### BIG DAMAGE SUIT.

Filed Last Week in San Saba County.

As an aftermath of the good roads contract in San Saba county was filed in the district court last Saturday.

The suit is brought by the Bexar Construction Company of San Antonio against the Shelton Construction Company to recover alleged damages amounting to \$110,000.

Horace H. Shelton and H. L. Montandón are named as principals, and the Commissioners Court and County Judge of San Saba county are made parties to the suit.

The Bexar Construction Company allege that the employed Horace H. Shelton came to San Saba county and secure the road contracts in his own name, with the understanding that he was to assign the same to them, but that after securing the contracts he refused to transfer them as agreed, and has appropriated all net profits to his own use and benefit, and the plaintiff seeks to recover actual and exemplary damages to the amount of \$110,000.

The Shelton Construction Company, with Horace H. Shelton as president and controlling stock holder, was organized and chartered about two months ago with a capital stock of \$10,000, one half of which has been paid in. The \$75,000 contract recent-

ly awarded by the commissioners was obtained by the company, and it is in charge of the road improvement now in progress.

Walters & Baker and Rector & Rector have been retained by the Bexar Construction Co. Flack & Flack will represent the Shelton Construction Co., and County Attorney A. B. Wilson will defend the county's interests.

Mr. Shelton, when interviewed by a Star reporter, expressed perfect confidence as to the outcome of the suit. He says all his dealings with this county are open and above board, being matters of record accessible to everyone, and that the county has received full value for every dollar expended. Further than that he had no statement to give out for publication at this time, as the allegations upon which the suit is based will be thoroughly threshed out when it comes up for trial.

Owing to the wide interest throughout the county on the question of good roads, and the diversity of opinion on the method that has been adopted to secure them, this suit and its final outcome will no doubt attract a great deal of attention.—San Saba Star.

The bereaved relatives as well as Miss Lillie Brown, who had made her home with Mr. and Mrs. Cottle since early childhood, and their immediate friends have the sympathy of the entire community in their bereavement.—Rochelle Record.

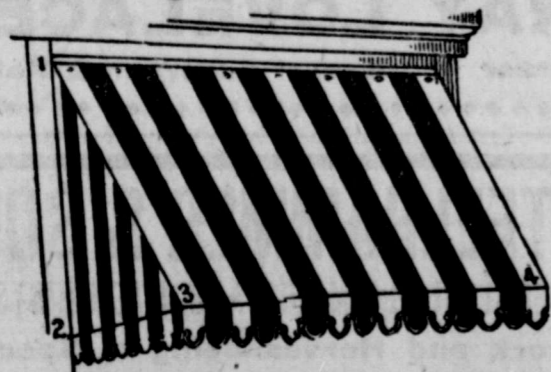

## SAN SABA'S EXAMPLE.

Sometimes we can profit by  
the example of another.

Sometimes we are encouraged  
to do a thing because someone  
else has blazed the way.

The improvement of the Brady  
public square has occupied  
more or less thought and study  
for a year or two now, but nothing  
has been done.

Let us look to our neighbor,  
San Saba—for San Saba has  
taken the bull by the horns, so  
to speak, and has settled the  
question of court house square  
improvement once for all. And,  
inasmuch as San Saba's problem  
is a parallel of that of Brady's,  
we may find guidance in the ac-  
tion of our neighbor city.

The San Saba Star reports  
the action of the commissioners  
court as follows:

"The second order, which is  
even more important, is one  
whereby the lawn and square  
will be beautified and improved.  
The fence is to be taken away,  
and the area increased by mov-  
ing its boundaries out fifteen  
feet on each side. A concrete  
curbing and sidewalk will be  
built surrounding this, along  
which a gutter will be placed,  
and the lawn crowned and sloped  
so as to drain perfectly. The  
street about the Court House  
will be macadamized, and steps  
will be taken to insure perfect  
 upkeep."

Had the foregoing action ap-  
plied to McCulloch county in-  
stead of to San Saba, nothing  
could have been more appropri-  
ate. To remove the fence and  
the hitch rack, to extend the  
square, to surround it with ce-  
mentment walk and curbing, and  
to crown and slope the lawn to  
afford drainage is just the ac-  
tion that is needed to improve  
the court house square here.  
The city stands ready to provide  
a market place and to macadam-  
ize the square.

It seems that the time should  
be ripe for co-operation in this  
move for a "city beautiful."

## THE AUTOMOBILE.

The automobile registration  
books of the county show that  
1916 has been a good year for  
the auto dealers. To last Satur-  
day 62 new cars had been regis-  
tered with Clerk Ellis, the total  
number now being 289.—San  
Saba News.

No doubt the News feels jus-  
tifiable pride in the record made  
in San Saba county the past  
year. When 62 cars have been  
bought and paid for, it means  
a whole lot of money turned

loose in the county, and that  
amount of money turned loose  
for automobiles evidently means  
prosperity throughout the coun-  
ty. How much more pride, then,  
may McCulloch county citizens  
take in the record made in this  
county. Since January 1st of  
this year, 128 cars have been  
registered, and up to June 20,  
1916, the total number of cars  
registered with County Clerk  
Yantis was 502. At a corre-  
sponding period last year the  
number totaled 306 cars, show-  
ing a gain in twelve months'  
time of 196. It would be a very  
safe and conservative estimate  
to put the average amount paid  
for the cars at \$500. Use your  
little pad and pencil and figure  
out for yourself the amount of  
money expended the past year  
for automobiles, and you will be  
forced to the conclusion that  
McCulloch county is "some"  
prosperous.

—there is published a paper, the  
Signal. The editor of said paper

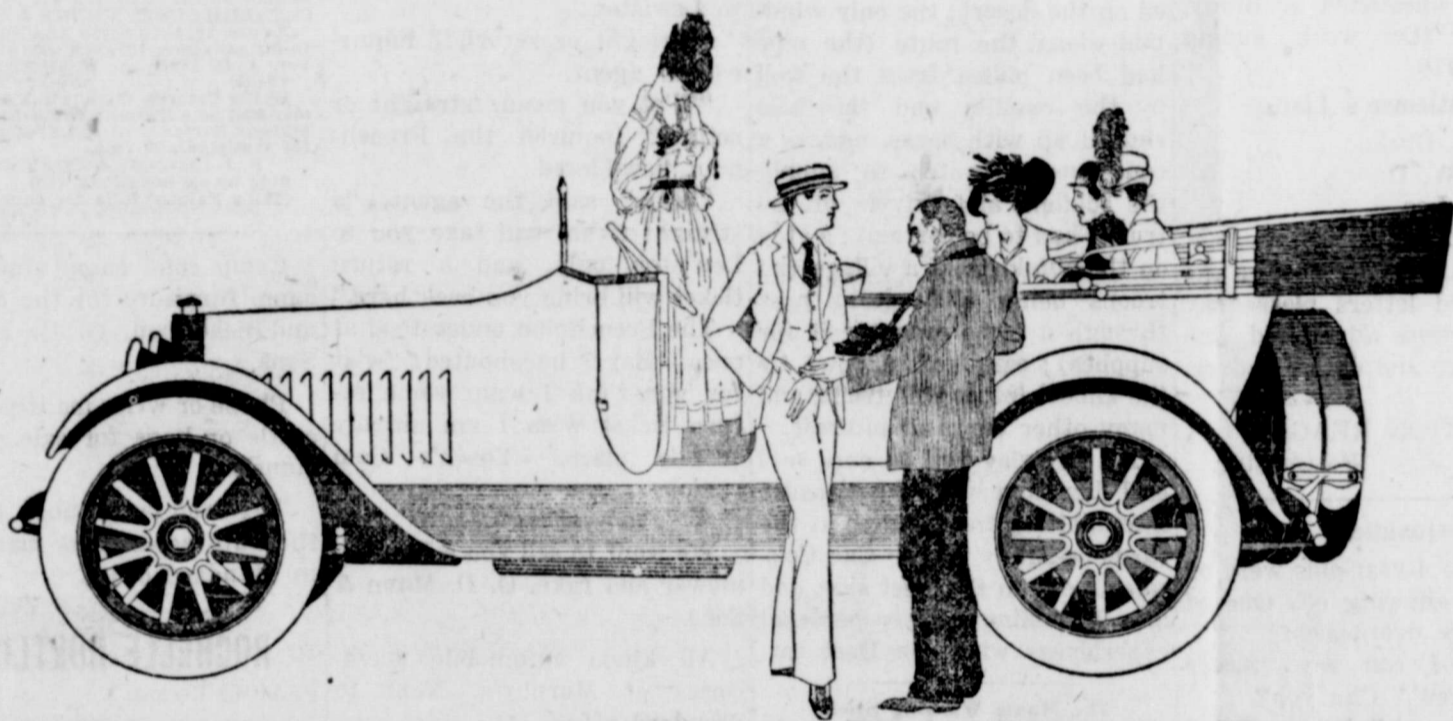

### SAN SABA SAYINGS

From The News.

The confederate reunion at Goldthwaite is announced for July 12, 13 and 14 and the unveiling of the Confederate monument will be on Thursday, and Hon. Pat Neff of Waco will be the orator for the unveiling ceremonies.

At the meeting of the fair directors Tuesday morning, Saturday, July 15, was set as the day for selling the privileges for the annual fair and encampment to be held August 8 to 11. The fair directors are now meeting regularly every week and working hard on the details for the coming fair and encampment.

From the Star.

The hum of progress and improvement in San Saba town and county has been steadily increasing day by day. During the past week the Commissioners' Court passed two most important orders, appropriating about \$3,000 to be expended in laying a new tile floor in the court house, and improving and beautifying the lawn, and square.

The second order, which is even more important, is one whereby the lawn and square will be beautified and improved. The fence it to be taken away, and the area increased by moving its boundaries out fifteen feet on each side. A concrete curbing and sidewalk will be built surrounding this, along which a gutter will be placed, and the lawn crowned and sloped so as to drain perfectly. The street about the Court House will be macadamized, and steps will be taken to insure perfect upkeep.

Mr. M. H. Corker, one of San Saba's oldest and most prominent citizens, died Friday morning, June 10th, after a brief illness.

Mrs. E. A. Hunt, wife of Noah A. Hunt, died suddenly Wednesday night from heart failure. While subject to heart spells, she was feeling well on retiring but when the electric and rain storm, accompanied by such high wind, commenced blowing she arose and went to the window to see the extent of the storm. Remarking that her head ached she fell to the floor dead. It is the opinion of physicians that the excitement and fear of the approaching storm overtaxed her already weakened heart to such an extent that it was no longer able to perform its function.

The city of San Saba is not to be left behind in the campaign for better roads and highways throughout the county. City Marshal Dave Chadwick has had a force of hands at work the past week putting in a cement bridge on the branch which crosses Wallace street near the residence of A. R. Dockray. This is a timely improvement,

as the sipey draw at this place stands in water for several weeks following each rain, making a very muddy and inconvenient crossing. Since the improvement of the Brady road, it was the worst place between San Saba and Richland Springs, and being within the city limits, was the subject of adverse comment by the traveling public. It will also be a convenience to citizens residing in the western portion of the city, as they have heretofore had to use a frail foot bridge to cross the branch in wet weather.

### INTERESTING EXHIBIT.

**Dort Expert with Truck Trains in Mexico.**

T. G. Duncan, Dort expert, is in the city representing the Frawler Motor Co. of Dallas. Mr. Duncan was one of the members of the truck train which drove from Columbus, N. M. to Namiquipa, Mexico, the headquarters of Gen. Pershing's arm of bandit chasers, in a demonstration before government experts of various motor cars. Mr. Duncan drove one of the two Dort cars in the train of 56 trucks, both cars reaching Namiquipa with a perfect score. This was a remarkable demonstration of the serviceability of the Dort truck, inasmuch as only 17 of the 56 trucks scored perfect.

Mr. Duncan talks very interestingly of the trip of the truck train, and has a large number of photographs taken enroute. The drivers of the cars were the only civilians permitted to enter the zone of army operations, and while enroute had several skirmishes with Mexican bandits, shots being fired at the train from ambushes. The route lay over a trackless waste, and the trucks were forced over rocks and boulders and gullies, with the result that a large percent of the cars were incapacitated for service by reason of broken wheels and like accidents. The Dorts, however, were among the cars that came up o. k., and thereby reflected credit upon their manufacturers, and also upon the skill of the drivers.

The photos show various scenes including soldiers camped on the desert; the only windmill along the route (the pipe had been pulled from the well by the bandits and the hole choked up with rocks, and as a consequence, water to supply the soldiers and drivers of the trucks had to be carried); a stop on the outskirts of a village (no troops being allowed to pass through a town or enter it for supplies); cars broken down by the almost impassible trails, and many other views of interest.
