to answer this suit filed in said court on the 4th day of December, A. D. 1914, in a suit numbered on the docket of said court No. 1623, wherein James T. Mann and Duke Mann who compose the firm of O. D. Mann & Sons are plaintiffs, and L. S. Shannon and John Payne are defendants, the nature of the plaintiff's demands being in substance as follows: Suit upon a promissory note given by the defendant, L. S. Shannon, to O. D. Mann & Sons, dated April 4th, 1911, and due October 1st, 1911, for the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars, bearing interest at the rate of ten per cent per annum from date until paid, and providing for an attorney's fee of ten per cent on both principal and interest then due, in the event of default in payment of said note at maturity, and if placed in the hands of an attorney for collection, or if suit is brought thereon.
