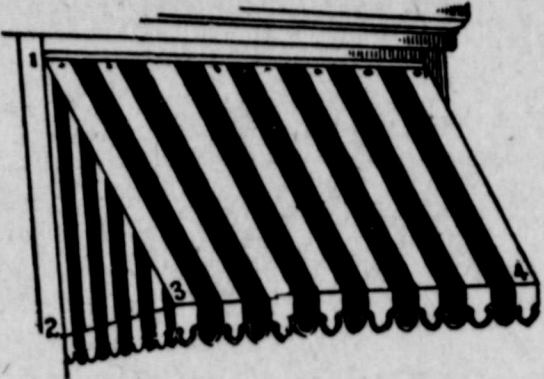

## MOUNTAIN REMNANTS C. V.

A Brief History of Brigade from Organization in 1886 at Johnson City, Texas, to Present Date---Ninety Charter Members

Through the courtesy of L. Ballou, Adjutant General and Chief of Staff of the Mountain Remnant Brigade, U. C. V., we are enabled to present the following brief history of that body, the same having been prepared by Adjutant General A. F. Hicks of Marble Falls, Texas:

On September 3, 1886, pursuant to call, the ex-Confederates met at Johnson City, Blanco county, Texas, and Joseph Bird was called to the chair; J. G. Baldwin was made secretary and ninety-six names were enrolled. On motion, they went

into permanent organization, Joseph Bird being made president, J. J. Adams, vice president; J. G. Baldwin, secretary; R. B. Maddox, treasurer.

Round Mountain was chosen as the meeting place for 1887, and on July 14, 15 and 16, there was a large gathering of veterans and their families. At roll call, one hundred responded. Constitution and By-Laws were adopted at this meeting, and the name of the organization was decided, "The Mountain Remnants of Ex-Confederates." The following officers were elected: Commander, J. D. Harrison, Willow City, Gillespie county; Major, Jas. Bird, Round Mountain, Blanco county; Adjutant, J. G. Baldwin, Blanco, Blanco county; Quartermaster, A. W. Cox, Blanco, Blanco county.

In 1888 the Mountain Remnants C. V. met at Blanco, and a most enjoyable time is recorded.

## COMING TO BRADY.

Odd Fellows and Rebekah Association to Meet Here in 1917.  
Brady was chosen as the next meeting place of the Central West Texas I. O. O. F. and Rebekah association which closed its annual session at Bangs last Thursday, and one of the greatest meetings of the association is being looked forward to the last Wednesday in July, 1917.

The Central West Texas I. O. F. and Rebekah association is composed of McCulloch, Concho, Coleman, Brown and Comanche counties. While all the past meetings have been very successful and well attended, President Hodges is already laying his plans for the biggest meeting ever held in the association. He expects to secure the famous I. O. O. F. band from the Odd Fellows' Orphans home at Corsicana for the occasion. This band will play at San Saba this year, is composed of sixteen pieces, and is considered one of the best bands in the state. All grand lodge officers are also to be invited and Mr. Hodges is confident practically all of them will be on hand, several having already given their promise. ## CHAMPIONSHIP GAMES BETWEEN BRADY AND FREDERICKSBURG.

Two Strongest Teams in This Section to Cross Bats During Confederate Reunion.

In their desire to give the visitors to the reunion the best exhibition of ball players ever witnessed on the local diamond, the Brady ball club has matched a series of three games during the three days of the reunion with the Fredericksburg ball team.

That this series will be one of the hardest fought and best played set of games ever played on the local grounds must be conceded by all. The Brady ball team has been playing a class of ball that has won them the reputation of an all-star team. They have walloped practically every team with whom they have crossed bats. They have fielded, batted and run bases like professionals. But one team has held their own with them and that has been the Fredericksburg bunch. In the first series of games played on the local grounds Fredericksburg won one and Brady two, all of the games being close, well-played and hotly contested. In the second series at Fredericksburg that team claimed all three of the games, the second being a 13-inning game, and the third being a no-hit game on either side up to the beginning of the ninth inning.

The Brady boys are confident they can beat Fredericksburg, and the Fritztown boys are going to give them a run for their money. The Brady team has been put to a great expense to match this series, and the Brady citizens appreciate this fact to the extent that record-breaking attendance is assured.

While the Brady boys have had two of their best players, H. Tipton and Jack Wigginton, out of the game on account of injuries received, the team has been made strong as ever by the addition to two new players—the famous Henry Baldrige of Fife, who will be on the mound in the first game, and his catcher, Irish McCleary. Spiller and Ransom will work as pitchers for Brady during the last two games, and Lee, Fredericksburg's crack pitcher, is expected to heave the horsehide in the first and last games of the series for that team.

A grand stand has been provided at the ball park, the ground has been rolled and gotten in good shape and everyone should attend the games. Admission will be only 25c.

## DISTRICT FARMERS UNION.

Met Here Wednesday, Thursday and Friday Last Week.  
The Pecan Valley District Farmers Union No. 26 met in Brady on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of last week, and while the attendance was not as large as was expected, there was a good representation on hand, and considerable business was transacted. The district is composed of eleven counties, including Coke, Brown, Coleman, Runnels, Tom Green, Concho, Menard, Mason, McCulloch, Comanche and San Saba.

A feature of the convention was the auto ride over the city tendered the delegates on Friday by the Brady Y. M. B. L. The convention adjourned on Friday, no place of meeting for the coming year having been decided upon, although Sweetwater was tentatively agreed upon.

The following set of resolutions were adopted by the convention:

**Resolution No. 1.**  
Whereas, Great Britain has not only trampled on the rights of the Southern farmers since the beginning of the European war by interfering with our shipments of cotton and other farm products, but has also trampled on the rights of the citizens of the United States by seizing and interfering with private mails written by our citizens to correspondents in foreign lands, and written by correspondents abroad to our citizens;

Whereas, President Wilson has sent a vigorous note of protest to Great Britain on the subject of her interference with our mails, but Great Britain continues to interfere with our mail and our rights at any time she sees fit, and

Whereas, the enterprising German people have launched upon the world another wonder in the way of a submarine merchant marine, the first ship of which, the Deutschland, has safely reached the port of Baltimore with a cargo of dyes which will be of great benefit to our farmers, as well as others; and

Whereas, if our mails are carried in a submarine merchant steamer, it is about the only way they will be free from seizure and interference from England and other nations; so,

Be it Resolved by the Pecan Valley District Farmers Union, in regular session at Brady, Texas, that we vigorously condemn the action of Great Britain in interfering with our shipments of cotton and our mails, and which interference has so far cost the farmers of the South a loss of a billion of dollars, and be it further

Resolved, that we commend the action of President Wilson in calling Great Britain to time for this unwarranted interference with our rights, and we urge that President Wilson send another note to Great Britain demanding that we be permitted to ship our cotton to our customers anywhere in the world; and be it further

Resolved, that we ask and urge that our United States government make a contract for carrying our mails with the German submarine line of steamers, so that said mails cannot longer be interfered with by England or any other nation, and that the contract continue in force until the United States makes England behave herself, and respect our rights. Be it further
