

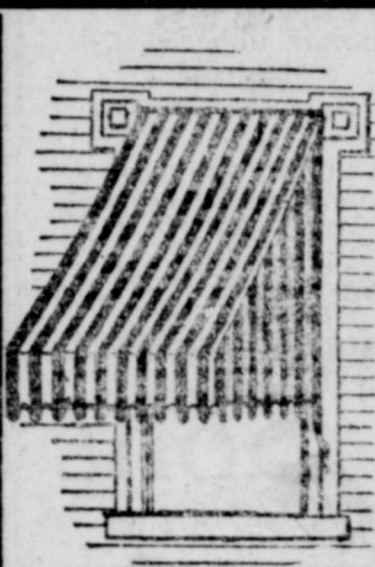

REBEKAHS WIN MEDAL 3RD TIME

Degree Team Makes Grade Equalling Champion Team of State. Assembly Was Success.

Brady Odd Fellows and Brady Rebekahs covered themselves with glory in their entertainment of the delegates and visitors to the annual assembly of the West Texas Odd Fellows and Rebekahs association, and incidentally demonstrated to the delegates and visitors that the Brady lodges are among the best in the state by capturing all medals and prizes offered in contest work.

The most notable incident of the entire meeting was the drill on Wednesday night in which the local Ruthel Rebekah degree team, for the third successive time, captured the gold medal, which gives the medal into their possession permanently. The drill was the prettiest ever executed and was witnessed by every Rebekah member in attendance upon the assembly. There was no contest made by any other team for the medal, but so perfectly did the Brady team perform that they were graded 98—a grade equalling that of the state champion degree team. The awarding of the medal was made in a very pretty speech by Mrs. W. D. Littler, of Ft. Worth, president of the Rebekah assembly of Texas.

For her splendid work as captain of the degree team, Mrs. J. R. Lovelace was presented with a medal in an appropriate speech by President Henry Hodges.

Other honors received by Brady Rebekahs were in individual charges, to Mrs. N. G. Lyle, Past Grand charge; Mrs. Lora Walker, Vice-Grand charge; Mrs. Lula Bashaw, Chaplain charge.

The assembly opened at 9:00 o'clock Wednesday morning at the Methodist tabernacle, with President Henry Hodges presiding. Following invocation by Rev. J. T. Forester, Hon. Joe A. Adkins welcomed the delegates and visitors to Brady in happy and characteristic manner. On behalf of the Odd Fellows, Hon. Tom Leach of Brownwood made an interesting response, and Mrs. C. W. Bashaw gave a splendid response in behalf of the Rebekahs. Other excellent addresses were made by Mrs. W. D. Littler of Fort Worth and Mr. J. S. Jones of Santa Anna.

At noon was staged the big barbecue dinner, justly famed because of its excellence and the splendid manner in which the local members cared for the 200 delegates and visitors. The long tables were loaded with an array of good things that served to appease the sharpest of appetites and the recollections of which linger pleasantly still. So well had preparations been made that there was an abundance of everything left, and the visitors were invited to take supper there also.

Wednesday afternoon a business session was held at the tabernacle, and several more speeches were enjoyed, among others being one by S. A. Foster of Okla.

At night while the Rebekahs were having their drills and contests, the Odd Fellows were entertained most enjoyably in the K. of P. hall with addresses and other forms of entertainment.

Yesterday the association was honored by visits from Judge C. H. Jenkins and E. J. Miller of Brownwood, and Mrs. W. L. Doss of Colorado, Texas, grand warden, all of whom made splendid and entertaining addresses. Talks were made also by L. W. Yarbrough of Bangs, and Mrs. Littler of Fort Worth.

A very pretty compliment was paid Mrs. H. R. Hodges for her splendid work with the local organization in the presentation to her by the association of a beautiful cut glass vase. Mrs. Hod-

ges is one of the original charter members of the local degree team and during the past four years has labored faithfully and earnestly to aid them in the success they have achieved, as well as being a faithful worker in the local lodge, and appreciation was thus thoughtfully made by the entire association, Mrs. Littler making the speech of presentation.

In the election of officers, J. L. Patterson of Bangs was chosen president; J. S. Jones, Santa Anna, 1st vice-president; Mrs. J. D. Visart, Bangs, 2nd vice-president; Mrs. Nellie Kington, Brownwood, secretary; Mrs. C. S. Thaxton, Comanche, treasurer. Brownwood was chosen as the meeting place for the next association.

Mention of the assembly would not be complete if failure was made to mention the special musical numbers which contributed greatly to the enjoyment of the occasion. These were instrumental trios by Prof. J. C. Robbins, daughter and son; vocal solos by Miss Nettie Bellamy, and chorus by Mesdames Duke Mann, C. S. Broad, Miss Nettie Bellamy and Messrs. W. J. Yantis, N. T. Cook and C. W. Bashaw.

As grand finale, the visitors and members were treated to a watermelon feast on the east court house lawn, the delicious ice-cold melons being provided with the compliments of Messrs. J. T. and Duke Mann, and this act of thoughtfulness was highly appreciated by all.

BRADY WOULD GET TEXOKAN HIGHWAY

Brady Live Wires in Abilene to Route Kansas City Highway Via McCulloch County.

Brady Y. M. B. L. Secretary F. R. Wulff, accompanied by a body of live wires composed of Messrs. G. C. Kirk, Joe McCall, C. A. Trigg, J. H. White, Howard Broad and Sam McCollum left yesterday noon for Abilene, Texas where a meeting was scheduled for this morning to decide the further routing of the Texokan highway, at present routed from Kansas City as far as Abilene. The committee expected to make strong representations for Brady, and, if possible, direct the highway through McCulloch county. The fact that Brady at present has five highways mapped, and therefore has that number of outlets, is proving a great inducement to direct other highways this way, as tourists are thereby enabled to choose the balance of their trip in any direction desired.

The Texokan highway, as its name indicates, runs through the states of Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas, and would give Brady connections with the heart of the United States. It is a highway independent of those logged through the state by the Texas highway commission, and is being projected by Kansas City good roads enthusiasts.

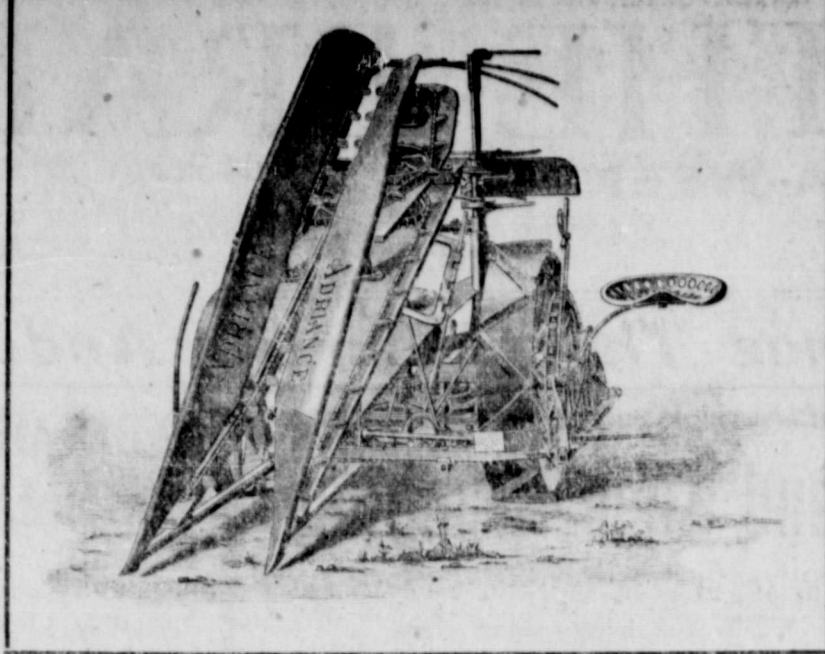

An Old-Timer.

Our good friend, W. E. Lohn was here from Lohn Tuesday and we had an enjoyable chat with him. Mr. Lohn can very near be ranked as one of the natives, having come here in 1879, and he says in the past 38-years he has had experiences that make him still have confidence in McCulloch county. He recalled the dry year of 1887; when the cattle had nothing but mesquite leaves and twigs to live on. Of course cattle were comparatively few and the range was open. On the 10th of August there came a good rain and more feed was made that fall than could be used. Cotton at that time was not grown here. Then in 1893 there was another dry year, with no rain all summer. Lewis Bray, father of the Bray children, became very much discouraged; the grass was gone and even the roots appeared dead. Mr. Lohn prophesied rain the early part of May, but Mr. Bray decided even if it did rain, nothing could ever grow, so he began moving. When he reached Dublin about the 10th of May, the rain came, and as if by magic the country came to life and all nature greened up once more. Mr. Bray made one crop in Williams county and then decided McCulloch was the place for him and spent the balance of his life here.

Mr. Lohn's reminiscences were caused by a recent trip he made to Ballinger and the San Angelo country. He says conditions there beggar description. Ballinger depends upon the Colorado for water, and the Colorado was dry in most places. Many farmers with expensive irrigation plants, some of which had been installed only the past year,

were in despair. However, a rain was had the past week, and Mr. Lohn was in hopes this rain might have put some water in the dry holes.

He is fully confident that it will rain in plenty time for McCulloch citizens to make good feed crops, and showed his confidence in his statement by renewing his subscription for two years in advance—"just so he wouldn't be bothered about it in the meantime."

FIX McCULLOCH'S QUOTA AT 101 MEN

Local Board Not Yet Instructed as to Credits or Exemptions. May Examine 400 Men.

The quota of McCulloch county in the first draft has been placed at 101 men. While the official draft list has not yet been received by the local exemption board, nor yet any instructions as to credits or exemptions, the idea prevails that married men, as a class, will be exempted. With approximately 60 per cent of the registrants married, and with the probability that 50 per cent of the unmarried men will be exempted because of physical disability or other causes, it is estimated that only one man in four will be chosen for service. This would mean that about the first 400 may be called before the board for examination.

Just how many credits for enlistment McCulloch county is entitled to, has not yet been ascertained. Registered men, who are subject to call, may enlist in any service they desire up to the time of notification to appear before the local board for examination. After notification to appear before this board, registrants are no longer at liberty to follow their desires as to enlistment.
