TOP MARKET THIS WEEK AT FORT WORTH.

G. R. White Gets Fancy Price Monday and Again Wednesday—McCulloch Products.

G. R. White Monday was one of the top-notchers on the Fort Worth market with a carload of 3-year-old steers shipped from his ranch near Whiteland, and on Wednesday a second carload of 3-year-old steers, also from his Whiteland ranch, topped the market.

The first bunch Monday averaged 1283 pounds, and sold through the Cassidy-Southwestern Commission Co. at \$8.60. The second bunch Wednesday averaged 1181 pounds, and brought top price, \$8.75.

The steers were strictly McCulloch county products, having

been raised on the White ranch, and fed on ensilage and cotton seed meal and finished off with ground maize chops.

The record sales were a source of unconcealed satisfaction to Mr. White as well as to his many friends, and will act as an incentive to stock-raising in McCulloch county.

TO THE PEOPLE OF TEXAS

In the annual report of the Texas Railroad Commission for 1900, then presided over by that grand old commoner, John H. Reagan, after noticing the great increase in the amount that the Railroads of Texas had to pay in satisfaction of jury verdicts and Court Judgments for personal injuries, the report says:

"While we have no official information showing the cause of this great increase, we understand, in a general way, that it probably results in a large degree from the activities of regularly organized personal injury bureaus. The only direct interest which this Commission has in this question grows out of the fact that, as the amount of these payments are increased, the available revenues of the railroad companies are reduced thus necessarily operating, to that extent, to prevent the reduction of freight rates, or it might be, to cause an increase of them."

What Judge Reagan and his associates foresaw and warned against has actually happened. The Railroad Commission of Texas has increased freight rates. Not much yet; but it is hoped the increases will be sufficiently liberal to relieve the roads of their distressing necessities.

The Commission, after the most exhaus-

tive, patient, laborious and painstaking investigation ever before undertaken by a state rate-making body, in which hearing the Commission was assisted by able attorneys and experts, in no way connected with the railroads; and with the single purpose of learning the truth and doing their duty as sworn officials of your choosing, the Commissioners have found that the railroads are entitled to earn more revenue to enable them to pay their operating expenses and a fair return upon the value of the property devoted to public use.

It would not be fair to charge the entire increase to personal injury payments. Such payments had, however, a considerable influence in the way of increased expenses; but there are many other ways of unnecessarily increasing the expenses of the railroads. The legislature can, and in the past has done so. And every expense imposed or forced on the railroads by the legislature must be considered in fixing freight rates paid by the people, and mostly by the producers of the wealth of the state.

The last legislature was importuned, by selfish interests, to pass wholly unnecessary and expensive laws, such as the so-called "full crew bill" and others, that would, had they been enacted, have increased the expenses of the railroads of the state about

four million dollars per year. The legislature, however, refused to place this enormous expense on the shippers and producers of this state, and you justly owe your lawmakers a vote of thanks for thus protecting you. For if the legislature had passed these laws, the increased expense would have had to be taken into consideration by the Railroad Commission in fixing the advances allowed, or to be hereafter allowed.

The action of the legislature has saved the shippers and producers of this state a vast amount of money.

The financial condition of the railroads forced us to ask an increase in freight rates. We would have been glad, had the condition of the roads been such, that we would not have had to ask for such increase.

The way to protect yourselves in the amount of freight rates is to assist the railroads in reducing expenses and in preventing their operating expenses from being further increased. Will you thus help yourselves, your neighbors and your friends?

Your state and county officials publish statements of their public acts for the information of the people; while railroads are privately owned, they are operated for the benefit of the public, and the people are entitled to know how they are affected by railroad legislation and regulation.

Check on Texas Cattle.

Cattlemen of the quarantine district of Texas are confronted with a new obstacle this season in the annual exodus of their animals to Oklahoma pastures. The Oklahoma pasture owners have been so active in moving their land out of the tick-infested zones that many of them cannot now receive cattle from the quarantined areas of Texas. The Lone Star state stockmen thus affected must now either keep their cattle at home or seek new grazing areas for the summer months, according to J. E. Gibbons, owner of a 40,000-acre cattle ranch in San Saba county, Texas, who is a visitor on the Kansas City yards.

"We have a larger number of cattle than a year ago, so would like to obtain some northern pastures," said Mr. Gibbons, who is wintering 1500 aged steers, besides stock cows and heifers. "However, the cleaning up of much of Oklahoma grass land has raised a bar against us, as we are in the quarantined district of Texas.

"It is our custom in that part of the state to run our cattle on the grass until after the first of the year, when we begin feeding steers one pound to the head a day of cotton seed cake on the range. This keeps them up in flesh until grass becomes good. We also look after our cows in the same manner, and weak ones, which need a little extra feed, get cake. Our cows are calving now. In the last two winters a considerable number of steers were fed there, but this winter no feeding is being done. This will mean a larger number of aged steers to go on grass this spring. On the whole we have a considerably larger number of cattle on hand. The high price of cotton seed products last fall checked feeding. As it turned out, it is a fortunate thing that we did not feed, as the prices on fed cattle would have meant a loss in every case.

"Many cattle were shipped into San Saba county, which is south of the Colorado river, last fall. This helps to account for the larger number of cattle available there for summer grazing.

"Happily," concluded Mr. Gibbons, "our grass promises to be good, so we will be in a position to overcome to a considerable extent the reduced pasture area available for us in Oklahoma. Another factor in our favor is the excellent conditions which have prevailed all winter for cattle. Our holdings are now in better condition than usual."

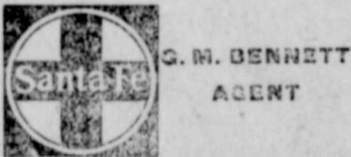

 Once more "E. Z." has seen
 fit to come to the front with
 what might be considered an ar-
 gument against preparedness. I
 take it for granted from his first
 statement that he would have us

MASONIC TEMPLE.

Building of Modern 3-Story Structure Practically Certain.

The local membership of the Masonic lodge is very enthusiastic over the proposition to build a Masonic Temple here, and the plans as now outlined practically render sure the early beginning of the work. At a meeting last week of the building committee of the two lodges, Messrs. J. H. White, Sam Moffatt and L. A. Williams, representing the Chapter, and Dr. J. B. Granville and W. B. McKenzie, representing the Blue Lodge, it was decided to finance the proposition by securing loans from among the membership, such loans to bear 8 per cent interest, and to be called for as needed.

This plan is already meeting with success, and it is anticipated that at least \$5,000 will have been subscribed to the loan before the end of the week. The Masonic lodge has a strong membership here, and the building committee anticipates no serious difficulty in securing additional \$5,000 subscriptions to the loan fund already raised. This sum, together with a fund of about \$2,000 in the lodge treasury will be ample to erect the building according to plans now approved.

These plans call for a modern 3-story building, the exterior being of brick veneer, with rock facing. The first floor of the building will be arranged for store rooms; the second for office rooms and the third will be devoted to the lodge. These plans call for a building the estimated cost of which will be about \$12,000.

The lodge has a splendid location on Blackburn street, being the northeast corner, just one block south of the Brady National bank. The lot has a frontage of 32 1/2 feet and a depth of 100 feet. The contemplated building will occupy the full width of the lot, and have a depth of 90 feet, leaving a 10-foot alleyway.

It is hoped to have the new building fully financed and ground for the new temple broken by the first of June.

BROWN AND McCULLOCH COURTS APPROVE.

New Structure Over Colorado at Milburn Completed Friday and Opened for Traffic.

Following the adjournment of commissioners court Wednesday the commissioners went to Milburn, where they met in joint session with the Brown county commissioners to pass upon the rebuilt bridge spanning the Colorado at that point. The bridge was found to be fully up to expectations, and was duly accepted by the courts of both counties. The bridge was completed on last Friday, and is now open and ready for traffic.

The following business was transacted by the court during the present term:

Commissioners court met on Monday, with the following present: J. E. Brown, county judge; Chas. Samuelson, G. B. Awalt, J. M. Carroll, H. E. McBride, commissioners; J. C. Wall, sheriff; W. J. Yantis, clerk.

Warrant was ordered issued to S. H. Mayo, county tax collector, in the sum of \$74.95 to reimburse him for special taxes refunded in Melvin and Camp San Saba special road districts, following the holding of such road districts to be unconstitutional.

The north one-half of Block No. 20, Fulcher addition, was leased by the county to Brady Cotton Oil Co. for the sum of \$20 per year for a period of five years.

The west half of block 65, Fulcher addition, belonging to the county, was ordered sold at public auction, and Chas. Samuelson was appointed commissioner of such sale. A minimum price of \$800 was set for the sale of the property.

Dr. J. G. McCall was appointed county health officer for McCulloch county for a period of two years.

The court ordered the payment of the expenses of operating Mercury State Warehouse No. 9, as follows: A. J. Beasley, as manager, \$175, less the sum of \$135.80 already received by him; Penn-Beakley Hardware Co., for rent of warehouse, \$175. This motion was voted upon favorably by all four commissioners. Judge Brown dissenting.

Quarterly report of John Martin, county sheep inspector, certifying to inspection of various flocks of sheep and finding them free of scab, was received and approved.

Monthly report of S. H. Mayo, tax collector, was examined and approved.

J. W. Womble was allowed \$54.40 for right-of-way conveyed by him to McCulloch county.

T. T. Turner was allowed \$47.45 for right-of-way deeded by him to McCulloch county.

J. M. Pate was allowed \$20 for right-of-way conveyed by him to McCulloch county.
