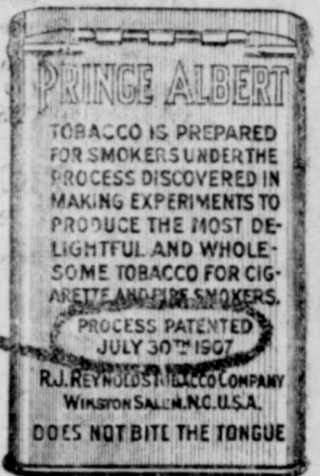

ROAD MAKING ESTIMATE

GOVT. EXPERT MAKES RECOMMENDATIONS.

Geo. D. Marshall, Government Engineer, Visits Brady and Suggests Bond Issues.

One of the most important and interesting features of last week was the visit paid to Brady and McCulloch county by Geo. D. Marshall, U. S. government engineer. Mr. Marshall came here upon the invitation of the Brady Y. M. B. L., who requested his assistance in estimating the cost of road improvement, the best method of such work and material to be used in construction of roads to conform to the government standard.

Mr. Marshall's first visit was to Melvin, where he addressed an enthusiastic audience of good roads builders. Mr. Marshall gave it as his opinion, after going carefully over the road to be improved, that the cost of improvement would run about \$1200 per mile. With 24 miles of road to improve, the total cost would run \$30,000, and Mr. Marshall suggested that bonds in this sum be voted as the best method of accomplishing the work. Mr. Marshall aroused great enthusiasm among the Melvin citizens and his plan of road improvement will be taken up by them.

Upon his return to Brady, Mr. Marshall, accompanied by Sec. D. W. Rowlett and Commissioner Chas. Samuelson and others, made an inspection of the work being done in the Camp San Saba community and also on the Voca road. Mr. Marshall stated that McCulloch county need not go off her roads for road building material. On the Voca road he called attention to the earth formation of gravel, sand and clay, and said there was no finer road material to be had; that the clay overcame the undesirable features of a sandy road in dry weather and the gravel and sand prevented the clay from becoming sticky in wet weather. He suggested the voting of bond issues in the south part of the county as the only practical method of road improvement.

He further suggested the advisability of having a competent road engineer to oversee any road building operations, stating that such a person would be worth his salary many times over in the saving and expediency of road improvement.

The following is the suggestion made by Mr. Marshall for class of road to be made in this section of Texas:

Sec. 1.—The road shall be graded 20 to 24 feet in width and have a crown of about 12 inches.

Shoulders shall be left as road is graded 14 to 18 ft. apart

according to width of clay to be laid.

Sec. 2.—On the prepared sub-grade a layer of clay 8" deep (or about 40 cu. yds. to 100 ft. for 16 ft. width) shall be spread. Care must be taken to keep the clay free from ruts and depressions as teams haul over it.

Sec. 3.—When the clay taken from pit contains a fair per cent of moisture, or otherwise after a rain as work progresses, a mixing process shall be carried on as follows:

(a) A turn plow shall be run through the centre of road deep enough to catch 3 to 4 inches of sand and successive back furrows made until entire width is plowed.

(b) A two team disk harrow shall be run over the plowed area until all lumps are broken up and clay becomes thoroughly mixed with sand.

(c) Next a spike tooth or section harrow weighted so that no part of the 6 inch teeth shall be exposed over the surface until the mixture of sand with clay is perfected and a uniform surface

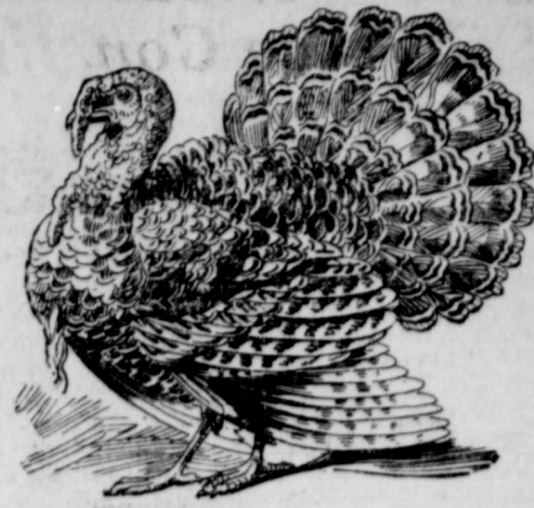
secured. The work of plough and harrows is intended to so mix the sand and clay particles that the sand will resist wear of traffic being held together by the clay which absorbs and holds moisture.

Sec. 4.—After mixing is completed as above described a road grader shall be used on the clayed section to smooth and crown the road making about a 6 in. crown. Finally the road grader shall be run from bank to bank leaving ditches clean and free of obstruction and depositing a light coating of sand on the clayed surface.

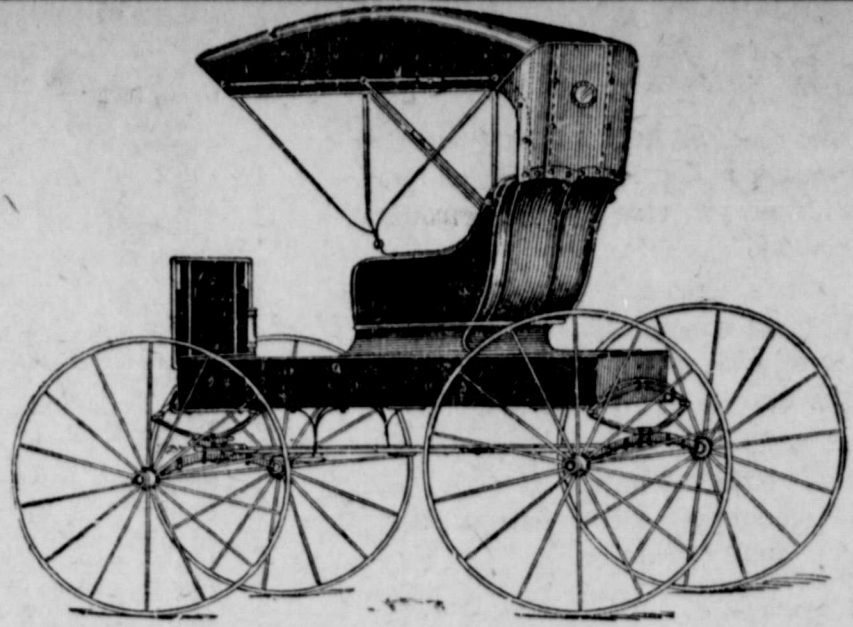

Highway Bill to Tax Autos.

The State Highway Department bill agreed upon by the Texas Good Roads Association and endorsed by Governor Ferguson, provides that the department shall be maintained from a fund to be raised by the collection of a regular tax on motor driven vehicles. The fee will be 25c for each horsepower with a minimum of \$7.50 and a maximum of \$15.00 per year. Motor trucks and motor vehicles for hire would pay double the fee required of vehicles in private use. Motorcycles are to be charged \$2.00 per year.

One-third of the gross amount collected shall be returned to the counties from which it was received, to be paid back semi-annually and used for road

maintenance. The money would be spent under the direction and with the approval of the highway commission.

IMPRESSIVE CEREMONY

MASO N I C CORNERSTONE LAYING TUESDAY.

Past Grand Master T. C. Yantis Master of Ceremonies—D. F. Johnson Delivers Address.

Impressive ceremonies marked the laying of the cornerstone at the new Masonic temple Tuesday afternoon, and a goodly number of Masons and interested friends were on hand to witness the ceremonies, Brady and other nearby points being represented.

Assembling at the old lodge hall at 2:00 o'clock, preparations were made for the ceremonies. A dispensation from Grand Master McMillan of Texas was presented, appointing Past Grand Master T. C. Yantis of Brownwood deputy Grand Master, with authority to lay the cornerstone acting for the grand master who was unable to be present. D. F. Johnson of Brownwood was appointed grand marshal and had charge of the procession, which formed at the lodge hall and marched to the new temple, local and visiting Knights Templar in full uniform forming an escort.

Following invocation by Dr. J. P. Barton of Lohn, the ritualistic form accompanying the laying of the cornerstone was read, the treasurer depositing a box containing various mementoes in a receptacle of the cornerstone, which was then lowered into place. The master of ceremonies then proceeded with the plumbing, squaring and leveling of the cornerstone, following which the implements were gathered and returned to the architect.

D. F. Johnson was then introduced, and made an impressive talk on Masonry, its purposes and its accomplishments. Among other things, Mr. Johnson spoke of the Masonic orphans home in Fort Worth, the home for old and feeble Masons and their wives at Arlington, and the home contemplated by the Order of the Eastern Star, as a few of the material benefits of being a Mason. Then he spoke of the hundred fold advantage of being a Mason, and dwelt upon the fact that it teaches both duty to God and to man. His address was very beautiful and very impressive and was given most attentive hearing.

T. C. Yantis followed with an address on "Whether It Is Worth While," which likewise was beautiful and which was well received. He stated that while there might be good Masons and bad, just as there are good church members and bad, yet whenever a Mason failed to do right, or when he took the name of the Lord in vain or committed a sin against God that Mason was violating the laws and teachings of Masonry. He said if the builders of the magnificent new temple were not the leaders in civic enterprise in Brady, then they were not doing their duty as citizens and as Masons. He spoke of the high ideals of true Masonry, and the services it performs towards mankind, and stated that Masonry had its origin farther back than any records could trace, and that throughout all the ages it was an organization for mutual strength, for guarding against impostors and for the defense of the weak and the helpless.

At the conclusion of Mr. Yantis' address the members and Knights Templar again formed in procession and marched back to the lodge hall.

The cornerstone is a beautiful example of the mason's art. It is of red granite, highly polished, and on one side bears the following wording: "Brady Lodge No. 628, A. F. & A. M. Building Committee: J. H. White, Chairman, Sam W. Moffatt, L. A. Williams, J. B. Granville, Jr., W. B. McKenzie, Sam McCollum." On the other side is the inscription "A. D. 5676" with the Masonic emblem, and "Ralph H. Cameron, architect."

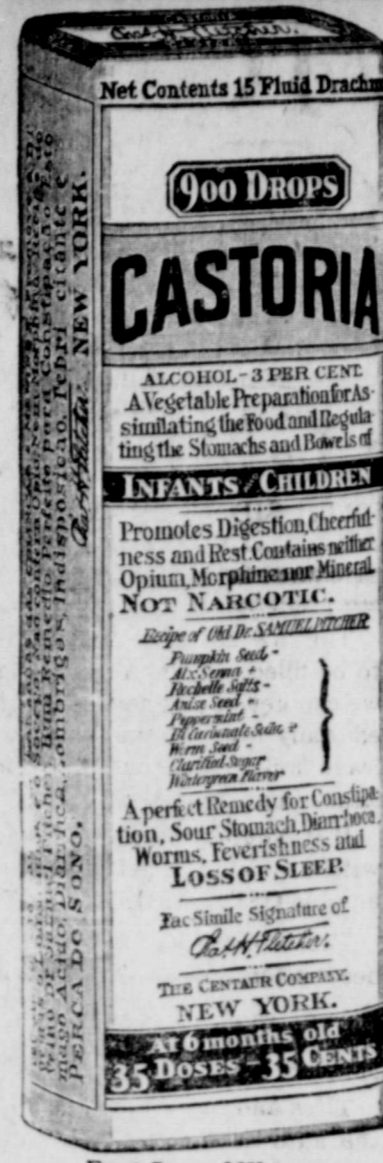

SUCCESSFUL RANCHMAN.

W. O. Schultz Believes in Eradicating the Tick.

W. O. Schultz of Paint Rock, one of the most successful ranchmen of Texas, was in Brownwood Wednesday making arrangements to dip 297 head of 3-year-old steers which he purchased last week from Cason & Grantham of this county. The Brown county stockmen had shipped the steers to the Fort Worth market and Mr. Schultz bought them there, but will have to dip them before taking them to his Concho county ranch.

Mr. Schultz is an ardent exponent of tick eradication. He says he made up his mind several years ago to get rid of ticks or quit the cattle business. He thinks no successful stockman can stand the loss caused by ticks, both in flesh and in animals. His cattle have been dipped ten times this year under government supervision and will enter the winter in better condition than any previous year. He says his calf crop will also be larger this next year than before.

Mr. Schultz has a ranch of more than 30,000 acres in Concho county and several times during the year has topped the Fort Worth and Kansas City markets with carloads of ensi-

lage fed steers.

At one time this year he received quite a lot of favorable newspaper comment when he shipped several carloads of yearlings to the Kansas City market, the animals weighing 950 pounds and bringing \$88 each. He has marketed 1200 fat steers this year from his ranch.

Mr. Schultz says he could pay several dollars a head more for Brown county cattle if they were tick free, for he would not then have to stand the expense of cleaning them and take a chance on the death loss.—Brownwood News.

STATE SUPT. DOUGHTY.

Makes Appeal to All Friends of Education.

W. F. Doughty, state superintendent of public instruction, writes the following article favoring the adoption of House Joint Resolution No. 30, which is worthy of careful reading by all voters:

Notwithstanding the fact that there is a general and widespread awakening of public interest in behalf of the new educational amendment known as House Joint Resolution No. 30 to be voted on by the people on the 7th of November, much work yet remains to be done by the friends of the schools to insure its adoption at the polls. The aroused determination on the part of the country people of the state, however, to demand as good free school opportunities for their children as are now enjoyed by the children of the cities and towns, and the disposition on the part of the people of the cities and towns to help the country people secure such privileges for their children augurs well for the amendment.

The amendment proposes no tax of itself, but extends the democratic principle of self-government by allowing the voters of any district to tax themselves not to exceed one dollar on the hundred dollars' valuation of property for the support of their own schools and by allowing the voters of any county to determine by popular vote if all the property in the county shall be taxed not exceeding 50 cents on the hundred dollars' valuation of property to support all the schools of the county.

The country schools have been handicapped, as compared with the city schools, for lack of money. I have never begrudged the city schools one cent of their money. On the other hand, one reason I am supporting this amendment is that it enlarges the opportunity of the cities to increase the support of their own schools. The fact remains, however, that if the country children ever come into their own in the matter of securing an adequate common school education, we must have more money for the country schools. It is idle to say that a six month term of school with seven grades of work in a restricted course of study carried on in a ramshackle school house without libraries or laboratories, on a bleak and desolate school ground is adequate to country children's needs. The county tax provided for in this amendment will go a long way toward overcoming these defects.

Twenty-one states now provide for a county tax for the support of schools. The proposed amendment does not in any way interfere with the present state ad valorem tax for schools nor does it interfere with present methods of support of common and independent district schools, but it does provide that a tax may be voted on all the property of the county for the support of all the schools in the county, the proceeds of which will be apportioned to all the schools of the county on a per capita basis. This proposition is democratic, just and equitable and should receive the unanimous support of all friends of the schools.

Australian Wool Expert to Lecture at San Angelo Fair.

D. H. Cunningham of Fort Worth, chairman of the State Livestock Sanitary Commission, will be in San Angelo on Thursday, November 2nd, the date on which Prof. Ritch, the Australian expert, will lecture to West Texans on the proper care and handling of wool, and the suggestion has been made that Thursday be designated as "Sheepmen's Day" at the San Angelo fair.

Hundreds of sheepmen throughout this section are to be invited by the Wool Growers Central Storage Co. to attend Prof. Ritch's lecture and the advertising which this firm will do for the Queen City's big show should be sufficient to cause the fair association to designate the day as requested.

Notice that Chairman Cunningham would be in San Angelo during the fair was received Wednesday morning when Sam H. Hill, vice president of the Wool Growers, talked to the Ft. Worth man over the telephone. The state official was enthusiastic over the success which had been attained in securing a visit by Dr. Ritch and stated that he would be here on November 2 without fail.

The chief object of Mr. Cunningham's visit will be to discuss with the sheepmen a law to be introduced in the next legislature regarding the eradication of the sheep scab. It is hoped to secure a state statute that will work in accord with the national regulations. Mr. Cunningham also wishes to have some place in Texas designated as a point at which a great cam-

paign of eradication in adjoining counties can be inaugurated. In this manner it is hoped to systematically clean up a large area and proclaim the section "clean territory."

The methods of preparing wool for market such as are in vogue in Australia will be thoroughly explained by Prof. Ritch. Similar methods can be successfully followed out in the United States, according to the expert. Hence the educational advantage attached to the Australian's talk to prove a powerful drawing card throughout the state.
