### B. F. JONES KILLS C. A. BUIE

#### Both Former McCulloch County Citizens---Quarrel Over Ranch Property Jointly Owned Near Eldorado Cause of the Shooting.

News was received here last week of the shooting of C. A. Buie by Best F. Jones, the tragedy occurring on the Jones ranch west of Eldorado. Both men were quite well known in McCulloch county. Jones, for a number of years, sold lot shipments of groceries over the county and about four years ago moved his family here from Hood county, having bought an interest with Arthur Hall in the Stacy telephone system. For a year or more he had charge of the system at that place. Later he sold out his interest to C. A. Buie, taking an interest in Buie's ranch near Eldorado as part of the consideration. Buie, a couple of years ago, disposed of his telephone interests, and he and Jones got into a dispute over the ranch, which was to have been settled by suit at the next term of district court of Schleicher county.

The following is the account of the tragedy as reported by the Eldorado Success: Excitement spread over Eldorado Tuesday morning when a phone message announced that C. A. Buie had been shot and killed by Best F. Jones on the Jones ranch west of Eldorado, near Kaffir. The ranch was owned by Jones and Buie and out of this partnership grew the trouble which resulted in the death of Mr. Buie. Trouble has been going on for several

months, but friends of both parties thought the differences would be settled in the coming district court. Mr. Buie went to the ranch to get his portion of some maize that was grown on the place, and was accompanied by his brother, who witnessed the tragedy. The Buies drove up to the ranch in a wagon, stopping at the barn, which is some distance from the house occupied by Mr. Jones. Mr. Jones met the Buies at the barn, where the men passed a few remarks. Mr. Jones called for his gun, which was brought to him by his married daughter, Mrs. Zimmerman, who lives in a small house near the barn, and who was also an eye-witness to the tragedy. After receiving the gun, which was a 38 calibre Winchester, the fatal shot was fired, which took effect in the center of the breast, passing through the body, the bullet lodging in the clothing at the back. Mr. Buie took a few steps and fell dead in the pen with an opened pocket knife in his hand. We know nothing of the words that passed between the two men.

Mr. Buie was a man about 50 years of age, and has a wife and five children, and has resided in this county about fifteen years. Mr. Jones is a man of about 45 years and has resided in this county about three years, coming here from McCulloch county. Both men are prominent and

the tragedy is greatly deplored by friends on both sides.

#### SUINT VALUABLE.

#### Wool Scourings Worth More Than Fleece.

Uvalde, April 14—The fact that Texas wool is docked about sixty per cent on account of loss of weight in scouring, as claimed by the buyers, has given rise to a good deal of discussion among sheepmen here. F. M. Getzendaner, president of the Uvalde Business Men's Club, has come to the conclusion that the sixty pounds scoured out of each one hundred pounds of wool is worth almost as much as the forty pounds of scoured wool. A small portion of this sixty pounds, he says, is dirt, but there is much less of it than people suppose. The greater part is matter se-

creted by the skin of the sheep and is called "suint." Suint is made up largely of an oily substance and soluble salts, chiefly carbonate of potassium. From the oil part is extracted lanolin, which is used exclusively in metal practice. The potash salts are worth wholesale something like 50c per pound.

Mr. Getzendaner says: "While the scourings from wool always have been valuable and not thrown away, as the buyers state, the fact that the war prevents the importations of these chemicals from Europe, which has supplied most of them here, tofore, has multiplied their market value at least ten times. I want the wool growers to get the profit from this increase in the value of their products."

Sam Crider and wife were at the hub Monday on a shopping tour.

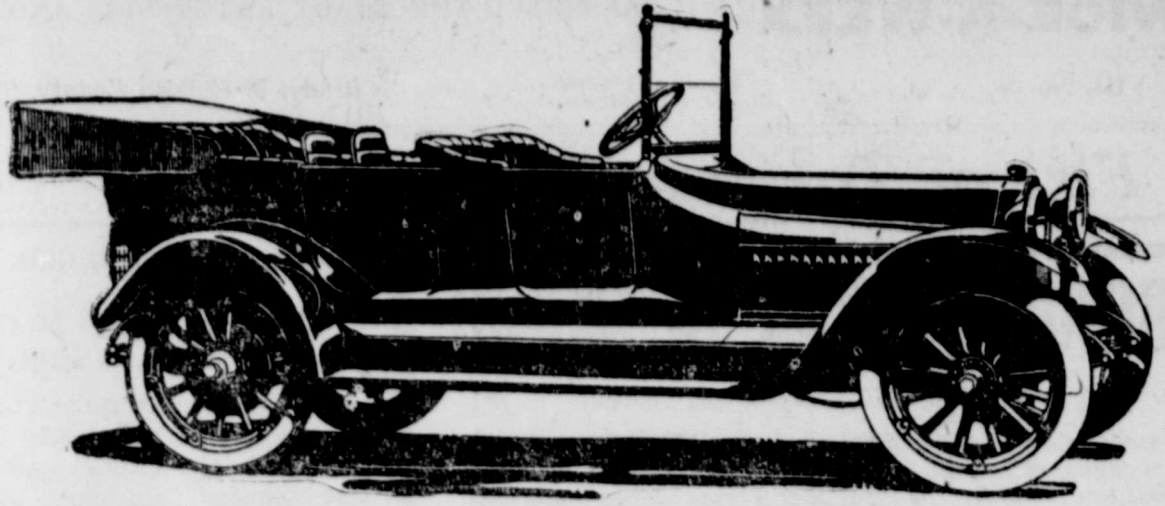

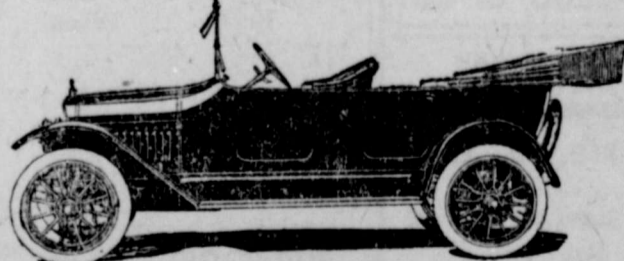

### THE MASON ROAD.

Several months ago a representative bunch of Brady Y. M. B. L. boosters went to Mason to confer with Mason upon the road proposition. They found Mason had placed the Brady-Mason road in excellent condition as far as the McCulloch county line, and pledged Mason that Brady and McCulloch county would put the McCulloch county end in equally as good condition. They came back very much enthused and made an earnest endeavor to create like enthusiasm among Brady citizens, only to have their hopes dashed to earth by the non-interest of many of the citizens.

Under the circumstances there remained but one thing to do—and that was to bring up reinforcements. Accordingly every business man available was enlisted in the Brady Y. M. B. L. booster trip Wednesday, and the joys and discomforts of one Brady-Mason road made converts of the most pessimistic.

Not a one of the bunch that went to Mason returned except as a road enthusiast. Everyone realizes as never before the necessity of a good road to our neighbor to the south and everyone is boosting for the road and willing to do his part.

Brady must build the road—Brady owes an obligation to Mason that can be wiped out in no other way.

There is nothing that will take away the frown so easily, redeem your faith in your fellowman, smooth out the rough places in commercial progress and promote civic welfare so much as a genuine get-together meeting such as was had on the Brady Y. M. B. L. trade trip.

### MASON'S WAY.

Our neighbor, Mason, virtually heaped coals of fire upon the heads of Brady boosters Wednesday. Such a royal welcome, such open-hearted hospitality, such a feast as they set before the Bradyites! And then, kindly but gently, Mason stated her position. She had built good roads in every direction from Mason—to the McCulloch county line as well as to the Llano county line. Then she had requested co-operation upon the part of Brady and Llano toward emulating, in their respective counties, the example Mason had set. Brady had promised, but had not fulfilled. Llano made no promises, but had performed.

There's the difference! And a difference in Llano's favor in more ways than one. For the good roads Llano built served not only to prove pleasing to Mason, but the freighters from Llano are making a reduction of 5c per hundred pounds in the freight charges, even though the distance from Mason to Llano is seven miles greater than from Mason to Brady.

Mason states her position very emphatically. Until Brady shows a disposition to redeem her promises, Mason merchants will refuse to give their business to Brady, but will route all their freight via Llano. Call it a boycott if you wish, but it is a level-headed business proposition.

The Camp San Saba folks have already improved their part of the road in highly creditable fashion. There are not so many miles of bad road but what could be readily wiped out by liberal subscriptions upon the part of Brady merchants.

We owe an obligation to Mason that Brady is honor-bound to pay.

Brady citizens turned out in loyal style for the trade trip. In turn, they were welcomed in royal style by the citizens of the communities visited.

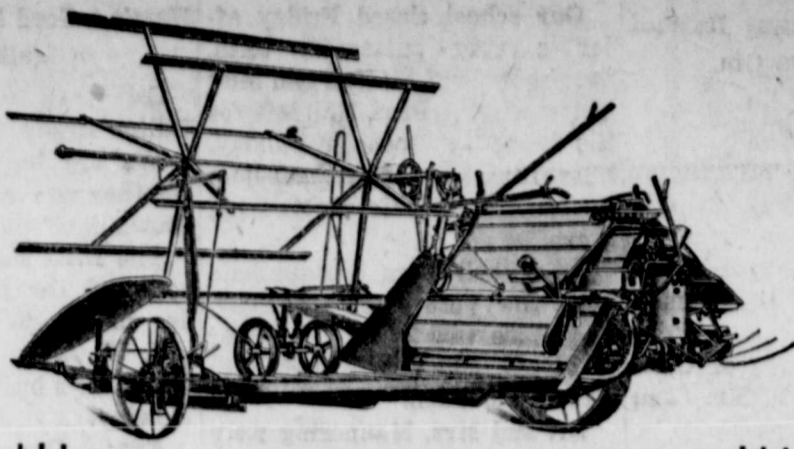

**MEETS TRAGIC DEATH**

**IRA LANE SHOT TO DEATH IN NEW MEXICO.**

Was Well Known in Brady—Crime Charged to Charlie Lassater, An Employee.

News has been received here of the death of Ira Lane, former Brownwood citizen, and well known over McCulloch county. Mr. Lane was shot to death last Friday by an employe named Charlie Lassater, the tragedy taking place near Jal, New Mexico, where the victim had recently moved from Winkler county, Texas.

Some three or four years ago Mr. Lane spent considerable time in McCulloch county, while engaged in the life insurance business, and made many friends here. He possessed a happy disposition, and his smiling countenance made him welcome everywhere.

The following account of the tragedy is reprinted from the Brownwood Bulletin:

"Ira Lane was shot in the back and instantly killed between 7 and 8 o'clock Thursday evening by Charlie Lassater, an employe, who also shot and slightly wounded Bryan Lane, younger brother, as he ran. Mr. Cross says his nephews had been busy all day away from the camp used by themselves and Lassater, Ira Lane having just moved to New Mexico after selling his ranch in Texas. Coming to camp late Thursday, the two Lane brothers were unharnessed their team when Lassater approached them with a shot gun in his hand. Without speaking he raised the gun and fired two times at Ira Lane, the heavy charges of buckshot taking effect in the neck and chest and killing him instantly. Bryan Lane started to run when the firing began, and Lassater then reloaded his gun and fired one time at the fleeing youth, who apparently fell just as a charge of No. 2 shot struck him in the back. He was not seriously wounded. Practically nothing could be learned as to the cause of the tragedy.

"Riley Cross, a relative of the dead man, left Friday night for the scene of the shooting at Jal, a small town about eighty miles from Carlsbad, N. M., and the body was shipped to Brownwood, where the funeral was held Monday.

"Ira Lane is survived by his mother, Mrs. Violet Lane, of this city, and by two brothers, L. D. and Bryan Lane. Bryan Lane was at Carlsbad, N. M., or near there, when his brother was shot. Mr. Lane is also survived by a little daughter, Imogene, who is with her grandmother here. His wife died a few years ago.

"Ira Lane was a splendid business man, and one of the most energetic workers Brownwood has ever produced. He had a very engaging personality, and his face always wore a smile that was indicative of his good humor and good nature. He was reared in this city, and has hosts of friends throughout this section of the state who regret his untimely death and sympathize with his grief-stricken mother, brothers and little daughter."

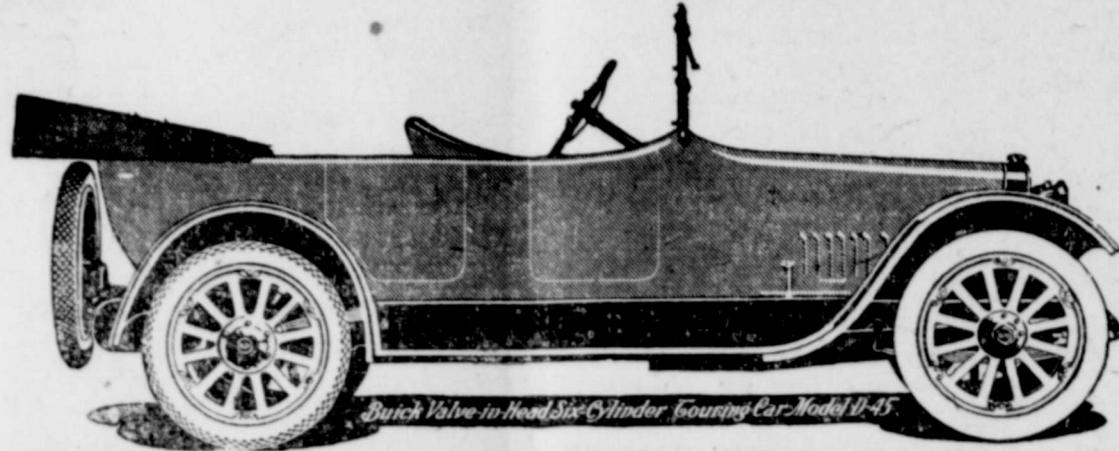

#### The Public Square.

The Standard of last Tuesday takes us to task for opposing the expenditure of a good part of the county's road and bridge fund on the public square. We wish to say that we wrote the article referred to by The Standard at the instance of several citizens of this and other communities of the county, and it was for the purpose of testing the people as to whether or not they wanted this work done now and that it was not personal feeling that prompted it.

As to being "unobservant" we took the trouble to talk to several of the Brady people as to how they wanted the square fixed, the probable cost, etc., and we fail to remember if any of them mentioned anything about

a market place or any other convenience for the farmer.

You have stated the position of the Brady business men; we state the position of the farmer. If the business men provide a market place and other conveniences for the farmer somewhere else, we do not see where the farmer would have any kick coming and we are satisfied there would be none. But the farmer knows that with the court house lawn extended to the city streets, he would have no place in his county capital to lay his head without being at the mercy of the wagon man or the city ordinances, and until the market place is provided he is against encroachment on his territory.

We are not satisfied with things as they are if there is anything better to be had, and we believe the market place will solve the problem, and until it is provided we, too, are in favor

of working that good old democratic doctrine of majority rule and are willing to cross bats on this proposition until the proposed market place is provided. Boost it! A VOTER.

Editor's Note—The foregoing article clarifies the situation considerably, for we had wondered what had happened to "A Voter," who is a constant and consistent booster. The idea of taking away the privileges of any visitor to Brady was farthest from the mind of the advocates of an improved square. On the contrary, not only would a market square be a great convenience and benefit to the residents of the county, but the improvement of the square and the establishment of a court house park would, in addition to enhancing the appearance of the city, give a much needed and much to be desired resting place for the visitors.

If there was misapprehension upon the part of any McCulloch county citizen as to the object of the public square improvement, then we are glad the opportunity arose for a correction of the misunderstanding. Until the market square is provided, there will be no attempt to deprive anyone of the privileges enjoyed at present.

Since, in our issue of January 21st we announced that the city council had instructed the secretary to find a suitable location for a market square, and again in our issue of March 24th we stated that the city council stood ready to improve the street surrounding the court house lawn we labored under the thought that the improvements contemplated, as well as the bearing on the cost of the improvement, was generally understood.

"A Voter" is eminently correct in the position taken, and since we have shown our posi-

tion to be in accord with his views, there can be no further objection upon the part of the farmer or any out-of-town resident, and every citizen should line up for the proposition and "BOOST IT."

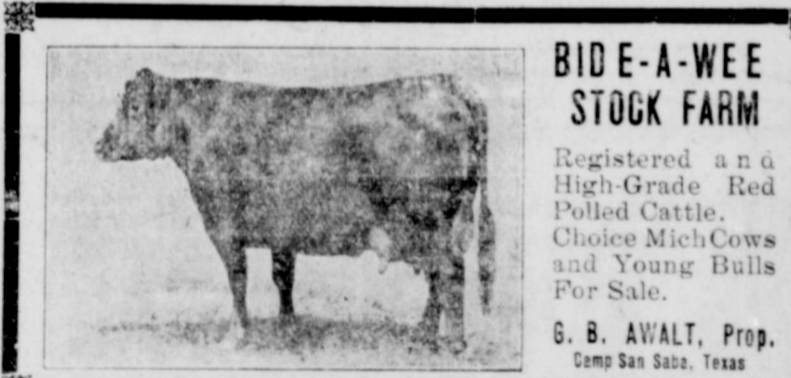

**BRADY Y. M. B. L. TRADE TRIP**

Unqualified Success from Every Standpoint--Big Crowds in Lineup on Each of Three Days. Another Trade Excursion Next Week.

The first two days' jaunt of the Brady Y. M. B. L. Boosters was a success beyond the wildest expectation of the most optimistic Brady booster.

Never were a bunch of boosters more heartily welcomed! Never did good-fellowship prevail more universal!

The first day's success contributed more than anything else to the equally great success of the second day, for every trade tripper became such an ardent booster that every laggard and every stay-at-home caught the spirit of the occasion and joined in the good work.
