To Be Held on Wednesday Night, June 6th, on Court House Square.

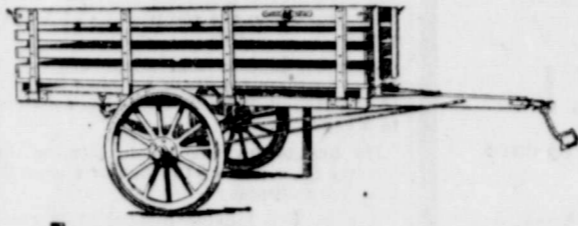
Arrangements are now being completed for the holding of the annual meeting of the Brady Y. M. B. L. on Wednesday of next week, June 6th, on the court house lawn.

MORE RECRUITS JOIN THE FLAG

Three to Aviation Corps—Two To Army—One with Marines.

Six more of Brady's young men have enlisted under the starry flag of Uncle Sam—three in the aviation corps, two in the army and one with the marines. With those who have hitherto enlisted, practically every branch of Uncle Sam's service now has a representative—the army, the navy, the marines, the truck drivers and finally the aviation corps.

Responding to special messages calling them to the colors, Messrs. Boy Crothers, Bill White and Bostic Roddy left Monday for San Antonio. They had previously passed all the tests required, and had been on the reserve list awaiting instructions to report.

Monday evening Elbert Beach and O. M. Roberts, two more of Brady's highly esteemed and popular young men, left for Waco with the announced intention of joining the army. Then word was received here in a message from Burette Tipton stating that Lewis Tipton had passed the rigid examination for the marine corps, and had left Monday night for the training station at Port Royal, South Carolina.

Brady now has twelve men in Uncle Sam's service, and the total number furnished so far by McCulloch county is probably double that number.
