Brady and Brady institutions have been making some new records in prosperity lines this fall, and Big Business is being written in capital letters.

Three of the largest batches of New York exchange ever handled by the Commercial National bank were those put in by Crawford-Gosho Co., Inc., through their local agent, R. G. Prater. The largest of these was handled yesterday, and totaled \$117,000, while previous to that

one batch amounted to \$90,000 and another to \$84,000. The freight prepaid on these three batches of cotton summed up approximately \$36,400. The cotton was consigned to Japan.

The above is called to the attention of Brownwood and other neighboring papers which have given much publicity to the amount of exchange handled by their banks, and with which the above will compare more than favorably.

McKnight, superintendent of the State Tubercular sanatorium at Carlsbad, will have charge of the meeting. The public is cordially invited to attend this meeting, and it is to be trusted that a large number of citizens will avail themselves of the courtesy extended by the association.

THE AMENDMENT

W. F. Doughty Makes Final Appeal to Voters.

W. F. Doughty, State Superintendent of Public Instruction makes the following final appeal to the voters of Texas for the adoption of the constitutional amendment.

The constitutional amendment to be voted upon by the people on the seventh of November is distinctly an educational amendment, and is the only amendment to be considered at that time. One leading feature of the amendment is that it does not impose a tax of itself but if adopted will give the various districts and counties of the State an opportunity to secure additional support for their schools if they need it and want it.

The amendment was submitted to the people of Texas in response to a widespread demand throughout the State for an opportunity to secure additional support for the schools than is now permitted by the Constitution of the State. Many districts in Texas have already reached the constitutional limit in taxation and are yet short of funds with which to provide an adequate system of public free schools. Inasmuch as the amendment does not levy a tax on any district or county the voters of such counties or districts as may not need additional support should in good neighborly spirit vote for the amendment, for by doing so they will give the needy districts of Texas an opportunity to establish good schools for their children.

Four hundred sixty-seven independent school districts, and approximately two thousand common school districts in the State have already voted upon themselves the limit in taxation permitted by the present Constitution. Many of these districts need additional support and cannot secure another dollar for their schools unless this amendment is adopted. On account of the compulsory school attendance law many schools in

EXCHANGE PLACES.

Dr. Wm. C. Jones and J. C. Hall Make Deal.

One of the most important business deals in some time was closed last week, when Dr. Wm. C. Jones traded his home in South Brady for the J. C. Hall homestead on the Mason road. The trade was made by Meers Land Co., the consideration not being made public.

The J. C. Hall place is located one mile from the court house and is a splendid piece of property, having a well built and comfortable 9-room house, a large barn and 11 acres in farm and orchard. Dr. Jones expects to build a garage and make other improvements and will install either a Delco electric lighting system or one of acetylene gas.

The Dr. Jones place is located in the Luhr addition, one of the best resident portions of the city. The property consists of a 5-room house and bath, together with a garage and other out-buildings, and the lot is 150x200 feet. The place is well improved, and is a most desirable residence.

Formal transfer of the property will be made tomorrow, each of the parties to the trade occupying their new property.

The only relief for such districts is the adoption of the amendment to Section 3, Article 7, of the State Constitution, known as House Joint Resolution 30, to be voted on the seventh of next month.

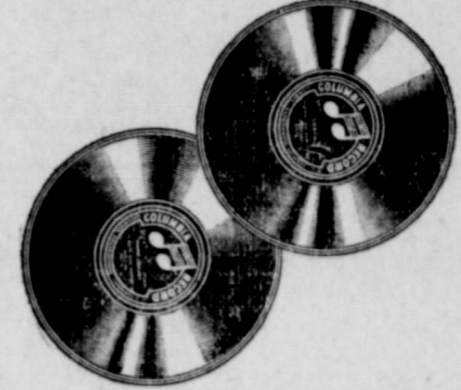

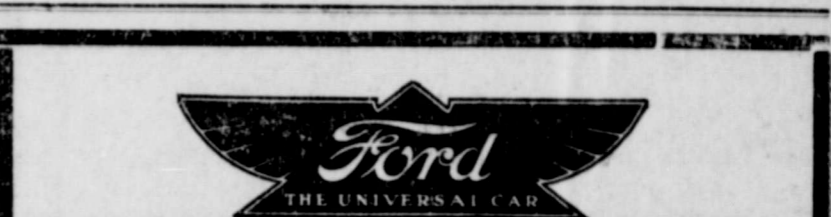

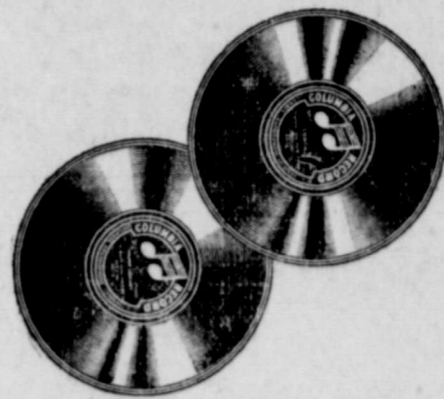
