



#### DEATH RECALLS OLD SCANDAL

Late Stephen W. Dorsey Accused of Fraud.

The death of Stephen W. Dorsey, former United States senator from Arkansas, at Los Angeles a short time ago recalls the "star-route scandal," in which he was accused of being the leader, the Kansas City Star remarks.
