With the price of broom corn running about \$150 per ton, Mr. Embry sees great profits to be made by the growers of the corn, and he is in hopes that a good acreage may be planted in McCulloch county.

#### TO PUT IN MILLS.

##### Sheridan Mining Co. Ready to Begin Production at Burnet.

Paul Sheridan has been here the past day or two making report upon the work accomplished in the mine at Burnet, and conferring with local parties interested in the mine as to future activities. All the experimental work on the mine has been completed and the various shafts have penetrated veins of ore rich beyond the greatest expectation of the promoters.

It has been definitely decided to put in mills and begin the shipment of ore, and it is anticipated that a production of 200 tons per day may be easily accomplished. Should this be made possible it will mean an output aggregating a minimum figure of \$50,000 daily. The mine is especially rich in copper, with a good per cent of zinc and silver running through the ore, all of which may be produced profitably.

#### DIG GRAVE.

##### Mysterious Action of Campers Friday Arouses Suspicion.

The mysterious and inexplicable action of a party of folks on P. C. Dutton's north pasture, about 11 miles from Brady on the Santa Anna road, last Friday gave rise to suspicions of foal play, but to date no light has been thrown on the subject.

The party was first observed by a Mexican sheep herder in the vicinity of his camp. Supposing them to be Mexicans also he approached, but the sight of white folks armed with shot guns frightened him away. He reported the occurrence to Mr. Dutton, who phoned the local officers. Saturday morning Sheriff Wall, accompanied by Justice of the Peace T. J. King and Deputy Sheriff John Martin, went to the scene of the occurrence. There they found a newly-made grave upon the side of a hill, nicely mounded up and running due east and west. Stones at the head and foot marked the grave. Investigation, however, disclosed the fact that the grave was only about one and one-half feet in depth, where hard rock bottom was struck, and nothing was found in the grave.

The Mexican described the party as follows: Two women, one about 200 pounds in weight and the other smaller; two men, both of whom were armed with shot guns. One blue roan horse, one gray horse hitched to a hack with a black top and white curtains.

The sheriff's party tracked the hack to the Lohn road, within one mile of Lohn, where the conveyance turned northward, but diligent inquiry failed to reveal any further trace of the party or of whom it might be composed.

#### Chas. Hill at Sanitarium.

E. B. Bray of Waldrip Monday reported that Chas. Hill, who has been in the sanitarium at Temple the past two weeks or more, is still under the surgeon's care, and that 30 ounces of pus had been taken off his lung. Mr. Hill was shot about the middle of December by a negro intruder in his home at Waldrip. The bullet entered the right side below the arm pit, and an X-ray examination showed that it had passed through the right lung, had penetrated the point of the left lung, knocked off a particle of the vertebrae, and finally lodged in the muscles of the back on the right side. Mr. Hill at one time seemed to be improving nicely, and was able to sit up and get about a little. It is thought he caught cold, and suffered a set-back. His left leg has been paralyzed since the injury, although he retains the use of his left hand, as well as the rest of his body. The doctors are hopeful of curing the bullet wound, but are doubtful as to whether Mr. Hill will ever regain the use of his leg.

Chester Baze, accompanied by his grandmother, Mrs. J. P. Baze, left Sunday night for Fort Worth in response to a message announcing the condition of his father, Mayor A. C. Baze, as being critical. In fact, the doctors had virtually given Mr. Baze up, stating he could live only a few days. The news cast a gloom over the entire city. Mr. Baze has been suffering for several months with neuritis, which has baffled all efforts of experts to afford relief. The disease caused Mr. Baze to suffer from insomnia, and this further weakened his physical condition, and has rendered it more difficult to combat the disease.

Brady, Texas, Feb. 29, 1916.  
By the authority vested in me by Article 1099 of the Civil Ordinances of the City of Brady, Texas, an election is hereby ordered to be held on the first Tuesday in April, 1916, being the 4th day of said month, for the purpose of electing a Mayor, City Marshal, two (2) Aldermen, City Attorney, City Recorder and City Secretary for the City of Brady, Texas, who shall hold their office for a term of two years, and until their successors are duly elected and qualified.

Said election shall be held in the northwest corner room of the first floor of the court house. J. M. Duke, the regularly appointed presiding officer, shall hold said election and shall appoint two judges and two clerks to assist him in holding said election.

The election will be held in accordance with the general laws of the State of Texas and in accordance with the Ordinances of the City of Brady, Texas.

### BEE INDUSTRY. A Growing and Important McCulloch County Industry.

The raising of bees and the production and marketing of honey is receiving more attention each succeeding year in McCulloch county. The industry has proven highly profitable, and study of the care of the bees is receiving greater attention than before.

M. C. Stearns has been appointed county bee inspector, and he desires to call attention to the fact that now is the time to have your bees inspected in order to keep foul broods out. This inspection service is given without any charge whatever, and is solely in the interest of improving the bees and thereby increasing the production. The chief duty of the inspector is to discover disease, and not only prevent it from spreading but to stop it before it spreads.

McCulloch county is at present quarantined against diseased bees of other counties. In other words no diseased bees are permitted to be shipped into McCulloch county. In order to properly maintain the quarantine it must be made certain that all bees here are free from disease, and for this purpose the inspection is offered.

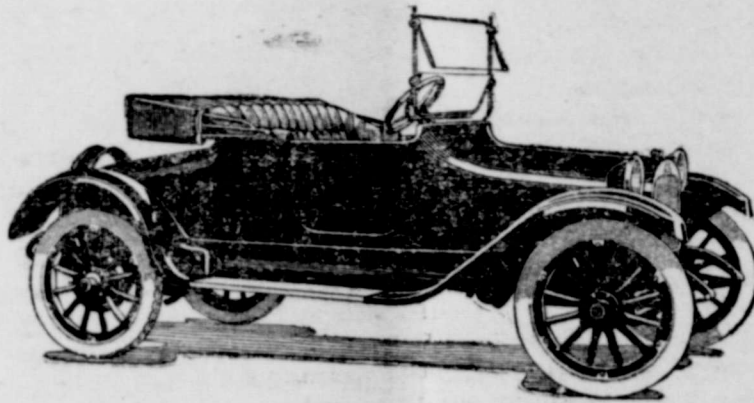
