HOME DESTROYED.
J. V. Chandler, 3 Miles West of Rochelle, Has Fire Loss.

Mr. and Mrs. J. V. Chandler have the sincere sympathy of all in the loss of their home, three miles west of Rochelle, by fire Thursday night of last week. Included in the loss were practically the entire contents, only three mattresses having been saved.

Just how the fire originated is a mystery, but Mr. Chandler thinks it likely that it originated from rats gnawing on matches. When he awoke at 9:30 p. m. the attic of the house was a mass of flames, and he barely had time to arouse his wife and six children to make their escape before the roof began falling in.

The house comprised six rooms, and the loss of it together with all the contents totaling about \$2500, is a severe blow, as Mr. Chandler carried only \$750 insurance on the building, and none on the contents.

The postoffice was also housed in the building, and it is very likely that the occurrence will be the subject of federal investigation.

Texas Boys Farm Better Than Their Fathers Do.

Dallas, Texas, March 4.—Seven thousand and twenty-eight Texas boys, in agricultural clubs, last year showed that they are better farmers than their fathers. Here is the record:

Corn boys, average yield per acre, 35.6 bushels; fathers, 24.7.
Sorghum boys, 43 bushels; fathers, 39.
Peanut boys, 58½ bushels; fathers, 49.

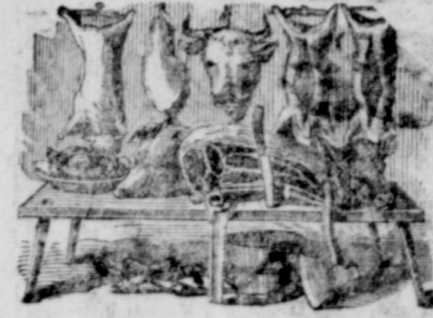

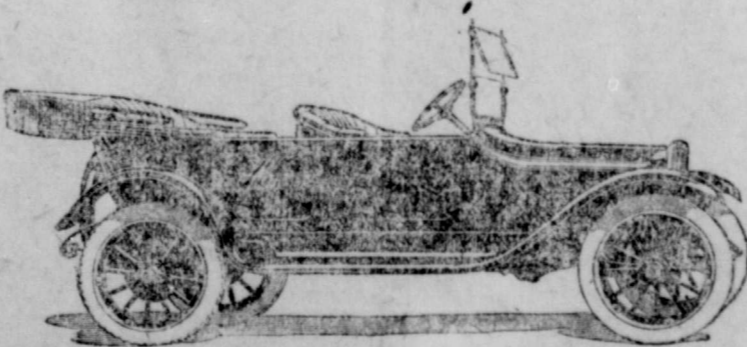
