ERADICATION ELECTION

DECEMBER 30TH SET FOR VOTING ON TICKS

Commissioners Have Busy Session—Bonds of Various Officials Approved—Special Road Fund Apportioned

Commissioners court held a busy session the past week, the term of court consuming five days. In addition to canvassing the election returns, a great volume of business was transacted, as follows:

Upon petition of F. M. Richards and eighty-eight other qualified voters, an election was ordered on Saturday, December 30, to determine whether or not McCulloch county shall take up the work of tick eradication as provided for in Chapter 169 of the acts of the 33rd legislature, and election judges were appointed at various voting precincts to hold election.

J. W. Graham, a trustee of Common School District No. 35, having moved out of county, office was declared vacant, and A. W. Jones was appointed in his stead.

W. L. Cain was appointed a trustee for Melvin Common School District No. 18 to fill a vacancy.

Fred Gray was appointed a trustee for Calf Creek Common School District No. 5, to fill out unexpired term of Art Kelley.

Warrant was ordered issued to J. T. Crew in sum of \$28.00, proceeds of sale of cow estrayed by Oscar Johnson and sold by Chas. Samuelson, Commissioner Precinct No. 1.

Bond of County Treasurer was placed at thirty-five thousand dollars.

On account of error of Tax

Assessor, assessment of John A. Bromman for Blocks Nos. 37, 38 39, 40, 41 and 42, Norton addition to Melvin was reduced from \$650 to \$120, and remainder of taxes ordered remitted.

A. D. Stoneberg was appointed Justice of the Peace for Precinct No. 3 in stead of Marvin Hunter, who refused to qualify.

Warrants were ordered issued in the sum of \$17.75 in favor of Oscar Galloway and \$9.50 in favor of Pedro Estrado unexpired portion of license tax for pool halls recently voted out of force.

Assessment of C. H. Sandberg of 320 acres was reduced from \$15.00 to \$12.00 per acre, and remainder of taxes remitted to him.

Assessment of A. Flagg Survey No. 159, Abstract No. 327, Certificate No. 226, property of W. F. Spiller, was ordered reduced from \$10.00 to \$5.00, and remainder of taxes remitted to Mr. Spiller.

Sum of \$10.00 per month was allowed Bal Morgan for keeping Steve Powell, a pauper.

Salaries of county officials were set as follows per annum: Sheriff, \$500; County Judge, \$1300; County Clerk, \$300; District Clerk, \$900; County Treasurer, 11-4 per cent on all amounts received and 11-4 per cent on all amounts disbursed by him; salaries to be paid monthly.

Sheriff was allowed the sum of \$640 per annum for the care and keeping of the county jail and prisoners.

Clerk was ordered to issue warrant monthly in favor of County Judge for trial fees in criminal and lunacy cases.

Sum of \$2.00 per day was allowed each of A. A. Jordan, H. M. Hoffer, C. A. Long, and G.

OUR OWN EXPERT.

Considerable solicitation has been occasioned by our account of difficulties experienced last week with The Standard's lino type machine, and we are happy to state that it is once more in apple-pie order.

While we had engaged the services of an expert to come and rectify the trouble, The Standard's own expert machinist, Ed S. Clark, succeeded in locating the trouble in time for us to notify the expert of the fact before he commenced his trip here.

Just what the trouble was is hard to state definitely. A speck of dust, a hair from a brush used in cleaning out the magazine, a bit of corrosion or a weak spring—one or all of these may have been the cause of our difficulties. Suffice to say that after four or five days of strenuous and nerveracking endeavor, during which time the machine was virtually dismantled and set up anew, Mr. Clark succeeded in getting the machine back in its erst while excellent condition, and it is now chewing up lead and spitting out bright, shiny lines of type just as gladly as ever.

HIGH COST OF LIVING

The high cost of living are merely jokes. It's the high

cost of paper that's keeping the publishers broke.

Before the price mounted so high the scraps of waste paper that New York city accumulated every day were taken out to sea and dumped into water with other refuse. Now things are different. Hundreds of old men and women have employment in separating the paper in the refuse. This is baled and shipped back to the mills, where it is made over again.—American Press.

Cattle Freeze to Death.

The recent cold snap has caused a heavy loss to cattle shippers whose stock was in cars en route to the markets when the coldest weather came. Fourteen cows which were frozen to death between San Angelo and Brownwood were burned at the crematory, and about half a dozen others are to be burned today (Thursday).

The cattle were found frozen to death in the cars upon arrival in Brownwood. While the weather was not cold enough to freeze the cattle on the open range, the cold was intensified when the stock was placed in the open cars and drawn into the wind, thereby increasing the velocity of the wind and giving the animals no shelter from the chilling blasts.

The crematory here has proven very successful. The fourteen animals burned last night were cremated with only ten gallons of kerosene oil, costing \$1.50. If a load or two of trash had been available the animals could easily have been burned without additional fuel.—Brownwood Bulletin.

FARMING LANDS IN SIBERIA

That They Are Rich is Proved by the Crops That Are Gathered From Them.

We have inherited from the traditions of the past the idea that Siberia is a country with a not very fruitful soil. Yet in the last few years very decided advances in farming have been made there, as a result of the efforts of the Russian government to arouse the native peasants and settlers to a more intensive cultivation of the ground. In the western section of the country, so the German journal Prometheus tells us, large associations of farmers have been organized for the export of their products. In 1912 butter to the value of 7,000,000 rubles (a ruble is about 51 cents) was exported. In 1913 this amount had doubled, for in this year butter to the value of 14,500,000 rubles was sold to Germany, Austria-Hungary and England. In 1912 experiments were made in the manufacture of the English cheddar cheese. After several failures, the cheese, which is very popular in Great Britain, was so successfully imitated that in 1913 England imported 65 tons of Siberian cheddar. The trade is carried on by ships directly from the interior of Siberia to London.—Scientific American.

Cotton seed is now worth the small sum of \$55.00 per ton on the streets of Brady. At this rate each cotton seed is as precious as a tear drop. When inquiry was made if he had lost something, he replied: "I should say I did; a cotton seed just rolled out of my wagon."

The spirited horse belonging to Max Borschow added to its runaway record last Friday evening by making a dash for liberty while attached to a buggy. The runaway brought the buggy to grief when it crasied into August Behrens' delivery Ford standing in front of the Behrens' store on Blackburn street. The front wheel of the buggy was caved in, a shaft was broken and other damage resulted, while both back fenders of the car were torn off. The horse freed itself from the harness, and continued its mad flight.

Naturally the passersby were interested in the couple that paraded about town last Thursday arm in arm. Perhaps they were amused, too. At any rate when the enamored pair turned in the direction of the court house, everyone in sight at once scented a wedding ceremony and the crowd started on the trail of the happy twain, gathering momentum and numbers as it neared the objective. Arriving at the court house, the prospective groom suddenly realized the intentions of the crowd and was hugely amused. "Haw, Haw," he said, "we were married last Tuesday." Then the pair happily resumed their arm in arm sight seeing trip oblivious to the laughter and cynical sneers their actions occasioned, conscious only of their mutual affections. And in a sudden outburst of enthusiasm the swain murmured to his companion, "Honey, I sure do love you!" And the bride snuggled closer within his arm and laughed happily.
