1974 BTDD Celebration Hailed

School Begins Monday

Bovina Schools will begin the 1974-'75 school year at 8:25 a.m. Monday, August 26.

Faculty members began their year Monday when they reported for in-service training for a week.

Registration of high school, junior high, kindergarten and first grade students is set for Thursday, August 22, according to school officials.

High school students will register in the library with seniors registering from 8 to 9 a.m., juniors from 9 to 10 a.m., sophomores from 10 to 11 a.m. and freshmen from 11 a.m. to noon.

Junior high students will register in their classrooms--eighth grade students from 9 to 10 a.m. and seventh grade students from 10 to 11 a.m.

Kindergarten and first grade students who did not pre-register this spring will register at Ridgelea Elementary School from 9 a.m. until noon.

New students are requested to register at the proper times. Students in grades two through six will register the first day of school.

Complete immunization and birth records are required for registering kindergarten and first grade pupils.

Kindergarten classes in Bovina Schools will be offered once again this year on the same basis as the past year for all five-year-old children. It is not a mandatory program.

Educationally disadvantaged students, including those with a language barrier or whose family's yearly income is less than \$3,000, may attend classes on a whole-day basis for the entire school year. All other five-year-old children will begin at mid-term and go on a full-day basis along with those who began at the first of the school term.

The kindergarten program is authorized and financed by the state.

All school-age children, under the state's compulsory immunization law, must be immunized against diphtheria, measles, tetanus and polio before they will be allowed to enroll, according to Superintendent L.F. Jacobs.

11th ANNUAL All Events Are Well-Attended

The 11th annual Bull Town Days celebration, Bovina's community-wide series of activities, was held here last week, and once again thousands of people turned out for the celebration, which caters to people of all ages.

As usual, the celebration was termed another great success by promoters as well as by those attending.

The biggest activity, in terms of attendance, is always the big free barbecue held on Friday evening on Main Street, and this event drew another big crowd, estimated at 2,500 to 3,000 people.

The meal features boneless chuck beef, and also includes pinto beans, pickle and onion slices and Bovina-grown cantaloupe.

The cantaloupe and onions were provided by Gateway Produce Co. of Bovina. Remainder of the meal was paid for by donations from businesses and individuals and from income from other BTDD activities.

RAIN INTERFERES
For the first time in the history of the Bull Town Days celebrations, rain forced changes of events at the Roping Arena on Thursday night, which includes the queen's contest. One inch of rain was received in town, and the shower also rained out the scheduled first night of the carnival.

The queen's contest was held at Tommy Williams' farm west of Bovina.

Named queen to reign over Bull Town Days of 1974 was Lezli Williams, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tommy Williams. She was sponsored in the queen's contest by Bovina Roping Club.

First runnerup was Cathie Trimble, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C.E. Trimble. Her sponsor was Horn Insurance Agency.

Second runnerup was Diana Naegle, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C.C. Naegle, sponsored in the contest by Parmer County Cattle Company.

The new queen was presented a dozen long-stemmed pink roses, and a hand-tooled leather crown. The first and second runner-up were presented plaques.

Two out-of-town judges selected winners in the queen's contest. The contest is held with contestants performing on horsemanship. Sixty per cent of the judging is based on horsemanship and 40 per cent on beauty and personality.

Jerry McKay of Bovina won first place in the beard-growing contest, with Steve Taylor of Friona taking second place and Burry Thatcher of Bovina placing third. The contest was held Thursday night at the school auditorium.

Also conducted Thursday was the cow-calling contest. Owen Patton successfully defended his title in the men's division, with Mrs. Ed Hutto winning the women's division.

Second places in cow-calling went to C.E. Trimble and Mrs. Earl Whitten. Rouel Barron was third in the men's division.

JUNIOR MISS PAGEANT

Board Approves Tax Rate, '74-'75 Budget

The tax rate for Bovina Independent School District will remain the same as it has been for the last eight years--\$1.83 per \$100 evaluation.

This was the decision of the Bovina School Board at its meeting Monday night, August 19.

The board approved the budget for the 1974-'75 school year, which amounts to \$630,716.00.

Contracts of six new teachers were approved. They are Miss Margaret Clark, high school and junior high school girls basketball coach and Driver's Education instructor; Mrs. Shirley Garrison, third grade.

Also, Ladson R. Worley, fifth grade; Mrs. Sue Beene, resource teacher for special education for the elementary schools, and Kevin McClellan, assistant coach and government and P.E. teacher.

The board voted to make Zane Reeves head coach of boys basketball at BHS. Reeves had served as assistant boys basketball coach and junior high coach last year, in addition to helping with football.

The following cafeteria employees were approved: Mrs. Marie Kriegel, supervisor; Mrs. Sid Lloyd, Mrs. Glenna Monk, Mrs. Dorothy Stone, Mrs. Luradean Langer, Mrs. Elvira Clemons, Mrs. Bernita Mae Burnett, Mrs. Mary Anna Hall and Miss Olga Serna.

Wayland Beavers was employed as a custodian. Ramon Delgado and Mrs. Irma Hernandez are the other school custodians.

Charles Teague will continue as bus maintenance foreman, and bus drivers will be Teague, Joe Blatchford, Roscoe Parr, Julia Ann Moody, Gary Cox, and Ramon Delgado. The school is still in need of two additional bus drivers, either men or women.

The board voted to increase the prices for school lunches to 55 cents for students in grades kindergarten through fifth, 60 cents for students in grades 6-12 and 75 cents for adults.

Also approved was the gasoline bid for the 1974-'75 school year. Charles Oil Co.'s bid was the one approved.

The board emphasized enforcing the hair and dress code currently in effect, with more emphasis on the length of girls' skirts or dresses which should be kept at a decent length, and no shorts being worn except in P.E. classes.

Other administrative policies concerning student dress are as follows: No halter or midriff wearing apparel for girls; No see-through tank shirts or blouses for boys or girls.

The dress code covers both junior high and high school students.

THP Investigates County Wrecks

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated eight accidents on rural highways in Parmer County during the month of July, 1974, according to Sergeant W.E. Wells, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and three persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for Parmer County during the first seven months of 1974 shows a total of 65 accidents resulting in no fatalities, but 43 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of

Public Safety Region for July, 1974, shows a total of 485 accidents resulting in 18 persons killed and 280 persons injured as compared to June, 1973, with 658 accidents resulting in 21 persons killed and 366 persons injured. This was 173 less accidents, three less killed, and 86 less injured in 1974 at the same period of time.

The 18 traffic deaths for the month of July, 1974, occurred in the following counties: four in Deaf Smith; two each in Garza and Haskell; and one each in Oldham, Wilbarger, King, Palo Pinto, Dallam, Montague, Parker, Terry, Wise and Roberts.

Board of Trustees for Bovina Public Schools voted Wednesday night to adopt a "no shorts in school" ordinance at a regular monthly meeting in the school tax office.

TEN YEARS AGO—AUGUST 19, 1964

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SCS Report

Pasture grasses are still a good bet for more diversity in farming. Many producers in Parmer County believe that grass can be a positive benefit in farming operations.

The natural gas crisis put many in a real bind. Irrigation wells were stopped that should have been running. The equipment shortage and high prices for materials crippled many row crop producers.

With proper management, grass takes very little maintenance. If irrigation wells are shut down for a couple of weeks it is not critical like it is with corn. After grass is established operation with machinery are cut practically to nil.

A large investment in livestock is not always necessary for grass to pay for itself. Generally there is a demand for pasture and grass leases are at a premium.

Grass is not only a cash crop, it is land improving crop. Land

under grass does not deteriorate, it improves. Just think how much more productive new sod land is than land that has been cropped for years.

Charles Bass, J.P. Sims, and John Hays are three farmers that believe in grass. They are in the process of establishing grass on their farms. Their goal is diversification of operations and conservation of their natural resources with a profit. Grass seems to fit the bill.

Now is the time to seed cool season grasses. If you have a question or need assistance with your grass planting contact the Soil Conservation Service in Friona.

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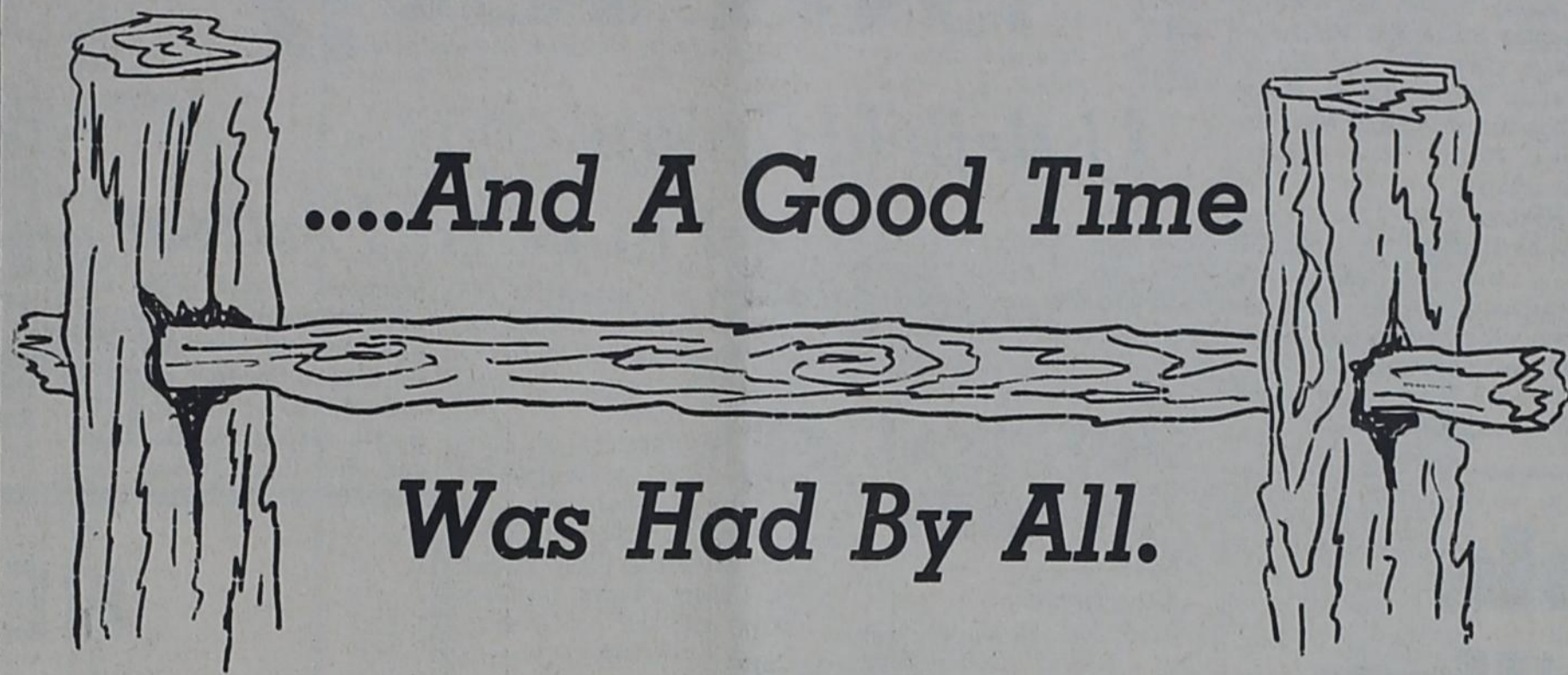
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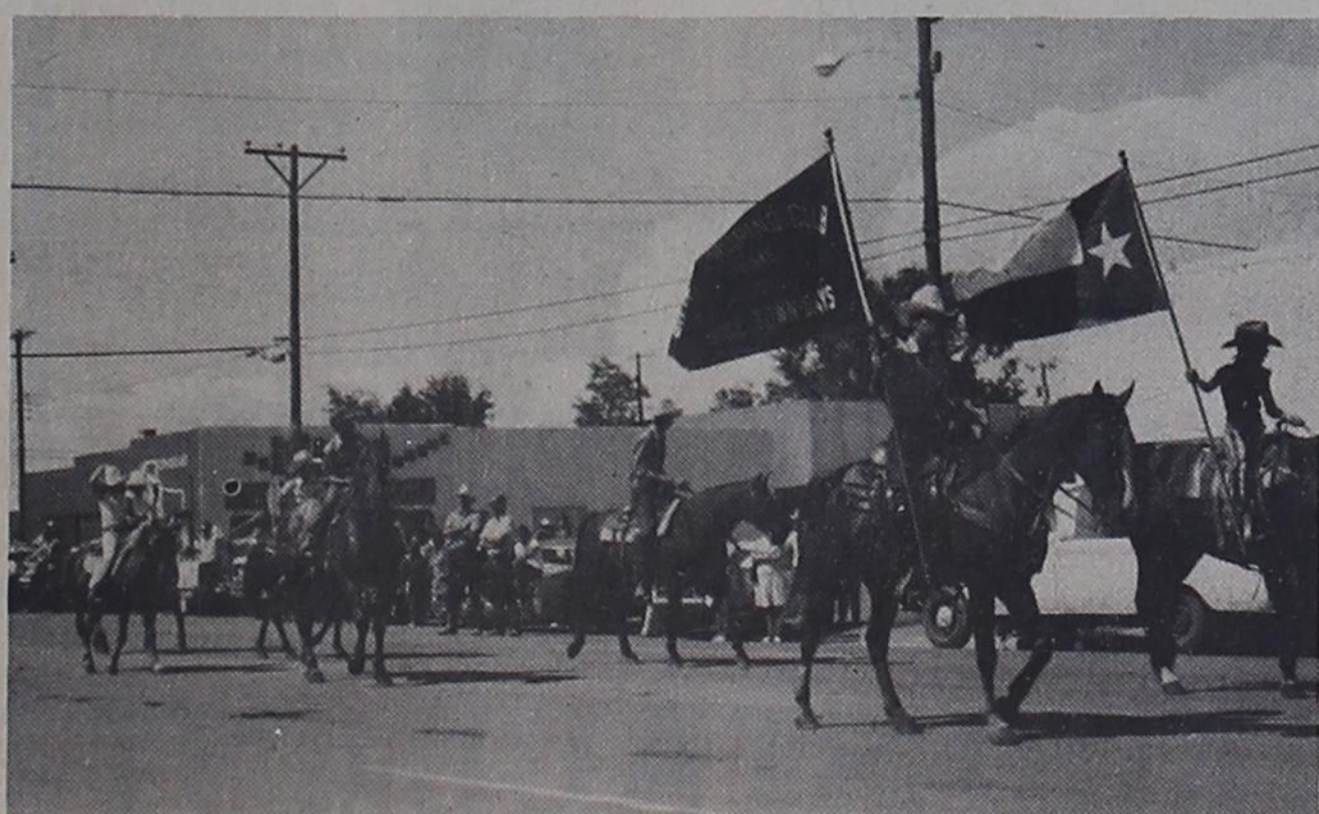

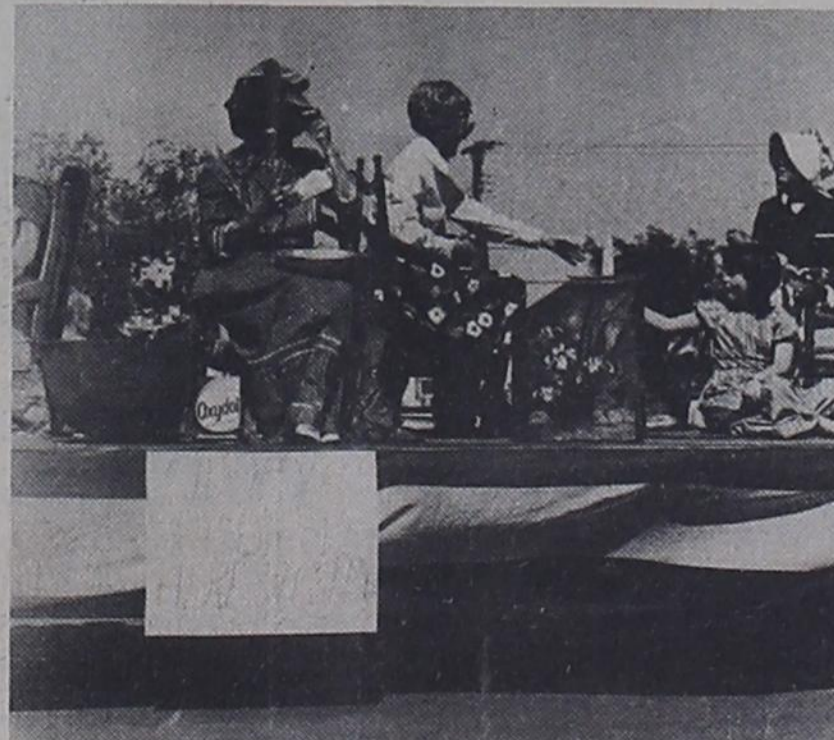
QUEEN...Miss Lezli Williams, the 1974 Bull Town Days Queen, was captured by The Blade camera as she rode her mount in the LTD parade.

A short program was presented by Mrs. Wilson on parliamentary procedure.

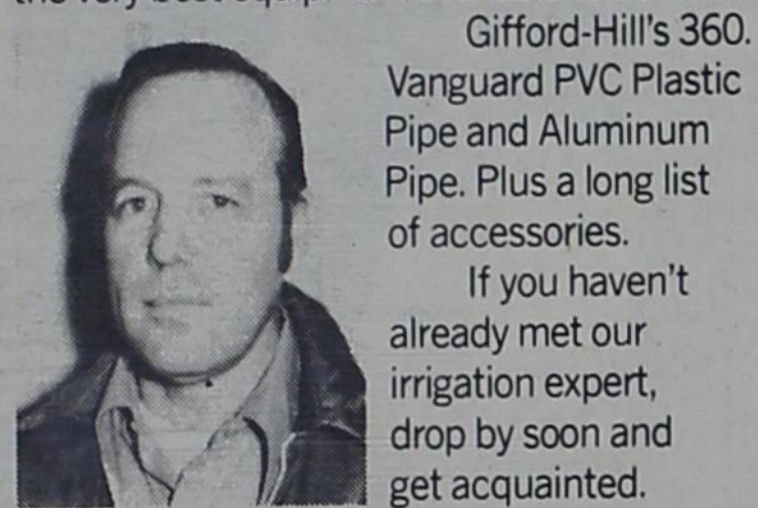

Mustangs Hope To Pick Up '73 Streak

The year of the "Skinny 20" is the theme of this year's edition of the Bovina Mustangs as 23 football candidates reported to the first week of drills.

The theme for the Ponies was adapted according to coach Roger Ezell because the Mustangs have a weight problem this season. Only two of the returning six lettermen weigh in at more than 170 pounds.

"We lost all of our size with graduation," Ezell stated. The former Bovina Mustang captain went on to remark that the Ponies didn't have much size last year either.

If the Mustangs can open the season on the same track that they finished the season the District 3-A campaign will be very interesting. Bovina dropped the first six games of the season last year, but came back to win the last four including a victory over highly touted Hart.

The Mustangs have a nucleus of six returning lettermen back this season which include two all-district and one honorable mention all-district players. Back to direct the Split-T offense is starting quarterback Dennis Willard. Willard was used primarily as a running signal-caller last season, but coach Ezell hopes that the Mustangs can throw the ball more this season.

Willard will have two seasoned veterans running in the backfield in fullback Ray Martinez, who gained all-district laurels last season and halfback Alton McCormick. McCormick, although plagued with injuries last season gained honorable mention all-league honors. The other halfback position will be manned by either Tommy DeLeon or Clint Cox. John Caldwell, Ruben Serna and Tommy Serna will get a shot at playing in the backfield.

The receiving department for the Mustangs will find DeLeon, who is rated the top receiver on the squad by Coach Ezell and Ken Sorley, who did a good job of catching the ball last season.

The interior of the offensive line lacks weight, but Coach Ezell hopes that this can be overcome by quickness and

aggressiveness. At tackles the Mustangs will throw Terry Schilling [160] and Steve Guest [170] with Joe Olvera [155] and Robert Tienda [160] getting some backup work.

Bovina has a pair of tough guards in returning lettermen Elbert Shelby (185) and Dana Harris (140). Wesley Cockerham (130) will relieve one of the guards and is counted on by the coaching staff to become a good football player.

The Mustangs return all-district center Rick Stanberry. Coach Ezell is very pleased with the attitude and spirit of the 23 football candidates, but is disappointed in the number of players that reported to drills. Coach Ezell feels that a few more players will come out

when school starts.

In rating the district, Coach Ezell selected Vega to repeat as district champions with Hart giving the defending champions a run for their money. Coach Ezell feels that if the Mustangs can get through the non-conference schedule without any major injuries, the Mustangs could prove to be spoilers and thinks that Bovina is a year away from championship caliber.

The Mustangs will get a chance to see how far they have developed when they host Lubbock Christian High at Bovina Friday for a scrimmage. The Ponies will also host a big, aggressive Clovis sophomore team August 30.

Bovina Man Killed In Pickup Accident

Funeral services were conducted in Laredo last week for Amado Salazar, 46, a resident of Bovina for the past 17 years. Salazar had been employed as a field man for Gateway Farms in Bovina for the past 10 years.

Salazar was pronounced dead on arrival last Tuesday at the Deaf Smith General Hospital, after the pickup Salazar was driving overturned about two miles west of Hereford.

It was reported by DPS officer Jimmy Humphries that the pickup blew a tire and ran off the road into the dividing area between the four lanes of highway on U.S. Highway 60. The truck overturned once

before coming to a stop. The accident occurred about 8 a.m. 2.9 miles west of Hereford. The truck was eastbound at the time of the blowout.

A passenger in the pickup, Alfred Medina, 15, underwent surgery at the Hereford hospital for head injuries, and was released. Another passenger, Juan Gutierrez, was treated for minor injuries.

Salazar was originally from San Ignacio. He was a Catholic. Survivors include his wife, Maria; six brothers, Jose and Roberto of Laredo; Cristobal and Baltazar of Coachella, Calif.; Juan of Los Angeles and Aristeo of Sanger, Calif.

Also surviving are a sister, Mrs. Jupita Alvarado of Alice.

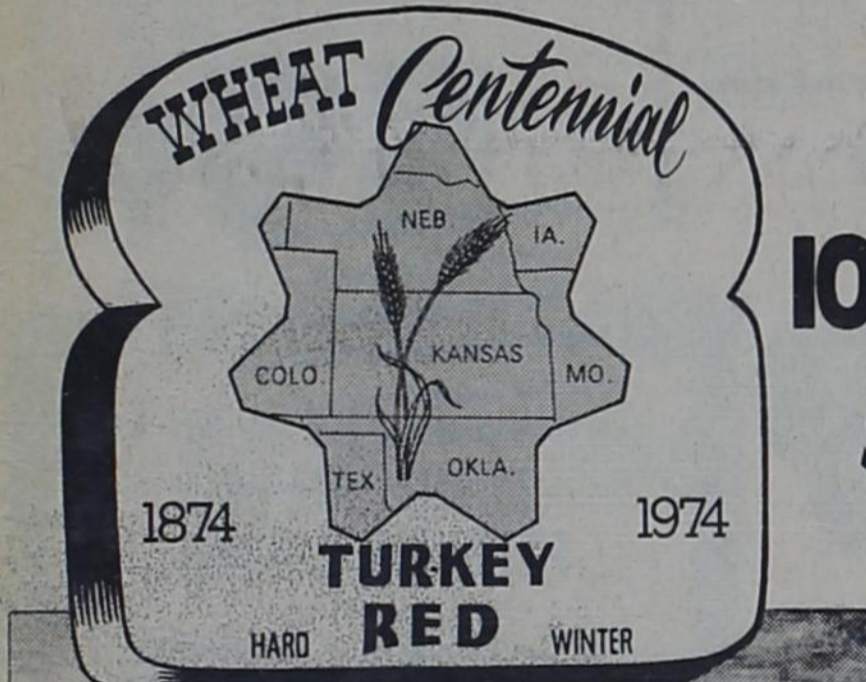
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Back in the 1870's when the Mennonites began their migration from Europe to America—Santa Fe was there! A representative of the railroad traveled abroad in those early days to influence homeseekers to settle along the pioneer rail routes being built westward across Kansas. The Mennonites were seeking freedoms of a new country and liked what they learned about America.

Santa Fe helped with their transportation, even chartering a special ship for the Atlantic crossing.

Santa Fe built special housing facilities in the settlement areas of Kansas and sold land, much below actual values, to the new homeseekers.

Santa Fe moved supplies for the home builders at reduced prices, sometimes for free.

Developing this new land back in the 1870's was not without hardships for the early Mennonites or for Santa Fe's pioneer rail builders. At that time, hardly anyone realized that their efforts would be rewarded through a few sacks of wheat seed which thrived in Kansas and spread to help make mid-America the breadbasket of the World.

100 years of moving wheat

Wheat is usually moved in a short period of time to meet harvest deadlines, export schedules and marketing requirements. These conditions make great demands on the railroads and it takes Santa Fe's modern facilities, an up-to-date car fleet and skillful employees to get the wheat job done year after year.

During the past century many things have been done to move wheat efficiently. Two examples stand out in Santa Fe's history:

- (1) The giant 100-ton covered hopper car first introduced for moving wheat in 1963. Today, Santa Fe has 12,000 of these cars in service, the largest fleet in the rail industry, and 1,000 additional are now on order. Altogether these 13,000 hoppers have a capacity equivalent to approximately 21,000 conventional box cars.
- (2) One of Santa Fe's greatest achievements in handling grain was completed earlier this year when we moved a record-breaking billion bushels, a total of 350,000 carloads, in just twenty months.

Those few sacks of seed of Turkey Red hard winter wheat carried to America by early Mennonite homeseekers started one of the greatest agricultural developments in the nation. It's a history the Santa Fe has been proud to be a part of the past 100 years—all the way!

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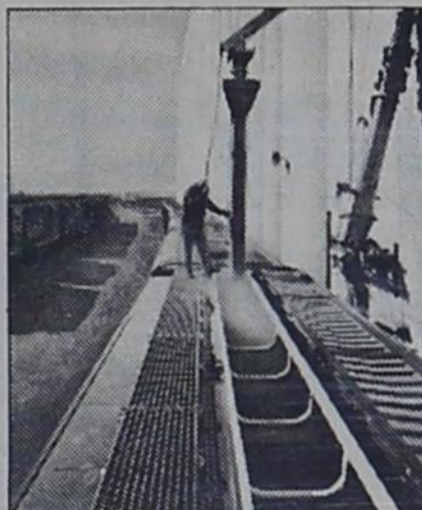
