WARM CITY ELECTION

JACKSON SECRETARY BY A NARROW MARGIN.

Louis Baker Wins Easily in Marshal's Race—T. J. King Elected City Recorder.

While the campaign for city offices ran smoothly and quietly enough previous to the election, the city election Tuesday developed into a hot race for the offices where the candidates had opponents, and the heavy vote recorded demonstrated the interest felt and taken in the various races. With a total of 357 city polls and an estimated 60 exemptions, the total vote polled Tuesday was 362.

The voting began early in the morning and continued steadily up till noon; the number of votes increasing more rapidly as the afternoon wore away. J. M. Duke was the presiding officer at the election, with Chas. Bradley and S. T. Ward as judges, and Wilbur Lee and L. Ballou as clerks.

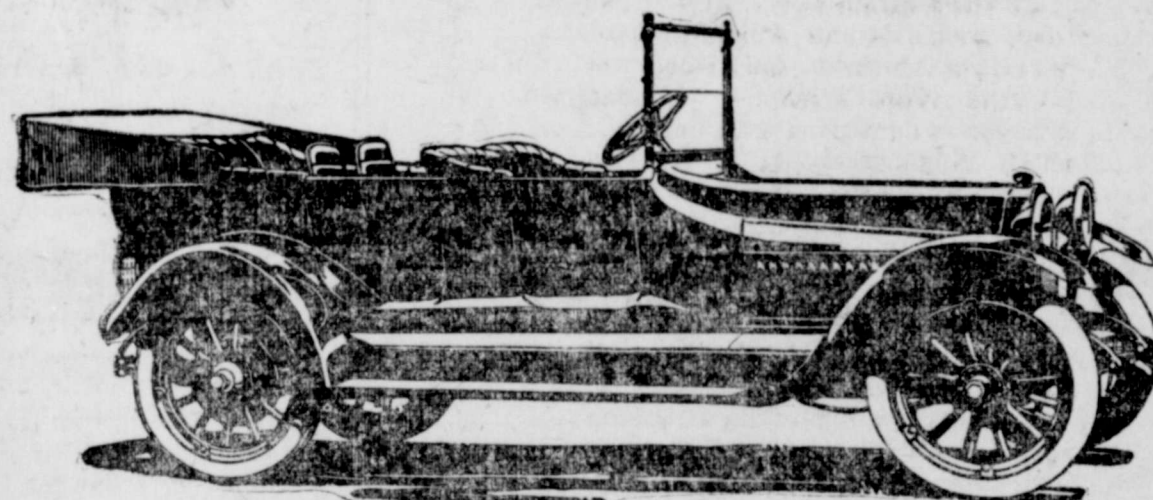

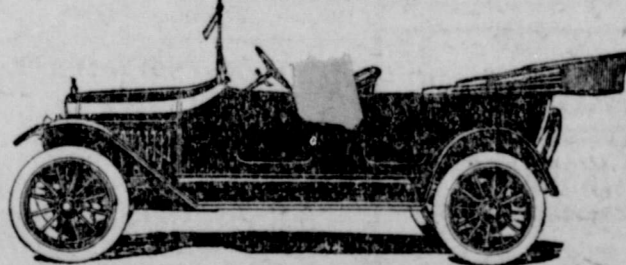

WHY NEWSPAPERS ERR.

Some folks sometimes wonder why newspapers "make so many errors."

As a matter of fact, taking into consideration the chances for making errors, newspapers make fewer errors, as a whole, than any other profession.

Take a simple item, for instance. The reporter hears of such an item. In getting the details, he may be referred to half a dozen different parties. His notes are made roughly and quickly, thereby allowing a possibility of error. As he transcribes his notes there is opportunity for still further error. The compositor may misread the copy handed him, and thereby alter the meaning, or may, unintentionally make an error that in turn gets by the proof reader.

But these errors are insignificant compared with the errors likely to arise in securing a reliable report of the occurrence itself. A newspaper reporter is seldom at hand when the item of news itself transpires. He must necessarily get his information at second hand; even third and fourth hand. He has no time to verify each individual report, but must separate the grain from the chaff as his judgment directs. He must allow for the additional flourishes put on a story at its third or fourth telling; he must recognize the fact that exaggerations creep into an oft-told tale.

But even with competent witnesses it is hard to arrive at first-hand facts. Read the following dispatch from St. Louis and you will not wonder at the inaccuracies which creep into the columns of a newspaper.

"An experiment to demonstrate the unreliability of eye-witnesses testimony was performed a few days ago before the psychology class of Prof. James Swift at Washington University—and as a result the students now are convinced they cannot believe the evidence of their own eyes.

"While the professor was lecturing the door suddenly opened and two men, gesticulating angrily and quarreling, entered. Two young women followed them. The young women screamed, one of the men drew what looked like a revolver, the report of the firing of a gun was heard, and one of the men fell over a chair, apparently wounded.

"The professor then asked the students to write down their impressions of what had occurred, he having staged the affair for this purpose.

"Of the thirty-two members of the class, most of them wrote that they had seen one man draw a revolver. The "revolver" in fact was a yellow banana. Others were sure they heard the report of a revolver. The sound was the explosion of a paper torpedo.

"Though four persons took part in the affair, one student wrote that he saw six, another wrote that he saw ten and another told only of the two women. Apparently he did not see the two men who first entered the room.

"None of the students recognized the actors in the "shooting scrape" as fellow students, though none of the four were disguised."

The sight of an automobile stalled in the mud and water on the public square Monday is sufficient evidence that the square is the muddiest public thoroughfare after a rain in McCulloch county, the "Voter" from Fife to the contrary notwithstanding. Furthermore, for daring to dispute our eye-witnessing proclivities in the matter, we shall not permit Mr. "Voter" to fish in the lake that will front our office following the present rain.

Inspecting Schools.

E. E. Davis, representing the Extension Department of the State University, arrived in the city Monday, and has been spending the week, in company with County Superintendent E. L. White, in a tour of the McCulloch county schools. The object of Mr. Davis' visit is to make a general survey of the situation, and to note the needs and conditions of the schools from which he will base his recommendations to Mr. White as to the best methods of meeting these requirements and aiding in the development of the schools.

Points already visited have been the following: Rochelle, Cowboy, Mercury, Milburn, Corn Creek and Placid. A tour of other portions of the county had been contemplated, but it is likely that the plans will have to be abandoned because of the unfavorable weather. Great interest has been manifested in the various districts visited, and at Rochelle Monday an attendance of about 500 marked the visit.

Wherever practical, Mr. White uses his stereopticon machine, the slides furnished through Mr. Davis depicting model schools and model school grounds and other matters of interest and benefit in school work.

Mr. Davis expressed himself as being highly pleased with the progress shown in the McCulloch county schools, and also commented very favorably upon the disposition of the school trustee work in close harmony with the county superintendent for the best interests and greatest advancement of the schools.

From here Mr. Davis goes to Coleman county for a visit to the schools.

Preparedness.
Once more the "hot air vender" from Fife has seen fit to attempt to reply to my arguments for preparedness. But, like a mule to a sorghum mill, he goes around and around while he hands us the same old rehash.
You invited me to tell you from whence we could get the revenue to pay for this preparedness. I am in favor of raising the money by direct taxation. One-fourth of one per cent of the taxable property in the U. S. would give us money enough to prepare for defense. It is a shame that the richest nation in the world is not sufficiently prepared to capture handits and cutthroats when they come into our country and murder our citizens. Once more I am forced to tell you that, as for my part, I would much rather pay out money for preparedness than pay it out as war indemnities when some nation has shown us the tremendous cost of unpreparedness. A man's patriotism has reached a low ebb when he becomes so little and pusillanimous that he begrudges the few dollars which he will be called upon to contribute toward preparing his country to defend itself from attack. He is no longer entitled to the protection which this government gives him.
In reply to your statement that I failed to give the figures that would bear me out in the statement that we have not spent so much for preparedness as Germany in the last ten years, kindly let me remind you that you failed to give the figures to bear you out when you first made this statement that this was a fact. You produce your figures, now, as you were the first one to raise this question. I have the figures and will be glad to tell the source from which I got them.
Now, my friend, the man who would argue that war is not crime should be classed as the original Foolicus I. But, on the other hand, you can butt your brains out against the fact that the end of war is not yet. No nation has anything to gain by war, but there is much that it can lose. So long as the economic conditions are what they are today war is inevitable. We can not change these conditions, so the only thing left for us is to accept the inevitable and do the best we can with it. Our unpreparedness in the past has not kept us out of wars, and in all the wars that we have had our unpreparedness has cost us dearly. More of our men have met their deaths because of the inefficiency of our officers than

by the bullets of the enemies. Jefferson made a fetish of unpreparedness, but that did not keep us from going to war with England in 1812. No nation was ever more unprepared than when we went to war with Spain in 1898, and that unpreparedness cost us far more lives than the Spaniards took. In the present war England has paid the price of unpreparedness. Countless thousands of her raw recruits have been slaughtered in the combats with the well trained veterans of Germany.

We ought to thank our lucky stars that Mexico is not a strong nation, or we should find ourselves in a serious condition. Should Carranza and Villa bury the hatchet and unite against the United States we would find ourselves in a ridiculous predicament. We would find ourselves confronted by 75,000 seasoned veterans and would be powerless, at first, to cope with them. It took more than a week to get 8,000 men ready to go on that punitive expedition into Mexico. How long would it take us to get ready enough men to meet a real nation?

Now, seriously, if I should be called upon to go to war to defend my country I would not hesitate. All the request that I would care to make, "E. Z." should we be in the same regiment, is that they put you in the back line.
Give us something new, my friend, if you intend to try to discuss this question further. Let us not take up valuable time and space unless you are willing to meet facts as they are, and not as you think they ought to be.

Now, we have been at Brady after rains, and we have never noticed the square being so muddy after a rain, nor has it looked dirty to us compared with the roads of the county. In fact, we have always thought we had the prettiest, cleanest and best kept square of any county adjoining us, and fear that The Standard man must have been dreaming when he wrote this article. If the square is graded any more than it is now it must be done from the building to the edge of the street, and we believe it would cost anywhere from \$3,000 to \$5,000 to do this and then put a concrete curb around the edge to keep people off the grass. Now, a farmer, when at Brady, can drive on the square, hitch his team and do his trading, when if only the streets were left him he must stop at the wagon yard or back alley several blocks from his trading point and pay the wagon yard man a fee to let him put up, besides having to carry his purchases further.

There would not be room for all the traffic on the square if it were confined to just the streets on each side, and a person could not stop on them without being in danger of being run over by an automobile.

We feel sure that there is no sentiment in the county to make any further changes in the county property at this time, especially among the farmers whom it would mostly affect. We would like to hear from someone else on this proposition.

TO REMODEL CHURCH.

Baptists to Convert Building Into Modern Structure.

A committee, of which I. G. Abney is chairman, has been appointed by the Baptist church to confer on plans and make recommendations for the reconstruction of the Baptist church building. The plans as outlined by the committee and which will be recommended by them to the membership call for the conversion of the present building into a modern and extremely attractive edifice, and one which will be ample for the needs both of the church and the Sunday school for many years to come. The improvements, including seating and furnishing, will cost approximately \$4,000. This sum will be raised by subscription entirely among the Baptist membership.

The plans call for an addition on the north of the present building, 34x40 feet. Excavation will be made at the end of this addition so as to provide Sunday school rooms, while above the Sunday school rooms will be arranged the choir loft. The pulpit and chancel will be placed in this end of the building. The roof of the old building will be removed, and the walls raised some five feet to permit of a gallery on the west, south and east sides, encircling the church auditorium. The gallery will also be arranged for Sunday school rooms, and, together with the basement Sunday school rooms mentioned above, will give ten rooms for this purpose.

At the northwest corner of the present building there will be built an entrance, and an entrance with ornamental portico will also be constructed on the south side of the present structure, so as to provide two main entrances. A beamed ceiling will lend attractiveness to the interior, and the roof will be modern in construction and design.

It is anticipated that all plans will be completed and everything in readiness for the work of reconstructing the church building following the close of the revival meeting to be held in the near future.

Under the pastorate of Bro. J. M. Reynolds the Baptist membership has experienced a great rejuvenation, and all the members are co-operating enthusiastically with their pastor in the work of upbuilding the church and in the enlargement of its scope of usefulness and service to the Lord.

FOOD FOR BELGIUM.

Brady Ladies to Sell Flags—Churches Asked to Assist.

Tomorrow is flag day in Brady!

And the flags that are to be sold and worn represent aid given for the stricken people of Belgium and Northern France.

The situation there is terrible beyond description. Should the importation of food into Belgium be stopped, there would be wholesale starvation within three or four weeks. In the midst of wealth and abundance, many Americans have done nothing to help in this great cause, and it will, indeed, be a hard-hearted person who will refuse to contribute his mite towards this great work.

Consequently everyone is urged to buy a flag tomorrow. The local committee is composed of Mesdames H. B. Ogdan, W. R. Davidson, C. T. White and Miss Harriet Cook. These ladies will have the flags for sale and everyone is requested to pay at least seven cents for a flag. This amount will feed one destitute person in Belgium one day. Any amount will be received, however, and those who are able should contribute liberally.

This work is being undertaken by the Daughters of the American Revolution, and the funds subscribed locally will be used by the D. A. R. for food and clothing for the destitute in the war zone.

The D. A. R. likewise requests all the churches to co-operate in the move. They request that all buyers of flags wear them over Sunday, and that the churches generally will, on that day, give their aid to this cause. We quote from the letter sent out by Daisy Allen Stacy, President General of the D. A. R., as follows:

"I believe that this is a great opportunity to perform a valuable service to humanity and to uphold the honor and dignity of our flag. We are being called upon by these stricken people for help. Shall we deny them, or, as a great, rich, neutral nation, shall we come to their aid and rescue? The commission have undertaken the expense of organizing the day and ask us only for service. Can we give it, and with a will, and in God's name?"

If any country on earth ever needed a Merchant Marine it is this country of ours, and Congress ought not to hesitate one moment in preparing a way for it to be brought about. Judge Riddle's stand for such a system is logical and business-like, and shows his ability to grapple with the practical problems of life, and in that way make his life useful to the people that he represents.

Judge Riddle is with President Wilson for Preparedness, and so announced himself in all the leading papers on the 14th of last November, and at that time most of our public men were either silent or had declared against it.

He is always frank and honest with the people, and lets them know how he stands on every issue.
