MESSAGE SENT FROM BRADY TO SHIP AT SEA.

Reply Received in Fourteen Hours—Message First Wireless Sent From Brady.

Brady sent her first wireless message last Tuesday night and by Wednesday morning a reply was received to the message from a ship half way across the ocean. The Western Union Telegraph & Telephone Co. has long established a reputation for service, but the returns on Brady's first wireless message were so prompt as to be astounding.

Mrs. Belle Morgan, local operator for the Western Union, takes great pride in the dispatch with which the message went through, and still greater pride in the fact that the Brady office was the only one which could handle the message.

A Mason man was author of the message. He desired to communicate with the steamship New York, then 60 hours out at sea—practically half way across the big pond. He tried to get Llano to handle the message, but the operator there did not know how or could not—in fact, would not handle the message. He tried other points, but without success. Then he called upon Brady. The message left here at 6:00 o'clock Tuesday night, and at 8:00 o'clock Wednesday morning a reply was waiting for the Mason party.

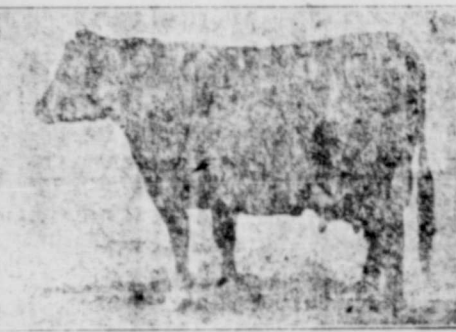

WILL BUILD AT ONCE.
Members of the Baptist Church to Remodel Edifice.

At a meeting of the membership of the Baptist church Wednesday night it was decided definitely to rebuild and modernize the church building, and the work is to be begun at once. Mrs. J. L. Jordan, chairman of the committee to solicit funds, made a report, and showed contributions sufficient to assure the completion of the contemplated work. Accordingly a building committee was named, composed of Mrs. J. L. Jordan, Mrs. S. W. Hughes, W. J. Yantis and J. M. Coalson, and this committee is authorized to contract for the work of improvement at the earliest possible moment.

The church building will be practically rebuilt, and will be of modern design, with basement for Sunday school rooms, choir loft and gallery to be used both as Sunday school rooms and as an addition to the church auditorium. Two entrances will be provided, one on the west side and one on the south, and while the new edifice will be a frame structure, it will be so arranged as to enable the placing of a brick veneer at some future date, which will make the Baptist church building one of the most attractive and serviceable edifices in the city.

Coleman County Commissioners Let Contract for Bridges.

An interesting sequel to the injunction proceedings secured in Brady at the last term of district court by the county judge of Coleman county restraining the Coleman county commissioners from letting a bridge contract, is found in the following article reprinted from the Brownwood Bulletin. It will be remembered that the county judge claimed the bid of Austin Bros. was excessive, and that upon personal investigation he had ascertained that the work could be done at a saving of several thousand dollars. He asked that the commissioners be restrained from closing the contract with Austin Bros.

"For the second time within a few weeks the Coleman county commissioners court has let a contract for construction of new bridges and repairs on old bridges. The former contract was let to Austin Bros, at a price of about \$12,000. Objections by citizens, led by the county judge, crystallized into injunction proceedings and an order of the district court was issued restraining the commissioners from carrying out the contract.

"Last week the court convened again, and bids from several construction companies were considered. The bid of the Missouri Valley Bridge & Iron Co. was finally accepted at a figure \$3,451 below that of the firm which was awarded the first contract."

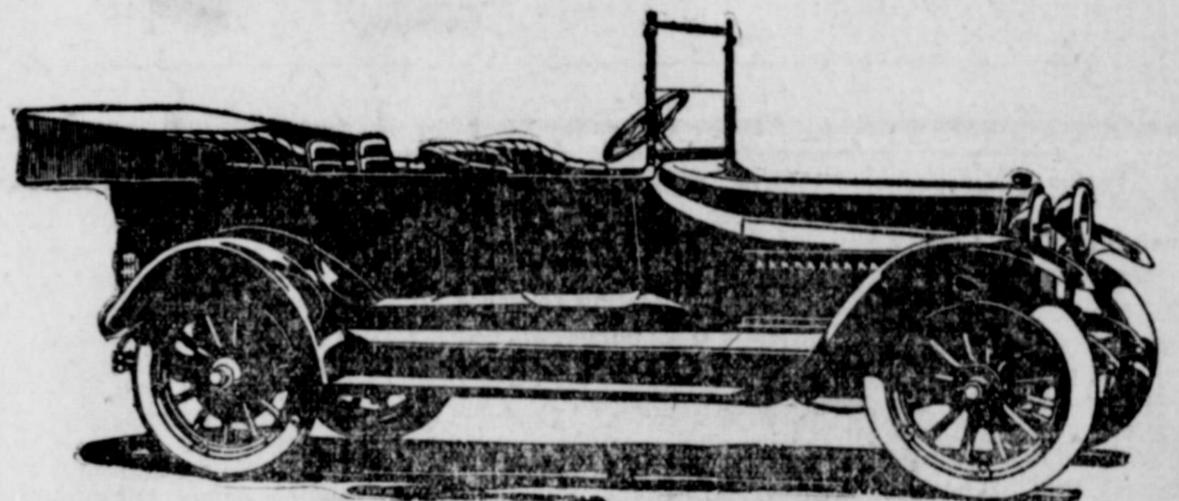
