Residence of W. H. Harris Damaged Last Week.

During the thunder storm the early part of last week lightning struck the residence of W. H. Harris in East Brady and unroofed part of the building. The family was at the dinner table when the crash came, and the lightning flashed all about them. A daughter who was sitting in a window was shocked about the face, another daughter from the knees down, showing that lightning passed under the table, while Mrs. Harris was shocked from the elbows down. LOSE HIGHWAY?

San Antonio, to judge by a recent article in the San Antonio Express, is on needles and pins lest she lose her place on the Puget Sound to the Gulf National highways. The anxiety has arisen over the fact that Austin and Galveston are making a strong bid for the route by reason of the fact that the highways connecting these two points are in good shape, while it is contended that roads below San Antonio in the Corpus Christi section are quite bad. San Antonio is up in arms and has called upon Corpus Christi to assist in remedying the defect. The Express even goes so far as to suggest that if Corpus can not be aroused to the urgent need of road improvement, then the Bexar county good roads association must undertake the task, and points out the great importance of maintaining the highway through San Antonio for the reason of the great amount of travel that will follow the route. In addition, it points to the fact that eventually the highway will be taken over and maintained by the National government.

The importance attached to the National highway should not be overlooked nor underestimated by the citizens of Brady and McCulloch county. Not only would the resultant tourist travel greatly benefit this section, but the citizens themselves would gain advantage from good roads, and the ultimate maintenance of the roads by the U. S. government is a factor that should prompt extraordinary efforts. Brady must maintain her place on the National highway at all hazards.

Let all citizens arouse to the importance of this matter, and let a big and enthusiastic delegation of citizens go to Austin on September 6th to urge Brady's claim to recognition as one of the main stops on this highway.

ROCHELLE'S PAPER.

The Rochelle Record last week completed the seventh cycle of its life, and from the opinion expressed by Editor Haddow the future looks anything but bright for that paper. Editor Haddow expresses doubt as to whether the paper will be issued again, because of the fact that increased costs of paper, ink and material and indifferent patronage have proved the combination that even grit and determination are unable to withstand. These

are troublous times for the newspapers, and Editor Haddow seems to be having his full share of woes.

RESIDENCES NEEDED.

Never was there a greater demand for residences in Brady than at the present time. Quite a number of families are inconveniently quartered just now because they are unable to secure a residence of any kind whatever. Many other families who desire to move here from less favored sections are deterred because of the scarcity of residences.

While quite a number of new homes have been built the past several months, and more are under construction, practically all have been occupied by the builder himself. There is a great demand for neat and modern rent houses, and idle capital could be employed to good advantage in meeting this demand.

WARNING.

Already fakers are busy in several states swindling farmers through the new rural credit law. This law requires the organization of national farm loan association to enable the members to borrow money. Fakers are going through rural communities collecting money from farmers on the pretense of organizing these associations. There is an axiom about giving money to strangers that will do to remember.—The Brownwood News.

The reading public has been warned of this fraudulent practice. It is up to those who have been warned to extend the courtesy to persons who do not make a practice of reading newspapers.—Temple Telegram.

Another shower fell in Brady Sunday afternoon, cooling the atmosphere and settling the dust. The showers of late appear to be as persistent as are the torrid waves that precede and sooner or later follow them.

New Orleans newspapers have discontinued all free papers to advertisers, advertising agents, public and charitable institutions, officials and others. This move has been taken to meet the requirements of the situation growing out of the shortage of white paper. New York, Brooklyn, Philadelphia and other cities have taken drastic steps to curtail consumption of white paper. Atlanta and St. Louis have raised the sale price of the papers. Some papers are raising advertising rates. All must change former practice of giving papers away.—Temple Telegram.

Arrested for Cattle Theft. Emmett Phillips was arrested last Thursday night charged with the theft of thirteen head of steers. The complaint was filed by Virgil McCoy of the Cherokee community, who claims that the cattle belong to Dr. Behrens and himself.

Phillips was released on bond pending examining trial, which was held Wednesday afternoon before Justice U. T. Chamberlain. After hearing evidence of complainants, the court fixed his bond at \$2,000. W. J. Moore and P. H. Walker signed as sureties, and the case now awaits action of the grand jury.

Young Phillips contends that he bought the cattle and has had them in a pasture adjoining that of McCoy & Behrens for the past eighteen months. He has heretofore borne an excellent reputation and his friends feel confident that he will have no difficulty in proving his innocence.—San Saba Star.

The cotton was picked from his field on the old Myres ranch a few miles south of town and loaded on a wagon and brought at once to Rochelle to be ginned. The Williamson gin ginned it. The load of seed cotton weighed 1530 pounds and ginned a 521 pound bale of good lint, and which the Sellman Merc. Co. purchased at 15c per pound. A premium of \$13.25 was made up by a number of the business men of the town.

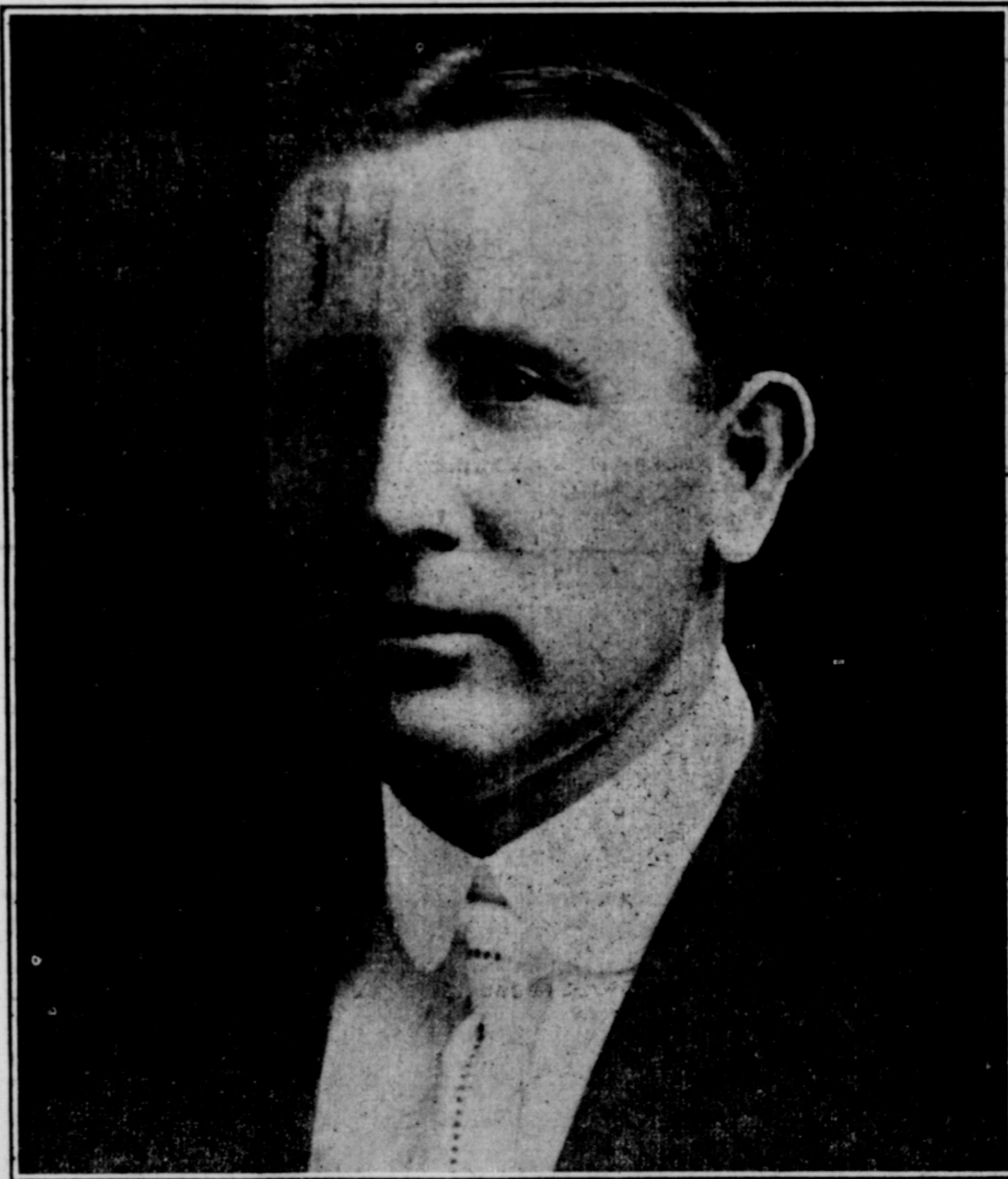
