STAR ROUTE TO DOOLE

PROPOSAL SUBMITTED TO SUPT. RAILWAY MAIL SERVICE.

Would Give Direct Mail Service With Brady—Pear Valley, Durock, Doole and Stacy to Be Benefited.

Following unsuccessful attempts of the citizens of Durock, half-way station between Pear Valley and Doole to secure the establishment of a postoffice at that place, a new plan has now been devised whereby regular service may not only be had by the citizens of Durock, but the entire county may be benefited by the securing of direct mail connection between Brady and Doole and Stacy, and all intermediate points.

At present there is a star route meeting the Brady-Waldrup star route at Lohn, which furnishes the Pear Valley and Broadmoor postoffices. The Stacy and Doole postoffices are furnished by a star route running from Coleman to Stacy and Doole via Valera. The citizens of Durock now must go to either Pear Valley or Doole for their mail.

Various plans have been made to give Durock better mail service, and at the same time connect up Doole and Stacy with the other towns in the county by direct mail service. It has been proposed to establish a star route from Melvin to Doole, but the stumbling block here encountered is that mail coming

from the Brownwood direction would be delayed at Brownwood, again at Brady and finally at Melvin so as to reach Doole 24 hours later than as at present route; viz: Brownwood, Coleman Valera and Doole. Then it has been proposed to run a rural route out of Lohn, embracing the Durock territory, but so far this plan has failed of official sanction.

Recently Postmaster J. E. White of Pear Valley submitted a new plan to Postmaster A. B. Reagan of Brady. This plan is to make Doole the head of the star route running via Durock, Pear Valley, Broadmoor and meeting the Brady-Waldrup carrier at Lohn, returning via the same route. This route is not to supersede or do away with the present mail service enjoyed by Doole and Stacy from the north, but is to co-operate and act in conjunction with it, thus giving regular service both to the north and with Brady and other parts of the county, besides serving a territory at present without mail service.

The matter was submitted to the superintendent of railway mail service at Fort Worth, and by him referred to the superintendent of railway mail service at Washington, D. C.

Postmaster Reagan's interest in the matter is merely in securing the most efficient service for all points of the county. He has outlined the matter and submitted the proposition to all the postmasters in the district concerned for their approval or disapproval.

Brady citizens are greatly interested in the proposition since direct mail connection with the northwest portion of the county is greatly desired, and it appears that the proposition outlined above will not only meet this demand, but will be of great benefit to that section since it will not detract from the present service, but instead will give additional mail connections.

Rural Carrier Examination.

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination for the County of McCulloch, Texas, to be held at Brady, on Feb. 10th, 1917, to fill the position of rural carrier at Brady, and vacancies that may later occur on rural routes from other post offices in the above-mentioned county. The examination will be open only to male citizens actually domiciled in the territory of a post office in the county and who meet the other requirements set forth in Form No. 1977. This form and application blanks may be obtained from offices mentioned above or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission at Washington, D. C. Applications should be forwarded to the Commission at the earliest practicable date.

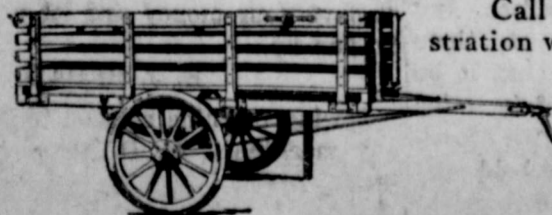

INSPECTS ROAD.

Captain Fauntleroy Makes Recommendations.

Capt. J. D. Fauntleroy of Fort Worth, district engineer for the National Highway association, who made a trip out to Mercury and return Tuesday, on an inspection trip, was highly enthusiastic over the road building possibilities in this county. He stated that this county had the best road material of any county he had ever seen, and that there was small excuse for not having good roads everywhere. Accompanying the captain on the trip of inspection were T. P. Grant, C. A. Trigg and County Commissioners Chas. Samuelson and H. E. McBride. The captain was particularly taken with the white adobe, abundant in various sections, and the splendid road which it made.

One point that received criticism from him was the fact that road from Rochelle to Mercury was narrow and included innumerable sharp turns. The captain stated that it was impossible to think of such a road obtaining a place on a National highway, and that the sharp corners must be smoothed out so as to permit an autoist to see a good distance ahead at all times. The dangers of collision were always imminent when two autoists speeding in opposite direction met at a sharp corner, and for this reason all National highways must obviate this danger. The captain emphasized this point time and again, pointing out to the committee the fact that a crop of corn or maize growing in a field near a sharp turn could completely obstruct sight of the road ahead. The importance of having the road's standard width—40 feet—was also brought out, it enabling drivers to observe the well-known rule of the road, "Drive to the Right."

Captain Fauntleroy was highly pleased with the enthusiasm of the citizens with whom he met, over the good roads question. He stated McCulloch county had an unparalleled opportunity to become the center of a net of highways that would bring thousands of tourists and travelers through this section, and with the material for road building right at hand, nothing should keep the citizens from spurring their efforts to place their roads in such shape as to secure their place on the National Highways and thus assure this travel.

On account of the time required to go over the road to Mercury, and the fact that the Captain was a day late in reaching here, it was found impossible to make the contemplated trip to Voca, and he returned to Fort Worth Tuesday night.

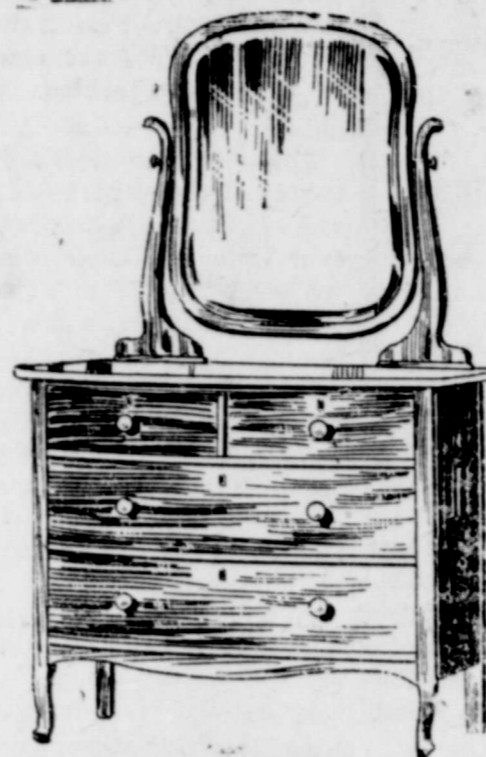

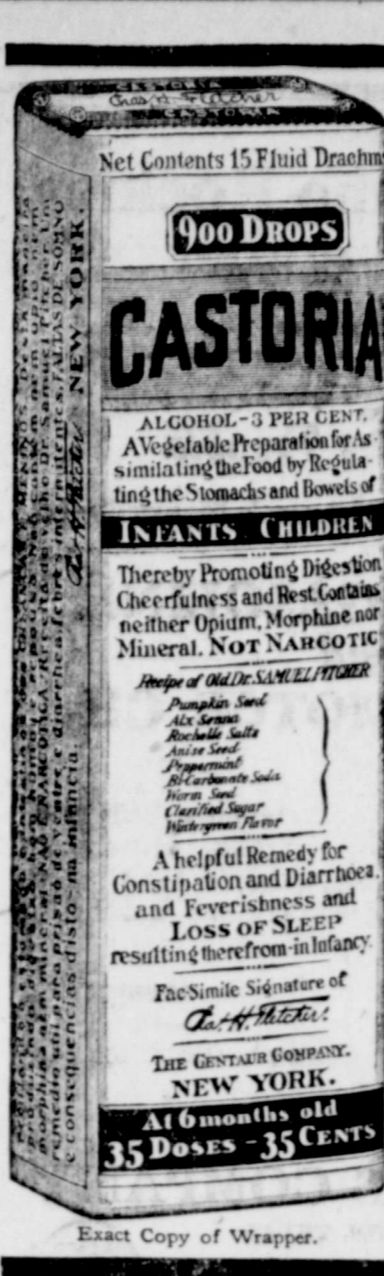
