### LOG NEW ROUTE.

T. P. Grant and Irvine Hurd Go to Wichita Falls.

T. P. Grant, accompanied by Irvine Hurd, left this morning enroute to Wichita Falls via Lohn, Waldrip and Coleman to log the road from Brady to the latter city. The new project is declared by Mr. Grant to be the best that has yet been presented to Brady, and, if the route is adopted, it will place this city on the great Meridian highway. The Meridian highway at present runs from Canada thru Wichita, Kan., to Wichita Falls, Texas, then curves eastward to Fort Worth and runs via Temple to the coast. If the highway now being mapped out by Mr. Grant is approved, the Meridian highway, instead of making a big arch eastward, will run in almost an air line from Wichita, Kan., through Wichita Falls, Texas, Coleman, Brady and thence to San Antonio. Mr. Grant, upon his arrival at Wichita Falls, will advise D. E. Colp, who is at Wichita, Kans., of the results of his efforts, and, if practicable, the route will be changed.

The fact that there are already an average of 370 cars a day on the Meridian highway, makes this route one of the greatest importance. Should Brady succeed in being placed on the Meridian highway, it will, indeed, be a feather in her cap.

### A SECOND DAM.

Water Commissioners Expect to Construct Another Reservoir.

A second dam will be built by the Board of Managing Trustees of the Brady Water & Light Works as an auxiliary to the dam now in use, if present plans materialize. While the board has had this project under contemplation for some time, the recent water shortage crisis has fully determined them upon this action.

The problem of keeping Brady supplied with water has kept the board and Superintendent Joe Lyle awake nights during the past month or so, and eternal vigilance alone has so far saved the day. Several weeks ago the creek bed was opened so as to allow the hole of water just below the Jordan summer camp to drain into the Brady reservoir, and later a line of pipe was laid and a pump installed to secure the water remaining at a lower level than the drainage ditch. The opportune rain of last week relieved the situation, which had become acute, to say the least.

The first plans of rehabilitation of the waterworks system following its having become municipal property included the building of two dams. However, on account of limited funds, it was found necessary to omit the second dam from the first work of improvement.

The Brady Water & Light Works is now upon a satisfactory and remunerative basis. Not only has the interest and sinking fund been taken care of, but the system has each month laid by a sizable nest egg. In view of the excellent state of the exchequer, the board of trustees is fully justified in having the second dam built. Such action would give Brady a water supply sufficient for any requirements, and one which would be ample in spite of the most prolonged drouth.

The work of building the new dam, as now contemplated, will be begun in the early part of next spring.

### NEW NIGHTWATCHMAN.

R. L. Harvey Appointed at Special Meeting of Council.

The city council met in special session Tuesday night, September 26th, for the purpose of appointing a nightwatchman to succeed S. W. Baize, resigned.

Councilmen present were B. A. Hallum, H. P. Roddie, L. A. Williams, N. T. Cook, with Mayor John P. Sheridan presiding.

Upon the recommendation of City Marshal L. M. Baker, R. L. Harvey was unanimously appointed to the position, to assume the duties on the night of October 1st. Bond in the sum of \$1000 was presented by Mr. Harvey, with H. H. Sessions, E. B. Ramsay, J. F. Schaeg and J. E. White as sureties, the bond being approved by the council.

Alderman N. T. Cook, with either H. P. Roddie or L. A. Williams, was named to go to Temple to investigate the incinerating plant at that city, and make report to the council at the earliest opportunity.

Council thereupon adjourned.

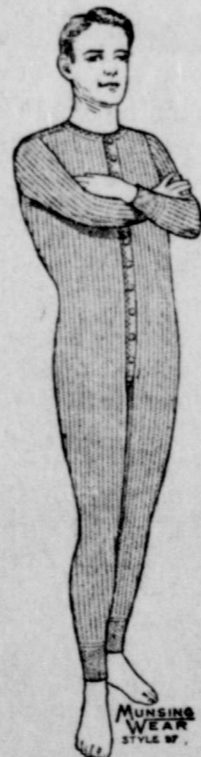
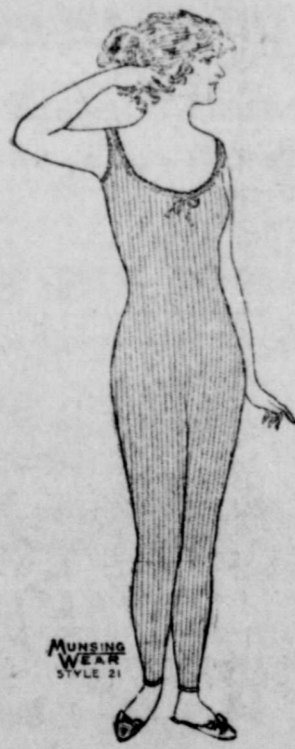

## TO MASON NEWS.

In its issue last week the Mason News gives a report of the Good Roads meeting held in Brady, in which it erroneously sets forth the Brady objects. The News states in part, "a great effort will be made (in Brady) to route the proposed highway via San Saba and Llano to Austin and on from that point \* \* \* but don't ever think that the citizens of Mason, Gillespie, Bexar and other counties will not exert themselves in trying to retain the route as originally proposed."

We beg to direct the News' attention to the fact that the route proposed via Brady, Llano and Austin is part of the Great Plains highway from Lubbock to Austin. The Puget Sound to the Gulf highway also proposes passing through Brady, its route being via Mason, Fredericksburg, San Antonio and on to the Gulf. Brady, too, is interested in maintaining the route as originally proposed. By so doing it will place Brady at the intersection of two great trunk highways. Mason need have no fear that Brady will kick over the traces. On the contrary, we will co-operate in every way to have this proposed route made the permanent one of the National highway.

We trust the Mason News will correctly set forth the intention of the McCulloch County Good Roads League, and to assure its readers of the good will felt towards the citizens of Mason county by us.

**Mrs. W. W. Spiller Dead.**  
The death of Mrs. W. W. Spiller occurred at the Temple sanitarium Saturday morning at 4:00 o'clock, and news of her death cast a pall of sadness over the entire city of Brady, where she was universally loved and held in highest esteem by all.

Death resulted from typhoid fever. She was first taken ill Thursday two weeks ago and was taken to Temple for treatment. There her illness developed into typhoid. During the two weeks she appeared to be getting along very well under the circumstances and her sudden turn for the worse was a shock to those who were attending her.

At Mrs. Spiller's own request, her body was carried to Eden for burial, and funeral services were held in that city at 12:00 o'clock yesterday, Elder T. L. Allen conducting. All the stores were closed in Eden to pay a last tribute to the dead, and the schools were dismissed for the funeral. A large concourse of mourning relatives and friends gathered at the services.

Mrs. Spiller was born and raised in the Lost Creek community, her maiden name having been Miss Ollie Armor, and she was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Armor, both deceased. She was married in 1900 to W. W. Spiller, who, with four children, three girls and one boy, is left to mourn the loss of a good, christian wife and a devoted mother. At the time of her death Mrs. Spiller was 36 years of age. Previous to taking with her fatal illness Mrs. Spiller had been in the best of health. The family had just removed from Brady to Menard, where Mr. Spiller again assumed the management of the H. P. Roddie Commission Co.

Besides the bereaved husband and the children, Ola, Zola, the baby girl and Willie, five brothers survive—Roy and Bob of Eden, Otto and Pete of the Plains country, and John of Voca; also one sister, Mrs. Reed, of Lost Creek.

## VOTE DECISIVE.

Pool Halls Lose Election By a Large Majority.

Pool halls were barred from Brady Independent School District No. 1 by a decisive vote last Saturday, the result of the election being as follows: For the Prohibition of Pool Halls, 181; Against the Prohibition of Pool Halls, 29; majority against pool halls, 152. While the vote was very light, but 210 citizens giving their preference out of something over 500 polls, the result is none the less decisive.

According to one interpretation of the statutes, the pool halls must close immediately following the canvass of the returns by commissioners' court and the posting of the election order declaring the vote opposed to pool halls. On the other hand, the order must be posted for two weeks, and it is possible that a liberal interpretation of the statutes would permit the pool halls to continue to run during these two weeks.

## THE SCENIC HIGHWAY

NAME OF FT. WORTH-BRADY-SAN ANTONIO PIKE.

Organization Perfected at Granbury Friday—Cities Pledge Support of New Highway.

Brady, through the good offices of its pioneer good roads booster, T. P. Grant, again came into the limelight for some notable publicity last week on the logging tour of D. E. Colp, secretary of the Texas Good Roads association, from Brady to Fort Worth.

The following account of the logging trip is reprinted from Sunday's Star-Telegram:

"The Scenic Highway was the name selected for the Ft. Worth-Brady-San Antonio pike, running southwest from Ft. Worth, at a meeting of good roads enthusiasts from the interested towns at Granbury Friday afternoon.

"A formal organization was perfected to build the pike with the view to having the government take it over as a part of the government good roads system in Texas.

"Officers of the road association were elected as follows:

"A. S. Harris, Comanche, president; W. G. Turner, Fort Worth, active vice president, and Morris J. Hall, Brownwood, secretary.

"The good roads party, headed by D. E. Colp of San Antonio, vice president of the National Highways association, set out from Brady Tuesday morning to blaze the new trail, and concluded the journey with a general mass meeting at Granbury, where all counties on the line were represented. They came into Fort Worth Friday night.

"Good roads meetings were held at each town along the route. The party was escorted from one town to another by good roads boosters. A party of twenty-five Fort Worth business men brought them into Ft. Worth from Granbury Friday night.

"Organizations were formed in each county along the way, with a local chairman and secretary for each. The chairman of each local club was made a vice president of the mother organization.

"Cities along the line which have pledged their support to the new pike are Brady, Brownwood, Comanche, Dublin, Stephenville, Granbury and Cresson.

"The new pike will have a double effect. It will give Fort Worth better means of intercourse with its neighboring cities along the Fort Worth & Rio Grande, and will provide a new speedway to San Antonio and thence to Corpus Christi. The Fort Worth-Brady pike connects with the new Plains to the Gulf highway which runs to Corpus Christi, this to be a part of the government owned highways.

### Organized by Brady Man.

"T. P. Grant of Brady organized the tour over the new highway. With D. E. Colp, pioneer good roads builder of Texas, he explained to the assembly at Granbury Friday that it was necessary for each county along the line to pledge its share of the work on the road before the government could be induced to take it over as a national highway and donate a dollar for each dollar the state or county spent.

"If there is a single county which lags behind, then the government funds may be lost to us," Grant explained.

"Every county had pledged its support, Grant said. W. L. Dean, new chairman of the Granbury club, then arose and practically pledged Hood county's share of the work. Another Hood county citizen added that every citizen
