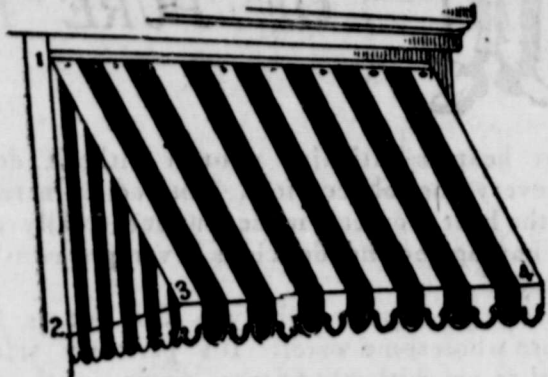

REVIVAL CLOSES.

Total of Sixteen Additions to Church in Three Weeks.

ROCHELLE ELECTION.

School Bond Election Carries—Pool Halls Voted Out.

A double election was held at Rochelle Saturday in which, although the voting was light, there was considerable interest manifested by the citizens of that progressive little city.

Five or six years ago a bond issue was voted for the erection of a school building and a special tax of 25 cents levied for interest and sinking fund. The bonds were to run a period of forty years, but with the 25 cent levy the bonds could be retired in something like ten years, so it was decided to reduce the levy for interest and sinking fund to 15 cents and use the remainder for a maintenance fund. The election Saturday was for the purpose of making this change, and the voters approved the proposition by a vote of 46 to 7.

The other proposition voted upon Saturday was whether or not pool halls should be prohibited in the Rochelle Common School District, resulting in a vote of 46 against the pool halls and 7 in favor of them. A pool hall was opened in Rochelle several months ago, but was closed by the proprietor about three weeks ago for lack of patronage.

Judicial Reform in Texas.

The University of Texas has just issued a bulletin dealing with the much-discussed issue of judicial reform. It does not pretend to be a solution, but does offer the following thoughtful articles as a contribution to the discussion: "Reforms in the Texas Judiciary," W. H. Kimbrough, Amarillo; "Procedural Reform in Texas," Rhodes S. Baker, Dallas; "Organization of the German Judiciary," Geo. C. Butte, Austin; and "A Proposed Constitutional Amendment." Since it is generally conceded that there will be presented to the next legislature a plan for the reorganization of the judiciary and the simplification of procedure, the matter contained in this bulletin will doubtless interest a large number of people in Texas. Tentative plans for this reform will be presented to the next meeting, June 12 and 13, of the University of Texas Law Department in Austin, Hon. Pat M. Neff of Waco, serving as chairman of the recommendatory committee. Members of the higher courts, whether members in the Association or not, as well as all citizens, are invited by President Kimbrough to take part in the meeting.

2ND. CROP IRISH POTATOES.

By G. M. Garren, Agronomist Extension Service and College.

It is a growing practice throughout the Southern States to grow a second or fall crop of Irish potatoes. The increasing popularity of the Irish potato as a staple article of diet and the ease with which this second crop can be kept through the winter commend to the Texas farmers the growing of a fall crop of Irish potatoes.

The second crop is usually planted on the same land where the first crop grew or where cucumbers or some other early truck crop grew. Many use seed from the first crop, but seed from other sources can be used. Use an early variety, Irish cobbler is one of the popular early varieties. It will require from 70 to 120 days to mature a crop, much depending on the amount of rainfall during the growing period. Plant to take advantage of the rainfall of the season. Some growers in Texas recommend June planting. Such early planting, it is claimed tends to overcome the seasonal disadvantages.

The greatest disadvantage to overcome is the lack of moisture. The planting and the cultivation of the fall crop will differ from the planting and the cultivation of the first crop only in the efforts necessary to overcome the handicap of a lack of moisture. Overcoming this handicap will be materially aided by:

1st. Sprouting the seed before planting. Place the seed on the ground in a shady place. Cover with straw or other coarse litter. Keep moist until sprouted. Plant before the sprouts are long enough to break off in handling. Sprouting the seed hastens early growth.

2nd. Plant and cultivate on the level. Level cultivation the better enables the grower to maintain a mulch to conserve his moisture. Plant about six inches deep on deeply prepared land and roll the soil in covering, if possible. If covered with a hoe, walking behind the hoe will serve the purpose of rolling the soil.

3rd. At all costs, maintain a good mulch. Success depends upon covering the moisture. Harrow frequently before planting and after planting until the potatoes come up. Then, if obtainable, cover the whole field with a mulch about three inches deep of straw or other coarse litter. Then all future cultivation will consist in hand pulling what few weeds may come through the mulch. If a litter mulch is unobtainable, a soil mulch will have to be depended upon.

Those who are interested in growing fall potatoes, but are not in a position to grow them on a field scale, should grow half a dozen rows or so in garden for home consumption. It would be easy to secure sufficient litter to mulch a few rows. In addition, growing a few rows in the garden will give that practical experience and skill that would later insure success in growing them on a larger scale.

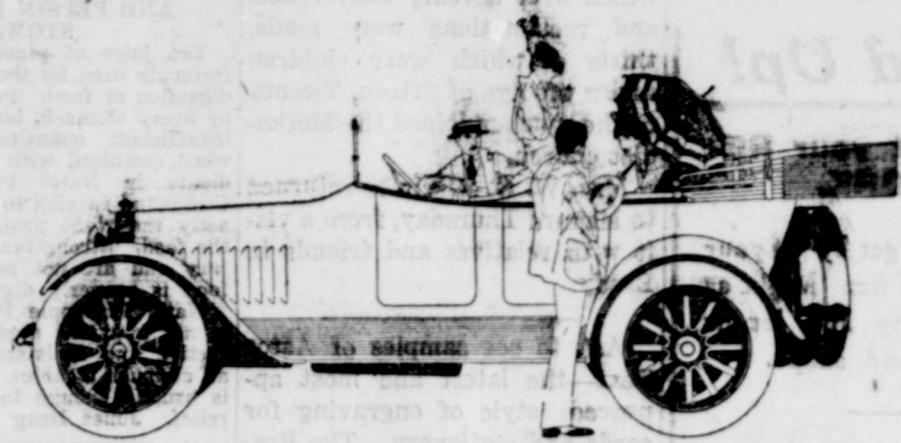

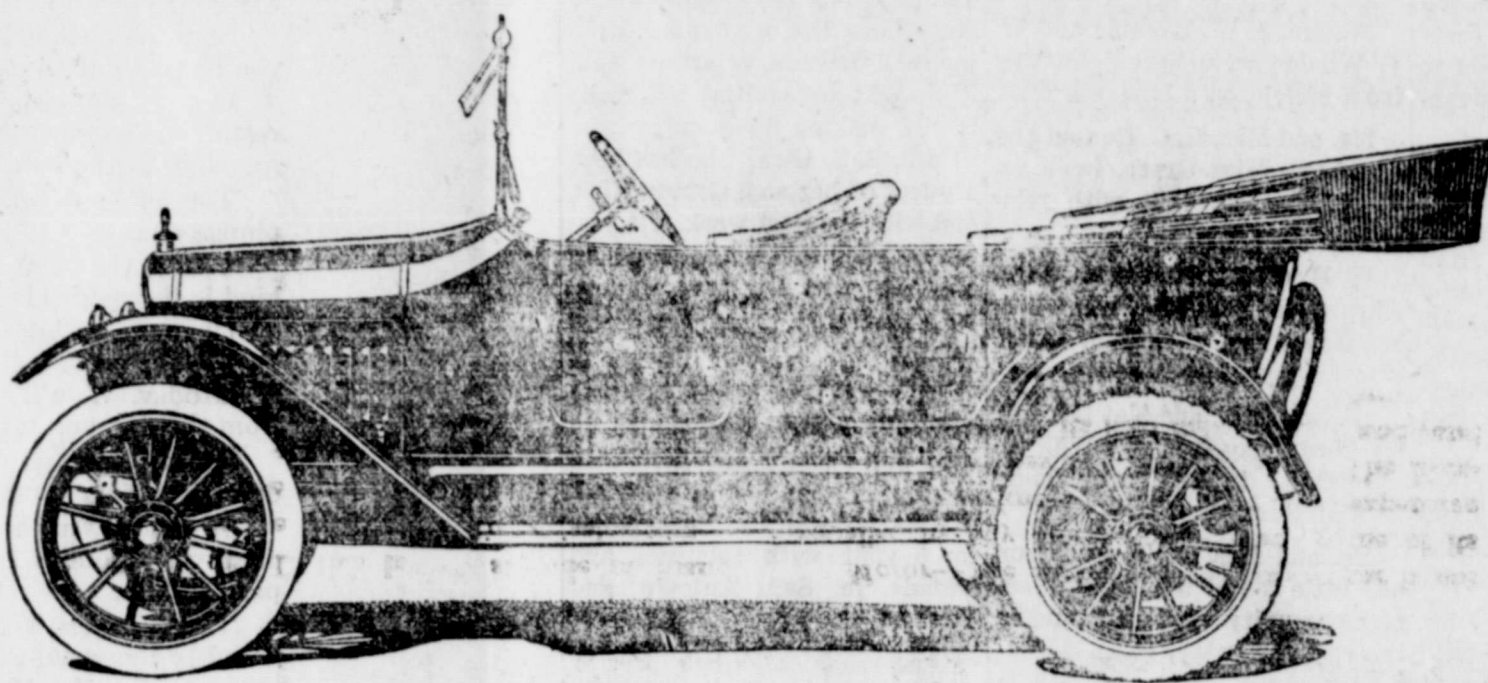
