#### GOVT. ENGINEER HERE.

George D. Marshall to Assist Melvin Road Builders.

George D. Marshall of Austin arrived in the city yesterday morning enroute to Melvin, where he will assist the Melvin citizens in their road building plans. Mr. Marshall is a U. S. government engineer, and is well remembered by Brady citizens, having spent several months here in 1911 superintending road building in Brady Road District No. 1. The effectiveness of his work is shown by the fact that after five years' time, with hard usage and but little attention or maintenance, the roads in Brady District No. 1 are today acknowledged to be the best in this section of the state.

Mr. Marshall was met here by a committee of Melvin citizens, Messrs. E. T. Jordan and J. A. Maxwell, who escorted him to that city, his mission at that place being to examine the proposed highway road, give plans and suggestions as to the best methods of improving the same, and to give the Melvin citizens an estimate of the cost of such improvement in order that they may be enabled to vote bonds in a sum sufficient to carry the work to full completion.

Upon his return here, a committee of Brady citizens and members of the Brady Y. M. B. L. will escort Mr. Marshall along

the route of the recent improvements on the Mason road, where he will inspect the work and make recommendations as to the best method of crowning the roads and placing them in shape for acceptance by the government highway inspectors.

## BRADY RURAL ROUTE 2

IS ESTABLISHED BY POST-OFFICE DEPARTMENT.

Service to Begin December 1st—Postmaster Reagan Highly Elated Over New Route.

Brady Rural Route No. 2 has been established by the postoffice department, effective December 1st. This is the information given out yesterday by Postmaster A. B. Reagan.

This news will be hailed with delight and satisfaction by all the citizens residing along the new route who have, for the past year or more, been endeavoring to secure better postal facilities. At one time the government proposed consolidating the new

Simpson corner, 3 miles; thence west to Green corner, 1 mile; thence north to Midway school, 1 mile; thence east to Haddow corner, 1 mile; thence north to J. T. Price corner, 1 mile; thence west to Pence school house, 3 miles; thence south and west to Brady, 7 miles. A total distance of 21.9 miles is thus traversed by the route.

Originally there were 67 petitioners for the establishment of the rural route. The department, however, readjusted the route to avoid objections offered to the motor route, and the exact number the new route will serve is not known. The department was very anxious to make the route of greater length—at least 26 or 28 miles—and Postmaster Reagan went over the route several times in an endeavor to lengthen the route, but without success. Failing to get the desired number of miles,

route with the Rochelle route and the establishment of a motor route, but dissatisfaction with the proposal caused that plan to be abandoned. Since then Postmaster Reagan has been faithfully at work in an endeavor to get a rural route out of Brady established, and the recent order of the department is the result of his efforts.

The new route is laid out as follows: Beginning at Brady postoffice, east to the Knoy corner, 4.9 miles; thence north to

the department now requires that at least 80 boxes shall have been erected by November 20th as a condition to establishing the route.

Other conditions, as usual in the establishment of a new route, must also be observed. For instance, the route will be established on a basis of three deliveries a week for the first six months. If during this period the number of pieces delivered and taken up total 150 per mile per month, daily service

will, in that event, be established.

Examinations for carrier were held some time ago, but announcement of the carrier for the new route has not yet been made. For the present the salary of the carrier will be \$624, which sum will be increased to \$1100 or \$1200 should daily delivery of mail become effective.

The announcement of the establishment of the new route is a source of satisfaction and delight to Postmaster A. B. Re-

gan, who has so faithfully worked to this end. Mr. Reagan has devoted a large part of his time to the matter, and has put forth every effort to overcome all objections and obstacles and to have the route be of service to the largest number of patrons possible. Nothing now remains but for the required number of patrons to be secured, and he is confident that the citizens along the route will meet the requirement. Mr. Reagan has taken a great delight in increasing the efficiency of the local office, and the new service will be of great value to all concerned.

Oscar Betsill was among the visitors to the Coleman fair.

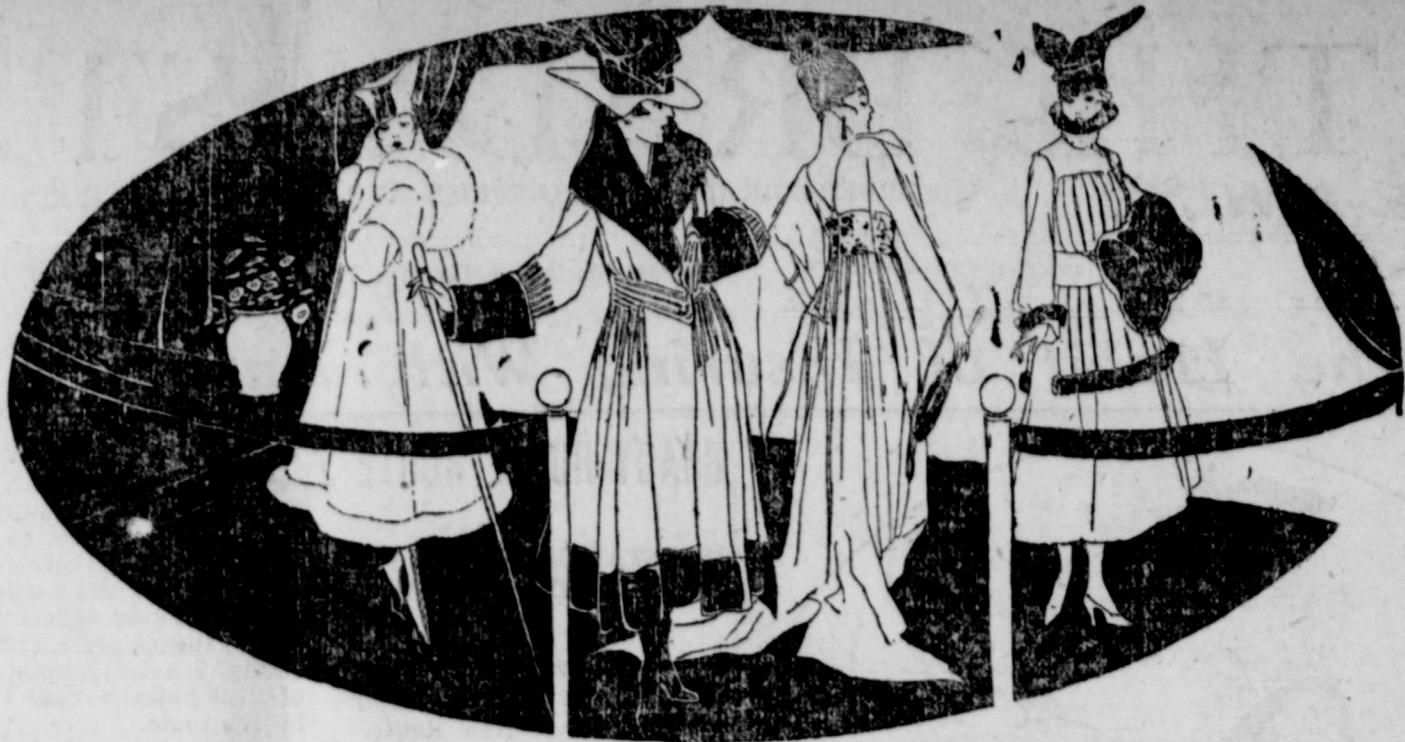

### DECLARING THE RESULT OF POOL HALL ELECTION

Now, on this, 12th day of Oc-  
tober, A. D. 1916, the commis-  
sioners court of McCulloch coun-  
ty, Texas, being duly convened  
in special session, this date as  
soon after the election herein-  
after mentioned as practical for  
the court to meet for the pur-  
pose of canvassing the returns  
and declaring the result of said  
election, all members of the  
court being present, the court  
proceeded as required by law  
to canvass the returns and de-  
clare the result of the special  
election held in the town of  
Brady Independent School District  
of McCulloch county, Texas, in  
pursuance of the order of the

the 11th day of September, A.  
D. 1916, which said order is  
duly entered in the minutes of  
this court in Volume 6, page  
251, which said order and re-

D. 1916, to determine whether  
or not pool rooms, as defined by  
Chapter 74, Acts 33rd Legisla-

be prohibited in said town of  
Brady Independent School Dis-  
trict of McCulloch county, Tex-  
as, and the commissioners court,  
after a careful examination of  
said returns of said election here  
produced, finds the vote cast at  
said election to be as follows:  
Total number of votes cast, 210  
votes; there were cast 181 votes  
for the prohibition of pool halls  
and 29 votes were cast against  
the prohibition of pool halls.  
Majority of votes cast in said  
town of Brady Independent  
School District of McCulloch  
county for the prohibition of  
pool halls, 152 votes.

And it appearing to the court  
that a majority of the votes  
were cast "For the prohibition  
of pool halls," the result of said  
special election is hereby declar-  
ed to be "For the prohibition of  
pool halls," and the operation  
and maintenance of pool rooms,  
as defined by Chapter 74, page  
136, et seq, Acts 33rd Legisla-  
ture of the state of Texas, is  
hereby absolutely prohibited  
within the limits of said town  
of Brady Independent School  
District of McCulloch county,  
Texas, until such time as the  
qualified voters therein at a legal  
election held for that purpose,  
by a majority vote, decide  
otherwise, the maintenance and  
operation of pool rooms being  
prohibited within the limits of  
the town of Brady Independent  
School District of McCulloch  
county, Texas, as said Indepen-  
dent School District is defined,  
described, bounded and estab-  
lished by the order of the com-  
missioners court of McCulloch  
county, Texas, made and entered  
March 24, 1902, in Volume 4,  
pages 347 to 349 both inclusive,  
minutes of the commissioners  
court of McCulloch county, Tex-  
as, declaring the result of the  
election to incorporate said dis-  
trict for free school purposes,  
which said order and the record  
thereof in the minutes of this  
court are here referred to and  
made part hereof for all pur-

### Texas Game Laws.

The following is a summary of the laws governing hunting in Texas:

Hunting license, non-resident, \$15 a season; resident, \$1.75 season.

A person who has not been a bona fide resident of this state for six months last past is considered non-resident.

A person holds the right to hunt in his and adjoining counties and on land owned or controlled by him without license.

A person holding a license, either resident or non-resident, wishing to ship game to his home either in or out of the state can do so under this condition: Provided he shall accompany such game on same train or common carrier from point of shipment to destination. Provided, further, that he make affidavit before some officer, and upon filing same before the railroad agent, such person can transport to his home one day's limit of game birds or other game, excepting wild ducks, of which he can transport forty-five, three days' limit.

The open seasons are: Doves, September 1 to February 28; bag limit, 15 birds per day. Mexican white wing pigeons, no closed season; 25 birds per day. Quail, December 1 to January 31; bag limit, 15 birds per day. Plover and snipe, September 1 to December 16; bag limit 15 birds per day. Duck, October 15 to February 1; bag limit, 15 birds per day. Wild turkey, December 1 to March 31; bag limit, three gobblers per season. Deer, November 1 to December 31; limit, three bucks per season.

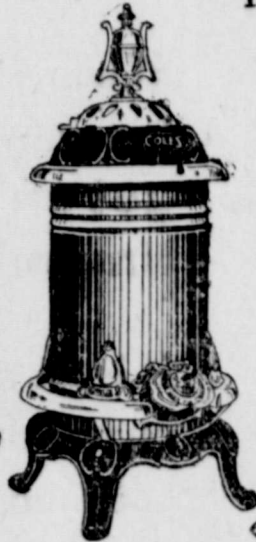

Mrs. Cora M. Martin, director of primary education of the Denton State normal, has had charge of the primary section, and one of the most interesting of her lectures was the demonstration of a model lesson with some beginners in the local primary department.

Yesterday afternoon the visiting teachers were given a sight-seeing auto ride over the city, and last night the Parent-Teachers association gave them a reception at the Methodist tabernacle. Following the reception the Brady Y. M. B. L. served refreshments to the teachers. In spite of the fact that the weather has been both rainy and cold, the various entertainments were thoroughly enjoyed and appreciated by the visitors, and too much cannot be said in praise of the Parent-Teachers association and the Brady Y. M. B. L., as well as the Brady citizenship in general, for their successful endeavors to make the visitors feel at home and enjoy their stay in our city.

Likewise is Superintendent E. L. White due praise for the successful manner in which the plans for the holding of the institute here were carried out.
