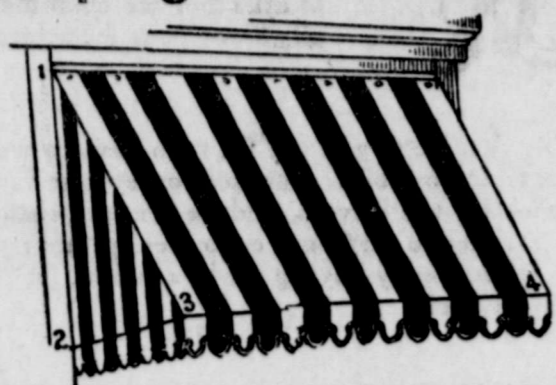

Another occasion that proved highly enjoyable to the visitors was a trip to Cloudercroft, N. M., on Thursday, where the day was spent in sightseeing. Upon returning to El Paso, a sumptuous banquet was served Thursday night by the Chamber of Commerce. During their stay, the editors made a trip over into Juarez and Mr. Sellers states that evidence of the war-ridden conditions of Mexico are to be seen on every hand in that city. It is extremely unsafe for Americans to go into Juarez at this time, and orders were received from Washington the day following the visit of the editors

MASON TO CELEBRATE.

Preparations Being Made for Entertainment July 3 and 4.

A Fourth of July celebration on the most extensive and elaborate scale ever attempted in this section is to be given by the progressive citizens of Mason, the festivities beginning on the morning of the 3rd. The Mason folks never do things by halves, and on this occasion they have sustained their reputation in this respect, as will be seen from the following item reprinted from last week's issue of the Mason News:

The grand 3rd and 4th of July celebration at Mason is going to be all that it is advertised to be. Practically everything has been arranged for owing to the early date of starting preparations. The citizens of Mason have tried themselves by endeavoring to make this event surpass everything in the way of a July 4th celebration ever pulled off in this section of Texas. The arrangement committee has been hard at work exerting every effort towards making this celebration one which will never be forgotten by the people attending. The leading features of this occasion which have already been arranged for with no possibility of failing through are: The music will be furnished by the Hoelzer's Military Band, consisting of twenty pieces and noted throughout the entire section to be the best brass band organization in central-west Texas. A contract has been closed with the North American Fireworks Company of St. Louis, Mo. (who conducted the fireworks display at the San Francisco World's Fair.) to supply us with a special firework program for the occasion. This display consists of 108 pieces highly colored and especially designed for the celebrating of Independence Day in an extensive and very appropriate manner. The big free barbecue on the second day is another big feature aside from the various other attractions which are very important but are considered minor in comparison with the above specials. Many of the most prominent speakers of the State will be present and at present the program committee is being flooded with letters from various candidates signifying their intentions of being here and desiring a place on the program. Aside from these there will be baseball games both days and other amusements which have not been completely arranged for. It is an assured fact that everyone attending this celebration will not have time to get that tired feeling which usually comes on such occasions. CONTRACT AWARDED

SAN ANTONIO MAN TO BUILD MASONIC TEMPLE.

G. A. Schoffenfeld's Bid of \$13,600 Accepted at a Meeting Held Saturday Night.

At a meeting of the Masonic bodies of Brady on Saturday night, bids for the erection of the Masonic temple to be built by the fraternity were opened and canvassed, and the contract awarded to G. A. Schoffenfeld of San Antonio on his bid of \$13,600.

The new temple will be 32½ x 90 feet, three stories in height, of modern fire-proof construction throughout, the walls being of re-inforced concrete with brick veneer, and all floors and stairways of concrete, the only wood to be used in the entire building being the door and window frames. The first floor of the building will be leased for mercantile purposes, while a tentative contract has been made with the West Texas Telephone Co. for occupancy of the second floor with their offices and exchange, and this floor will be designed and finished with a view to the greatest convenience and efficiency for the tenant.

The lodge will occupy the third floor of the building which will be cut up into several rooms. The main lodge room will be of ample size to comfortably seat at least two hundred persons. There will also be four paraffin rooms on this floor, as well as a large kitchenette and a lounging and reading room. New furnishings throughout are to be installed, and when completed the lodge will have the most elaborate quarters to be found anywhere in this section of the State.

The contract for the new building calls for completion in one hundred working days, and it is expected that the actual work of construction will begin some time in the early part of the coming week. Ralph H. Cameron of San Antonio is the architect and he will be here most of the time during the erection of the building to supervise the work. Messrs. W. B. McKenzie, Sam McCollum and J. B. Granville of the Blue lodge and J. H. White, S. W. Moffatt and L. A. Williams, representing the Royal Arch chapter, constitute the local building committee who will look after the details of construction for the local Masonic bodies.

An architect's drawing of the temple is on display in the show window of the Central Drug store, and has been the center of attraction for the past several days, and the subject of much favorable comment by all who have seen it.

COLQUITT SPEAKS HERE.

Addresses Voters in Interest of Candidacy for Senate.

O. B. Colquitt addressed the voters here Saturday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock in the district court room in the interest of his candidacy for United States Senator, and was greeted by a crowd which taxed the seating capacity of the big court room.

Mr. Colquitt arrived in the city Saturday morning at 9:00 o'clock over the Frisco and was met at the union station by a number of his local friends and supporters and conducted to his hotel. The remainder of the morning was spent in meeting the business men of the city, as well as a large number of farmers who had come in to hear Mr. Colquitt's address.

County Attorney C. C. House, in a neat speech, introduced the speaker, whose address was along the same lines as delivered throughout his campaign over the State.

Mr. Colquitt left on the north bound Frisco at 8:00 o'clock for Brownwood and thence west for a tour of the western counties of the State.

Cattle Shipments.

S. E. McKnight was here Saturday and Sunday from his Eldorado ranch to superintend the shipment of a bunch of cattle from his ranch in the Lohn valley to the Fort Worth market.

In the lot shipped by Mr. McKnight was the famous "Old Timer," a 6-year-old Hereford steer. This animal was raised by Mr. McKnight and is noted throughout this section for his immense size and for the unusually large horns which adorn his head. His weight is given at 1800 pounds and the distance from tip to tip of his horns measures about 4½ feet. The head will be reserved by Mr. McKnight, who will have it mounted by a taxidermist.

The animal was exhibited on the public square here late Saturday afternoon and attracted quite a crowd of spectators.

BRADY DEFEATS NINE.

Ball Game Saturday Results in 7-0 Victory for Locals.

In a well played game here Saturday afternoon the local ball team defeated the Nine team by a one-sided score of 7 to 0. Morris pitched the first five innings for the locals and never allowed a man to advance farther than second and struck out eleven of the sturdy Nine sluggers. He was relieved in the sixth by Jack Wigginton, and the visitors succeeded in filling the bases in this inning, but were retired unless when he succeeded in locating the plate.

Scales for the visitors pitched an excellent game, allowing only six hits, but they came at a time when hits meant runs, while his teammates were unable to bunch hits off Morris or Wigginton at the opportune time.

Manager Moore announces two games for this week—the first, tomorrow afternoon, when Brady's old-time base ball rivals from Fife will be here. Thursday afternoon Melvin will be the attraction. Both these teams are in excellent trim and a battle royal is anticipated. Moore will likely pitch one of the games for the locals, while either Morris or Wigginton will be on the mound in the other exhibition. Both games will be called at 4 o'clock, and an admission fee of 25 cents will be charged.

Campbell, Jessie M. Abbott, and
George L. Abbott, herein styled de-
fendants, all reside in Tarrant Coun-
ty, Texas.

Plaintiff says that on the 26th day
of October 1915, the defendants, S. W.
Campbell and Jessie M. Abbott, made,
executed and delivered to this plain-
tiff their certain promissory note, for
the sum of \$250.00, bearing date on
the day and year aforesaid, payable
to the order of plaintiff in Fort Worth
and Brady, Texas, said note being
due October 26, 1915, and bearing in-
terest at the rate of 10 per cent per
annum from date until paid and pro-
viding for ten per cent, additional on
the amount of the principal and interest
as Attorney fees, if placed in the
hands of an attorney for collection
or suit is brought on the same, where-
by defendants became liable and
bound to pay plaintiff the said sum
together with interest and attorney
fees so specified in said note, accord-
ing to the tenor and effect thereof.

That at the time of the making,
executing and delivering of said note
by defendants to plaintiff, the defend-
ants, S. W. Campbell and Jessie M.
Abbott, also made, executed and deliv-
ered their certain chattel mortgage
lien to this plaintiff, to secure the

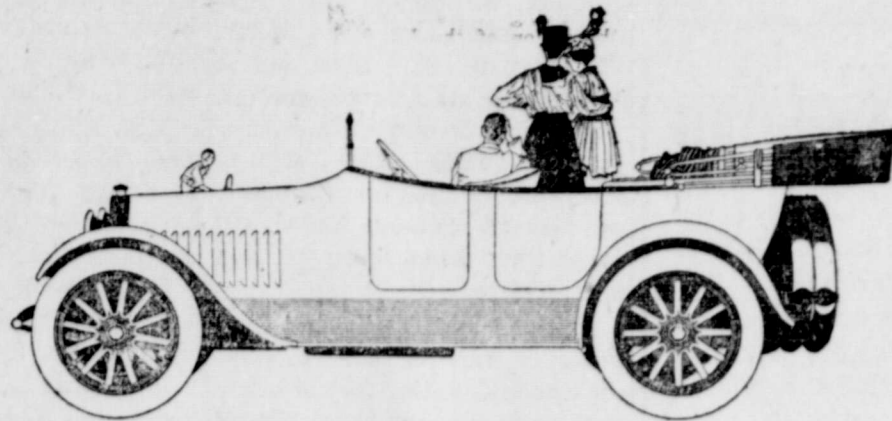
City Board Meets.

The city board of equalization, composed of Messrs. W. N. White, E. L. Jones and Roy Wilkerson, convened yesterday morning to go over the renditions for 1916 taxes as made to City Secretary Firman Jackson.

Under the plan adopted by the board, a uniform increase in valuations from 60 cents to 90 cents on the dollar is being made. This will bring the assessed valuation from \$1,500,000 in 1915 to approximately \$2,250,000 for the current year. At first thought, this looks like a considerable jump, but in reality will only amount to an increase of 10 cents on the \$100 valuation in taxes, as the tax rate will be lowered from 65 cents to 50 cents.

This plan was worked out by Mayor Sheridan and the city council after a great deal of time and thought spent in an effort to evolve some plan whereby the general revenue of the city could be increased sufficiently to take care of the expenses of the city government, and is considered a most admirable solution of the matter. Under the levy of previous years, more than enough funds have been collected than was necessary to create interest and sinking funds for outstanding bond issues and not enough was collected for the general fund, although the levy for this fund was 25 cents—the limit allowed by law. By increasing the valuations and lowering the levy for

TO FACE TRIAL.

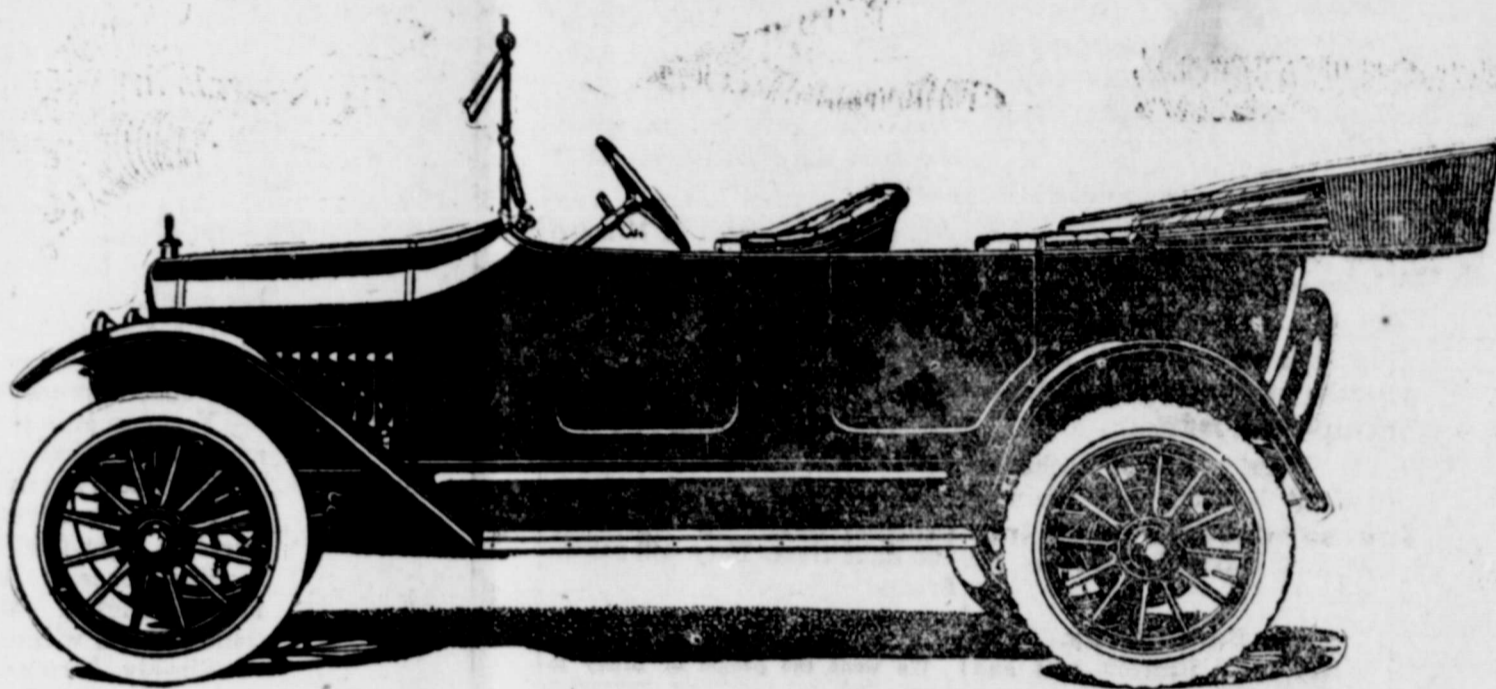
