#### GOOD RAIN IN BRADY.

Three-Quarters Inch Downpour Yesterday Afternoon.

A good rain fell in Brady yesterday afternoon about 5:30 o'clock, continuing for about an hour and a half. A total precipitation of .75 inches was recorded. While the rain was sufficient to thoroughly settle the dust, re-establish the lake on the square, and generally cool the atmosphere, it does not seem to have been of great extent. The West Texas Telephone Co. reports a big rain at Menard, a good rain at Melvin, light rain at Rochelle and Mason, and no rain at Eden, Lohn or Brownwood.

Another half-inch rain was had in Brady and vicinity this morning commencing at 11:00 o'clock, making a total of 1 1/4 inches rainfall since yesterday.

#### RE-UNION GREAT EVENT

IMMENSE CROWDS ANTICIPATED BY COMMITTEE.

Ample Plans Being Made for Entertainment—Program Includes Various Features.

But little remains to be done in the working out of the details for the care and entertainment of the immense crowds expected here for the big U. C. V. reunion, August 2, 3 and 4th. The reunion has been widely advertised, both through the various U. C. V. camps, and by the local advertising committee. Circulars have been sent to neighboring points within a radius of a hundred miles or more, as well as having been distributed throughout the county. Advance information indicates that there will be an immense gathering of veterans and friends, and that all will join in making this one of the greatest events in Brady history.

For the first day's entertainment, an auto ride over the city and neighboring points has been planned, and at night the Boy Scouts will give a drill. The second day will be given over to the Daughters of the Confederacy who have arranged a play for both afternoon and night. A business session will occupy the afternoon of the third day, while a smoker will be tendered the visitors that night in the Syndicate building.

As before stated, ample funds have been secured for the entertainment of the visitors and nothing will be left undone for their pleasure. The barbecue promises to be a notable affair, and lavish preparations are being made for this particular

event. The splendid rain which has fallen in Brady will go a long way toward getting the grounds packed down and in good shape, and should another rain be had during the next week, conditions that are almost ideal will be assured for the reunion.
