SECURE ANOTHER HIGHWAY ROUTE

Houston-Austin-Brady Highway Designated by Highway Commission.

Thanks to the timely work of F. R. Wulff, secretary of Brady Y. M. B. L., assisted by Bailey Jones, Brady has been placed on another highway route—and better than that the route also bears Brady's name—the Houston-Austin-Brady highway. Learning late Saturday that action was to be taken on the designation of this route, Messrs. Wulff and Jones drove to Austin, where they appeared before the highway commission to present Brady's claims Tuesday. Brady is already represented on the State Highway Commission's official map as possessing five highways, and the commission was rather loathe to accredit Brady with another. It was pointed out to them, however, that Brady was in the geographical center of Texas, and that all who traversed the state from east to west or from north to

ARRESTS FOREIGNER.

Man Wanted by U. S. Authorities Taken in Charge.

Sheriff Wall yesterday afternoon received a message from the station agent at Mercury advising him to meet a Brady-bound cattle train and take charge of a man on board who was wanted by U. S. authorities. Sheriff Wall found the man, all right, who submitted to arrest without any trouble. The prisoner gave his name as Gottlieb Orawitz, showed his registration card and upon being questioned states that he had boarded the train at Brooksmith to come to Brady where he expected to take the Santa Fe noon train for Yoakum, where his father lives.

Sheriff Wall phoned the sheriff's office at Brownwood of his capture, and was advised that the man was wanted by government authorities at Waco. As near as could be learned, Orawitz was one of two men who applied for registration at a small place near May, Texas, in Brown county, and while waiting for their

cards became so abusive, cursing the government, the president and things in general, that the registration officers feared for their lives. The occurrence was reported to Brownwood officers, and last week federal authorities took action and ordered the arrest of the men.

The two men had been employed by the Frisco as section hands and the captive was plentifully supplied with money, having something like \$22 in cash, besides a \$70 check drawn on the Brook Smith bank at Brownwood and another check for something over \$20. In his pockets were some photos and other trinkets, but not a scrap of writing. The photos, said Orawitz, were those of his children, and he stated that he had divorced his wife.

Orval Jackson has written an interesting letter to home folks about his army experiences since joining the hospital corps a couple weeks ago, and we are permitted to give the following extract from the letter, which was dated at Camp Wilson, near San Antonio, July 12th:

"This has been a hard week so far. Monday was light as we were ununiformed then. Tuesday, from 6:00 a. m. to about 7:30 p. m. we, 7 of us, were on (K. P.)—Kitchen Police; that is, doing everything from scrubbing the floor of the supply room, peeling potatoes, washing dishes to baking pies. As we were at mess No. 1, the officers camp, the K. P.'s had to serve. In the other two mess halls 3 and 4 in the Casual Camp the men pass by and hold their plates while the K. P.'s fill them up. I made a hit with the chief cook. He wanted me to transfer and become a cook and accordingly put me to work helping a fellow cook 30 pies. You ought to see me in undershirt and blue overalls before two army ranges—putting in and taking pies out of the ovens. We worked awful hard but had all we wanted to eat, and all the lemonade we could drink.

"Yesterday we drilled 4 hours. Two hours in the morning and two in the afternoon, having fifteen minutes drill and fifteen minutes rest. The men and officers make everything just as easy as possible if they see you are trying to do something. Yesterday morning our drill master catered a little to the profane and in the calisthenics

The Clothing Issue detail were sent in an army truck to the Quadrangle to the Clothing headquarters where the truck was loaded with uniforms, underwear, etc., and carried back to Camp Wilson. One big man was ununiformed this morning who had a No. 12 or 13 foot. They wired headquarters for shoes large enough for him. Some of his other clothes will have to be made to special order.

"Two shirts, 2 trousers, 1 overall and jumper, 3 undershirts and drawers, 4 pair of socks, 1 pair leggings, hat and hat cords and one pair of shoes is issued to each man. Also, everyone gets a toilet outfit containing a razor, razor brush, brush and comb, bar of toilet soap, shoe brush and polish, tooth brush, 2 towels, whiskbroom and a 'housewife' (containing needles, thread, etc)

At Roswell conditions were not so bad, as there is plenty of water at a shallow depth, but at that conditions were nothing like normal, and the apple crop was far below the average. Returning they encountered a big rain at Big Springs; in fact, from Lamesa to within a few miles of Brady the roads were muddy, and in some places the rain had been very heavy and considerable water was standing along the road sides.

L. P. Yocham, Number 250, Is Drawn—Draft Began at 9:30 This (Friday) Morning.

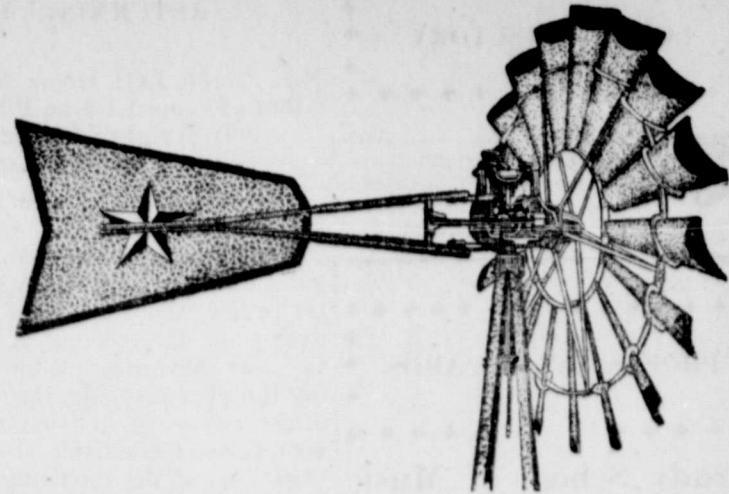

**TELEPHONE CO.
HAS OPEN HOUSE**

**Between 500 and 600 Citizens
Inspect New Quarters and
Pay Many Compliments.**

Yesterday from 2:30 until 11:00 p. m., the West Texas Telephone Co. held a reception in their new quarters in the Masonic building, invitation to which had been extended all the citizens of Brady and McCulloch county. The interest in Brady's new telephone equipment was manifested by the attendance of between 500 and 600 people at the reception, and from the opening hour until the close there was a steady stream of callers, sometimes as many as fifty being on hand at one time. This evidence of interest and appreciation was very pleasing to the management, who were made to feel that their efforts have been recognized and approved, and this feeling was further strengthened by the words of commendation and expressions of pleasure at the arrangement and detail of the office.

Without exception everyone had a word of praise for the splendid rest room established for the benefit of the employes, and, likewise, the employes are deeply appreciative of the manner in which the company has arranged for their comfort.

Rare foresight has been used by the management in building this plant, and every arrangement has been made to eventually give the plant a capacity of 2,000 subscribers. At present there are switchboard facilities for the addition of 360 more local lines. Should the plant grow beyond this capacity, additional space for the extension of the switchboard can be secured by merely taking out the partitions and adding the present manager's office to the operating room, while the manager's office would then occupy the front room, at present vacant. It must be understood that this is made possible by reason of the plant being built upon a unit system, permitting of the addition of other units as needed, just in the same manner as building up a sectional bookcase.

The present equipment includes six switchboard positions—two toll, one rural and three local. The toll test equipment is arranged to take care of 40 toll lines and there are 80 rural lines. Eight hundred pairs of cables at present come into the office, and there is space for 400 pair more.

On the main distributing frame there are three forms of lightning protection for the benefit of the telephone users in case of an electrical storm. The first is the fuse. Should this burn out, there is a carbon and mica block and lastly there is a heat coil to protect the subscriber from the elements.

In the matter of current, provision has also been made for the future. Whenever the present direct current is discarded for the alternating current, as it will be within a few years, all that will be necessary will be to replace the present motor and

generator with one adapted to alternating current and which is already provided and ready awaiting the change.

In the hallway in an enclosed cupboard are contained the storage batteries, which operate upon the same basis as an auto storage battery. The cabinet is kept closed and ventilators carry away any fumes that might endanger the health of employes.

Adjoining the operating room is the manager's office and to the rear is the work and storage room.

The splendid southern exposure, together with the elevation makes the new office one of the most delightful in town, and the care of the management has made working conditions ideal. Traffic Manager D. J. Johnson of Brownwood and Manager Whiteman, assisted by the young lady operators and assistants showed the visitors yesterday every courtesy, explaining in minutest detail the working of the switchboard and all the equipment, answering questions and blushing modestly at the fulsome praise that came their way. Then to make matters complete, the visitors were escorted to the front room before leaving where punch was served—adding the last artistic touch to a most enjoyable occasion.
