**M'CCULLOCH RED CROSS \$12,500**

Brady Contributes \$5,140.50—Showing Places McCulloch Among Top-Notchers.

The Brady Red Cross week's campaign in McCulloch county has brought most gratifying returns and throughout McCulloch there is general satisfaction felt at the splendid showing made. In fact, the Brady Red Cross will have contributed a much larger amount in proportion to population and wealth, than any of her neighbor counties. While the campaign was not started until Monday, the 18th, in just one week's time the citizens had thrown off their apathy, and men, women and children were gladly contributing as freely as their hearts directed and their pocketbooks permitted. Little children put their names on the list for a dollar, expecting to make the money by chopping cotton or by some other means. Many men gave sums freely, and the ladies were not slow to do their part as well. As a result practically every community did itself proud, and some of them gave much more liberally than had ever been hoped for.

The checking of the lists was in itself no small task, and Evans Adkins, assisted by Paul Calvert, worked continuously at the task until this morning before getting it into shape where it could be given out. The following is the amount contributed by the various communities, according to the audit, and is complete, with the exception of Rochelle, the figures from that place not having so far been obtained. It is certain, though that they will reach the \$1200 estimate.

Brady Red Cross is an auxiliary of the Brownwood Red Cross society, and compared with the contributions in Brown county, McCulloch has made a remarkable showing. According to Wednesday evening's Brownwood Bulletin, contributions in that county up to Tuesday night had totalled \$12,500, and it was thought that additional subscriptions would be reported which would bring this total up to \$14,000. Brownwood's apportionment was \$30,000 and the campaign was continued one day longer there than in McCulloch. Also Brownwood had her campaign under way before Brady had become interested in the matter.

Too much cannot be said in praise of the excellent work of the team captains and their committees, the various speakers and the local committees. Only by arousing the citizens to the urgent need of the funds for which the campaign was inaugurated, and by acquainting them with the incidents leading up to the declaration of war by the United States, was McCulloch's magnificent contribution made possible.

**Death of Charles Behrens.**  
The death of Chas. Behrens, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. J. Behrens, Jr., occurred Sunday morning at the family home in the Voca community. The young man was 20 years and 8 months of age, and had succumbed to pneumonia, with which he had suffered for the past 26 days. Funeral services were held Monday, Rev. C. C. Mayo officiating, and interment was made in the Voca cemetery.

While but a youth, Chas. Behrens gave promise of being a most useful and successful citizen. Of splendid habits and agreeable disposition, he was highly esteemed and admired by all who knew him. He was a member of the Baptist church and had led an upright Christian life, and in every respect was a model in the community in which he lived.

He leaves his parents, one brother and four sisters, and a host of friends to mourn his untimely end.

**Enlisting Railroad Men**

Corporal Harry Boldman, who is in charge of the recruiting with over a pound of publication the following communication from M. G. Holliday, captain of cavalry, in regard to enlistment of railroad men:

"Any railroad man can be accepted, if qualified, for the 7th Reserve Engineers, National army. This does not mean only track and bridge men as heretofore. Only authority at present is to enlist as private—\$30.00. Promotion to be made, if qualified, after joining regiment. Men to be sent to Fort Sam Houston for physical examination and enlistment. From there they are to be sent to Atlanta, Ga."
