Short blasts of cooler temperatures last week and this have taken the enthusiasm from farmers who were getting the urge to plant this year's row

Jackson, though, knocked the plan pretty hard. He said, or left the impression, that the idea wouldn't work. He suggested that instead of pheasants, the area should be stocked with quail if the people wanted gamebirds here.


So, the plan was changed and an attempt was made to get more quail established here. The next time, which was a couple of years or so later,

that the people got interested in stocking the county with pheasants, they didn't call on Jackson for advice.

They just did it. And now, evidently, the plan was successful and our pheasants are established, multiply-



Know The Truth


Generally, when observance of the first day of the week is mentioned those who think we must still keep the old Jewish Sabbath speak out in protest. What they have never learned is that the Old Covenant has been fulfilled and laid away, and that the New Covenant was given in its place, Consider this question. What was the first covenant? To find the answer read Exodus 34:28, and Deut, 4:13, they both show that it was the ten commandments written by God on two tables of stone. Now read Hebrews 8:6. It says Jesus is the mediator of a "better covenant" enacted on better promises. The next verse says plainly that the covenant was not perfect which contained the Sabbath command. The covenant given by God, through Moses, to the Israelites at Mt. Sinai had only animal blood to give it power to cleanse sins, yet the law we now have can truly cleanse because it has the blood of Christ to give it power, Hebrews 10:1-4.

God did not give the first covenant to last always, but only until Jesus would come, Galatians 3:19. There is no need to cite some passage which says God's commands stand forever: there were, at least, ten things named in the Old Testament as lasting forever -- such as lighting the lamps in the tabernacle. The "forever" in these passages simply meant "through the generations" of the Israelites, that is the same as saying until Jesus would come and change the entire system. Jesus did not "change the Sabbath" to another day He "blot-

ted out" the whole covenant that contained it, Colosians 2:14-16. Christians do not have a "Sabbath Day." They have a new law and a new day -- a day of worship, not a day of rest. We are looking forward to resting in heaven Hebrews 4:9-11.

The following has been making the rounds of newspapers the past few years and is worthy of the publicity the "Twelve Rules for Raising Delinquent Children" has received.

The rules were originally issued by the Houston Police De-

1. Begin with infancy to give the child everything he wants. In this way he will grow up to believe the world owes him a liv-

2. When he picks up bad words, laugh at him. This will make him think he's cute. It will also encourage him to pick up "cuter" phrases that will blow off the top of your head later.

11. When he gets into real trouble, apologize for yourself by saying, "I never could do anything with him."

12. Prepare for a lifetime of grief. You'll probably have it.

In Cotton --

Crop Rotation Reduces Wilt

Losses due to Verticillium | wilt, a devastator to cotton production, can be reduced by rotating cotton with one or more grain crops.

Several years of testing at the South Plains Research and Extension Center here have resulted in this finding, reported Dr. E. B. Minton, USDA path-

Rotating cotton with corn on a yearly basis reduced Verticillium wilt infestation by almost 50 per cent, Minton said.

Furthermore, the rotation of cotton with corn and grain sorghum reduced the disease infestation from 96 to 20 per cent,

The all-important area of lint yield per acre showed substantial gains with these rotations, the pathologist pointed out. With the cotton-corn rotation, lint yield increased from 630 to 950 pounds per acre. About the same increase resulted from the cot-

ton-grain sorghum rotation. Not only did this system of rotation reduce the wilt infestation, said Minton, but it also delayed any infestation that did take place. Wilt that developed later in the season did not have such a drastic effect on the

yield and fiber and seed quality. Verticillium wilt, as outlined by Minton, include the following: 1. Skip-row planting

2. Bed planting 3. Alternate-row irrigating

These three practices will inrease soil temperature, an important factor in warding off Verticillium wilt.

4. Planting tolerant varieties 5. Balancing fertility and irrigation practices . . . Avoid a high moisturehigh nitrogen combination.

6. Maintain a high population, or four to six plants per row foot.

7. Avoiding root pruning, or deep cultivation.

By following the above practices, infestation by Verticillium wilt will be delayed and plant susceptibility to the disease will be reduced.



On The Fanm In Parmer County

WHEAT CROP FORECAST AT

50 MILLION BUSHELS According to the Texas Crop Reporting Service, Texas Wheat

production, based on April 1 prospects, is forecast at 60,-423,000 bushels, 27 per cent below the 82,395,000 bushels estimated in December. If the present production is realized, it will be 17 per cent below 1966 production of 72,652,000 bushels. Acreage seeded for this year's crop at 5,493,000 acres is 29 per cent above acreage

High Plains wheat, which had adequate moisture at planting, has steadily declined in condition due to the lack of moisture. The Northern High Plains the major growing area, is critically short of moisture. Reports of heavy abandonment on dryland acreage is reported. Greenbug damage is also heavy, but appears to be diminishing. Cattle have been moved off wheat where a grain crop is

Wheat on the Low Plains and the Blacklands is temporarily improved with recent showers, and is entering the boot stage. More moisture is needed in these areas before heads can be expected to fill properly.

ATTENTION HORSE OWNERS!

There appears to be some evidence that Sorghum-Sudangrass type forage hybrids used extensively for cattle grazing and greenchop may be injurious to horses, warns B.F. Yeates, Extension Animal Husbandman, Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

These widely used grazing and feed crops appear to be a factor in causing cystitis syndrome in horses, a little known disease of equines which is characterized by incoordination of the rear quarters, uncontrolled urination, and possible abortions by mares. Death sometimes occurs in chronic cases. To date, there is no known cure for this ailment. but it is not contagious. In addition, to the Sorghum-Sudangrass type hybrids, cystitis has been found in horses grazing Johnsongrass, Common Sudan-

grass, and Sweet Sudangrass in a few isolated cases.

The cystitis syndrome and possible dietary connections was first reported by Dr. William M. Romane, D.V.M., Texas A&M University and his team of researchers in an article in "Southwestern Veterinarian" (Vol. 19, Winter, 1966). The report described symptoms and indicates it may be connected with feeding of the forages as greenchop or by grazing the horses on the forage. planted for the previous year. Dr. Romane's research team adds, "Only when the plant is in the growing state does this syndrome develop. To our knowledge, cured hay will not

> The cystitis syndrome of horses has been noted mostly in Texas and a few isolated areas of the Southwest, according to reports from veterinary colleges. Incidence of the cystitis syndrome was reported by veterinarians in Georgia, Alabama, Oklahoma, Washington, and Iowa, but there appeared to be no association with any particular forages. Other areas have not reported cases of the syndrome.

Exact cause of the ailment has not been pinpointed, and, Yeates says, thousands of horses have probably grazed these forage crops with no ill effects; however, horsemen should be warned of the danger involved in using the forages in their horse program, and they should be very cautious until continuing research can establish the exact cause of the syndrome. A&M SCIENTISTS SAY THAT THERE IS NO REASON FOR CATTLE-MEN TO BECOME ALARMED AS NO INJURIES HAVE BEEN OR FEEDING THESE FORAGES TO RUMINANTS.

The seed industry is cooperating with the Texas Agricultural Station of Texas A&M University to help support continued research in an attempt to isolate and avoid causes of the cystitis syndrome and to find a






