FANCY PRICE FOR GOULASH

Danish Merchant Plays Joke on German Government and Makes Fat Profit Out of Deal.

First, I sincerely hope that the good editor is entirely well by this time.

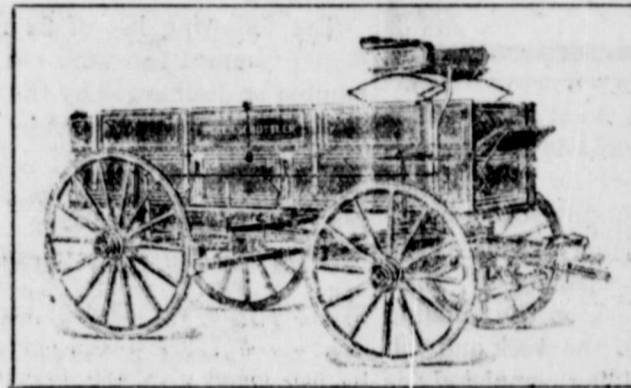

RUSSIA'S LOST MICA FIELDS

Long Before Window Glass Was Made Czars' Kingdom Supplied World With Mica.

Long before window glass was made Russia supplied the world with mica. In 1681 she exported 42,600 kilograms to Holland, 40,000 kilograms to England and 8,600 kilograms to America. (A kilogram equals about two and a fifth pounds). As the glass industry grew that of mica waned, and so completely that the deposits of mica were forgotten. Before the present war Russia was actually importing mica from Canada and India. Today some of the mica beds have been rediscovered in the Mamsky forest, which is now producing 6,000 kilograms annually. Other deposits are being worked in the Ural mountains, near Archangel, and in Siberia. The price has risen from about \$1.50 a pound to about \$35 a pound.

BANANA MARMALADE.

Banana marmalade is produced nowadays in great quantities. Tons of it have been shipped for the use of the armies at the front. It is a firm product, of dull brownish red color, the natural result of preserving just as white apple slices turn a rusty brown on drying. The flavor of the compost, oddly enough, suggests a combination of currant, raspberry and strawberry preserves, although no extraneous flavoring whatever has been incorporated in its manufacture.—Scientific American.

CATHEDRALS OF PERU



CATHEDRAL OF LIMA

THE traveler in South America who studies the various features of the history of that continent, the life of colonial times and that which followed it as the national life of the separate countries, soon discovers that there is a well-defined line of demarcation between that time when the people borrowed their artistic inspiration from the traditional sources in Europe and that later time when local influences began to be felt and when the continent developed its own artistic sense that demanded some original expression. This statement applies to the industries that were first brought over from Europe across the Atlantic; it is true of the social life and of education in all the republics of the southern continent manifesting characteristics which are peculiarly their own; it is likewise true of municipal and governmental affairs and finally in regard to the construction of their buildings, especially of the architecture ecclesiastical edifices of the diocesan capitals, says the French edition of the Bulletin of the Pan-American union. As an example of the colonial epoch in church architecture the cathedral of Lima offers a good illustration. That country has one archbishopric, that of Lima, eight dependent bishoprics, viz., Arequipa, Huancayo, Chachapoyas, Ayacucho, Puno, Trujillo, Cuzco, and Huaraz.

In connection with the name of Lima two characters will always be intimately associated with its historic memories; Pizarro, the intrepid conqueror, whose remains rest in the cathedral whose corner stone he laid, who founded the capital and gave it the name of La Ciudad de los Reyes (the city of the kings); and second a young girl who renounced a life of social ease and pleasure and became renowned for her piety, a renown which resulted in her canonization by Pope Clement IX in 1671 under the name of Saint Rosa of Lima, the patron saint of the capital city as well as of all Catholic South America.

It was Pizarro who laid the plans for the imperial city, including the erection of a great metropolitan church. It was not finished and dedicated until 1590 and it was at the request of Charles V of Spain that Pope Paul III raised the see of Lima to an archbishopric. As a consequence it was determined to rebuild the edifice, and the work was started under auspicious circumstances. Owing to various interruptions, changes of plans, and other delays the building was not finished until 1625. Not long after the consecration of the cathedral, by order of the Spanish viceroy, the mortal remains of the great conquistador were transferred to the edifice and now rest in a splendid sarcophagus in one of the chapels.

In 1746 an earthquake made a mass of ruins of the city of Lima, the cathedral being among the buildings seriously damaged. In 1758 it was finally completely restored. The building is of gray stone, and is the largest of the old Spanish ecclesiastical edifices of South America. The facade is 480 feet wide, the crowning feature of the building being its two massive square towers. The many columns and architectural decorations are for the most part Corinthian in style; it has five naves, each consisting of nine arched vaults, the two aisles being formed of ten chapels. The choir and stalls are of cedar and mahogany and are ornamented with remarkably fine wood carving, while among the treasures of the church are to be found some excellent paintings, among them being a fine Murillo and one of Rembrandt's masterpieces.

Arequipa Cathedral Is Old.

Among the cathedrals of Peru that of Arequipa is one of the oldest and most interesting. The city was raised to a bishopric in 1537 and the erec-

tion of the cathedral was commenced in 1612. It was completed in due course, but in 1844 its interior was partially destroyed by fire, many of its rich treasures, paintings, and other possessions being lost. The rebuilding took 20 years, and four years after its restoration it again suffered some damage from the terrible earthquake of 1868. The structure faces the Plaza de Armas, its facade measuring 450 feet in length. It has three entrances and the building is supported by 70 large columns of composite Ionic and Doric style, lending it a massive and splendid appearance. The interior is divided into three naves, separated by superb columns that support the great arches above with harmonious effect. The main altar is of marble, and the pulpit of beautifully carved wood.

Huanuco, capital of the department of the same name, was made an episcopal see in 1855. The once large population of the city has dwindled since the discovery of the famous copper mines at Cerro de Pasco until now there are perhaps about 8,000 left. The cathedral which fronts the plaza is chiefly remarkable for its solid construction, having stone arches and a high and pointed steeple. This is accounted for by the fact that severe earthquakes have never visited this immediate section.

Chachapoyas has been a bishopric since 1843. The cathedral is a simple one-story structure of brick, having two square towers to relieve the plainness of the facade.

Ayacucho, a bishopric since 1920, has a cathedral of more pretentious architecture built of volcanic rock from the Picota mountains. Puno, raised to a bishopric in 1861, has a cathedral which is well constructed and quite ornate in architectural embellishment. The space of the facade between the two towers is highly ornamented and has a number of fine statues of saints placed in open niches as an unusual feature.

Trujillo's Two Large Towers.

Trujillo, an episcopal see since 1577, has a large and substantial cathedral whose architectural features are two large towers with a cupola over the center of the building. Many fine paintings decorate the sacristy. The general plan of the building is similar to that of the cathedral of Lima, but on a smaller scale.

Cuzco, the ancient capital of the Incas, was made a bishopric as early as 1539. Construction of the cathedral was begun the same year, but for one reason and another the building was not completed until 90 years thereafter. It is in the style of the Spanish renaissance and was built of stone at a tremendous cost. The interior consists of three naves separated by stone pillars which support the high vaulted arches. In the central nave is the choir, the carving of which is superb. In front of it stands the high altar, covered with silver. Two fine organs fill the church with the music of their rich tones on Sundays and feast days. Among the most valuable of its treasures is a painting, "El Senor de la Agonia," said to be one of Van Dyck's masterpieces. In the sacristy are portraits of the popes and of all the bishops of Cuzco. One of the most precious possessions of the cathedral is the monstrance, which is ornamented with pearls, diamonds, emeralds, rubies, and other precious stones of great value.

Huaraz was made an episcopal see in 1890 and the erection of a new cathedral is being contemplated.

NEW WAR VESSEL IS UNCANNY

Coast Defense Boat Invented by John Hays Hammond, Jr., Operated From Shore by Wireless.

The most uncanny vessel afloat in American waters is anchored in the cove at West Gloucester, Mass., says the Kansas City Star. The only craft to be seen, it is the new coast defense boat, invented by John Hays Hammond, Jr. You feel that it is uncanny when you look at it afloat in the little harbor and realize that without a soul on board it can nevertheless be directed in any direction, and when it is in line with an enemy ship it can fire a broadside as effectively as a big man-of-war with a full crew and complement of trained gunners.

The wireless is the explanation. From the coast Mr. Hammond can start the motor on the boat, set the steering gear as he likes and then train the guns on any desired target. It is just another of the marvels which modern warfare has brought into being.

As to its practicability, the inventor is modest but positive. "It's all right for coast defense work," he says, "and it is comparatively so simple that one a week can be turned out by a shipbuilder without difficulty. In the event of a big order, the parts could be standardized and made in wholesale lots, so that the output could be greatly increased."

CROSSING LEGS HURTS HEART

"You Know What Happens to a Stream of Water When You Squeeze Garden Hose," Says Physical Expert.

"Every time a man crosses his legs he gives his heart that much extra work to do," says William Muldoon, according to an exchange. "You know what happens to a stream of water when you squeeze the garden hose."

This widely known physical instructor attaches great importance to proper breathing. He told me of the trouble he had in making John L. Sullivan breathe properly, and he dwelt on the harm that numbers of Americans do themselves (witness the prevalence of catarrhal affections) by the bad habit of mouth breathing.

"Keep your mouths shut. Breathe through your nostrils," he is always saying to his patients.

If the nostrils are stopped up he explains how they may be made to function properly by simple cleansing ablutions and he insists that these be performed regularly.

"We need filtered air just as we need filtered water, and the nose is our filter."
