**CITY PURCHASES BIG ROAD ROLLER**

The members of the Brady city council, sitting last week in regular session, made a conditional purchase of a ten ton Kelley road roller from Austin Bros. of Dallas, Texas. The cost of the road roller totals \$3,216. The order is subject to cancellation at any time, and the roller is not to be shipped until council so orders.

The necessity of the purchase of such a piece of road machinery has for a long time been apparent. Despite the best efforts of the city's street improvement force, the roads when macadamized, at present have a wavy, undulating surface for the reason that the present road roller, which is trailed behind the road engine, cannot be backed over the high places to smooth them out, and can merely be dragged forward. The operation is cumbersome, and is unsatisfactory to say the least.

A committee composed of Aldermen A. H. Broad, W. F. Roberts and N. T. Cook was also appointed to confer with County Judge J. E. Brown, and Commissioner Chas. Samuelson to definitely ascertain what amount of money will be forthcoming to the city out of the special 15c road tax.

A. M. Dunsworth was allowed an increase in salary of from \$15 to \$30 per month for his work as sexton of Brady cemetery.

**COMPLETION OF 'PHONE SYSTEM**

The first of the crew of installers, sent out by the Western Electric company, arrived in the city Saturday and will begin the erection of the office equipment for the West Texas Telephone Co. in their new quarters in the Masonic temple. The initial crew consists of four men, who will undertake the preliminary work, and as this progresses more experts will be sent out, until the force will be composed of about ten workmen. It is anticipated that the long-delayed cable will reach here in time for installation by this crew. The entire work by these expert installers will occupy some 45 days—and Brady's new phone system will doubtless be in operation by the middle of June.

UNITED WE STAND.

Friend J. M. Smith was here from the Rochelle neighborhood yesterday, and called attention to a very important point in the food economics situation. Mr. Smith stated many farmers, himself included, had their land in shape and were only waiting for a rain to begin planting. "But when planting-time comes, where are we going to get the seed?" was his inquiry. "The banks will help us to a certain degree, and for some their help may be sufficient, but with the enormous prices on everything, it is not a question of wanting to plant food crops, but a question of getting the seed to plant."

Mr. Smith says this is a matter of serious import, and one which calls for united action upon the part of farmers, agricultural associations and business men. He suggests the calling of a monster mass meeting to discuss this problem.

McCulloch county is not alone in this problem—practically all of her neighbor counties are likewise situated. In fact, it is a question of state-wide and national importance. Farmers should get together and discuss their needs, and then bring the results of their consultation to the attention of the agricultural department of A. & M. college, or Commissioner of Agriculture, Fred W. Davis, or other head agricultural agencies of the state.

### LYRIC PROGRAM.

### Friday Night's Feature Will Be "Idle Wives"

On tomorrow (Wednesday) night, Henry D. Walthall, who took the part of the "Little Colonel" in the "Birth of a Nation," will star in the 5-reel drama, "Little Shoes." Walthall is one of the best of movie actors, and in this new play is said to be superb.

Thursday night a great 5-reel drama, "Her New York," is billed and on Saturday night in addition to the serial "Pearl of the Army," there will be presented the picture, "For Uncle Sam's Navy," in two reels, and also the comedy entitled the "New Cook."

This play deals with the artificiality of so-called "society," and has its climax in a scene that will wring the most stony heart. Like other features heretofore presented, this play has been secured at a great cost, and is one of the recent sensations in all the larger cities. Other features announced are the greatest of all war pictures, "War Brides," an 8-reel drama that has aroused the entire nation. This play will be presented on Tuesday, May 1st. Also Mary Pickford in her great success, "Less Than The Dust," George M. Cohan's New York success, "Broadway Jones," and "20,000 Leagues Under Sea." Dates for these plays will be announced later.

### MARY BAKER EDDY MEMORIAL

The memorial to Mary Baker Eddy, the Discoverer and Founder of Christian Science, erected in Mt. Auburn Cemetery at Cambridge, Mass., has been turned over to The Christian Science Board of Directors by Elbert S. Barlow of New York, who had charge of its construction. Over a year and a half has been required to complete it. Christian Scientists throughout the world have contributed, as expressions of sentiment, the entire cost of over \$150,000.

The memorial is of Bethel white granite and consists of an open circular colonnade of eight columns fifteen feet in height surmounted by a cornice and cresting. The space inside the colonnade is to be filled with growing flowers. The columns rest on a stylobate of three steps, which also rest, at one side, on a broad platform of Pompton pink granite and, at the other, which is about five feet lower, on a double flight on circular steps. These are flanked on each side by a large pylon. The pylons were exhibited a short time ago at the American Institute of Architecture in New York, and were pronounced by several experts to be the finest pieces of carved granite ever executed. The detail is elaborated to an extent never before attempted in granite; some of the stems and leaves are practically free standing, so great is the relief.

Interviewed regarding memorial, the architect, Mr. Egerton Swartwout of New York, said: "The site is singularly pleasing; in fact, I question whether a finer site could anywhere be found. It can be seen from all sides equally well, close at hand from the cemetery road, and from a quarter of a mile away across the lake. Indeed, it is this body of water which forms the chief beauty of the site. There is a drop of approximately 10 feet from the level of the road to the level of the lake, there being a natural terrace on the axis of the plot which lends itself admirably to the architectural development of the memorial. The lake is unusually still, and has a mirror-like quality which reflects admirably the white granite of which the memorial is made.

"As to the memorial I think it can be said without contradiction that, leaving aside entirely any artistic excellence, such perfection and delicacy have never been attained before in this unyielding and enduring material. There is certainly nothing in modern times that can approach it nor, as far as I know, in any of the monuments of antiquity." Mr. Swartwout designed the new Missouri State capitol and the new Federal Building in Denver, and recently won the competition for the new George Washington memorial.

All that now remains to be done to complete the memorial to Mrs. Eddy is the planting for the landscape, which is to consist chiefly of some evergreen plants that will preserve their form and leaves throughout the year, and some cedars and rhododendrons.
