R. H. Coonrod and family were shopping at Brady Saturday.

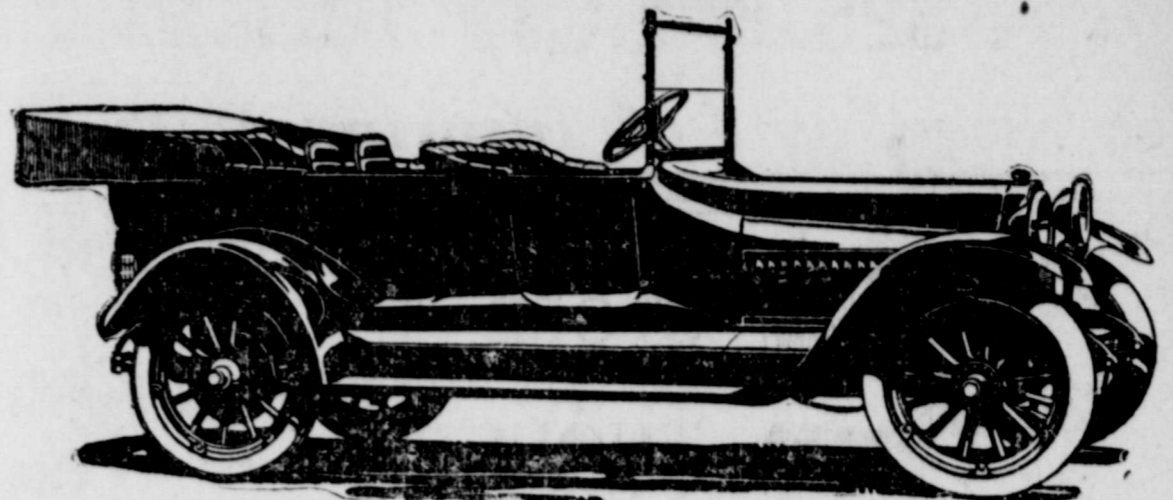

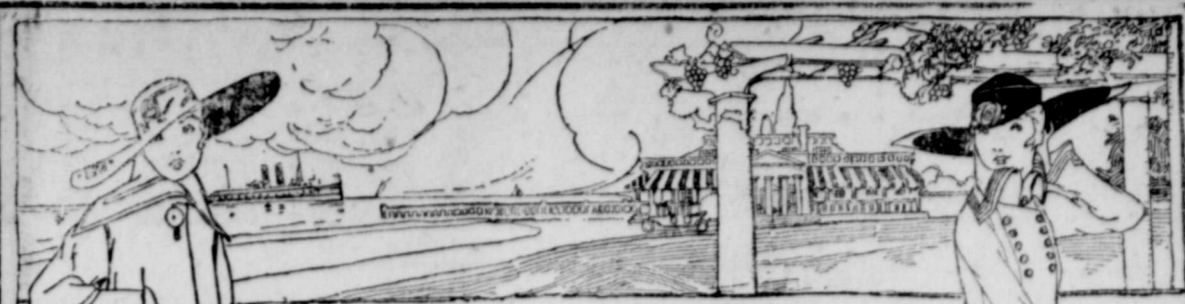

The Fife citizens held a rousing good roads meeting Wednesday night, at which everyone in attendance pledged their support and efforts towards the building of good roads in that community.

Jack Mitchell, who was in town yesterday, reported the Fife citizens alive to the importance of good roads, and stated they were ready to co-operate with the citizenship of McCulloch county in any way in the good roads work. Mr. Mitchell makes the following feasible suggestion for a plan of operation: Each road overseer is to warn his hands to be out for work on two days. Then let all the citizens join in the work, everyone working the two days, if possible, or at least one of the two days. By this plan the greatest possible amount of work could be accomplished. By setting two days, the citizen who is busy the first, could work the second day, and vice versa. By having a road overseer to superintend the work, there would be a competent man in charge, and there could be no dispute as to who should direct the operations. Further, all the tools required would be at hand, enabling the greatest amount of work to be done. Mr. Mitchell further suggests that the various precincts name different days upon which to do the road work, thus enabling each precinct to have all the tools required without depriving a neighboring precinct of these necessities.
