THIRD CALL FOR SELECTIVE ARMY TWENTY PER CENT

Twenty men will make up the quota for the third call in the selective army, Judge Joe A. Adkins of the local exemption board having last night received advice to call out 20 percent of McCulloch county's total quota of 101 men for the first selective army.

The men will be mobilized at 2:00 o'clock p. m., Tuesday, and will then be excused until 11:00 o'clock Wednesday morning at which time they are to be assembled at the union depot, taking their departure over the Santa Fe for Camp Travis, near San Antonio. One of the rules of the draft officials is that members of the draft must be assembled at the depot one hour before the departure of the train; no doubt to avoid any possible excuse for not having made proper connections.

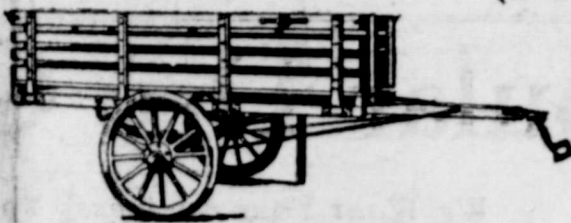

many roses and be flooded with sunshine.

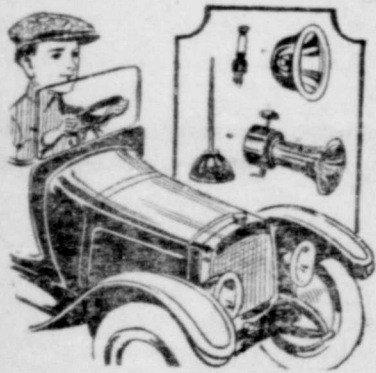

Stacy Boy Made Corporal.

Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Burrow of Stacy, are in receipt of an interesting letter from their son, Lloyd, in which he tells of his journey from Texas to New York, where he is now stationed. His address is R. L. Burrow, Truck Co. No. 5, 117 Supply Train, 42nd Div., Garden City, L. I., New York. The letter follows:

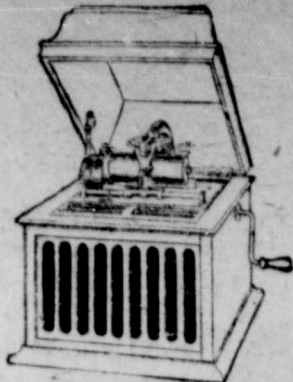
up this afternoon. We have a Just arrived—got our tents lovely place up here and the climate is fine. We came through lots of fine country on our way up. Came through Dallas and Texarkana, Arkansas, Mississippi, Tennessee, part of Alabama, Georgia, Virginia, Maryland, Delaware, Pennsylvania and New York. Stopped and drilled in Memphis; drilled right by the Presbyterian church. Took a bath at the Y. M. C. A.—six hundred of us, mind you. Bristol, Va., Lynchburg, Va., Philadelphia, Pa., Washington, Delaware and New York City are the principal cities we passed through.

We drilled awhile in Washington; stopped a while in Philadelphia, but came into New York three stories under the ground and across the river in the tube. They take those trains into New York under the ground with an electric motor five miles in three minutes.

Now we are about 15 miles from the heart of the city and about twenty-five minutes ride. We all get to go to town Saturday night. You know there might be something doing there Saturday night. We were issued our winter clothes today and have more than I can carry. As soon as I get dressed up I will have my picture made and send you one.

I was made a corporal today, which pays \$36 in the U. S. and 20 per cent more in France. Our company consists of one lieutenant, sergeants and corporals, privates, first-class and just privates; so you see I don't rank the very lowest anyway.

Now, this Y. M. C. A. is full of soldiers and they are playing the piano and singing Dixie songs and Tipperary and I can't sit still any longer—so all of you write often and tell everyone hello for me.

MEXICAN GIVEN TWO YEARS IN PENITENTIARY

Late yesterday evening the jury in the case of State vs. Andres Munoz, Mexican, on trial for assault to murder Paul Cadena, another Mexican, brought in a verdict of guilty, and assessed punishment at two years in the penitentiary.

Another case which occupied the court's attention, and proved interesting, was a civil case tried before a jury and styled Southland Life Insurance Co. vs. J. T. and O. D. Mann, suit to establish a lien. The case had been before court for several years; a previous judgment had been set aside, and in the meantime the defendants had filed a cross bill for damages. The jury decided against the defendants and the verdict of the court has not yet been given out.

Court convened on Monday afternoon, at 1:30 o'clock, and up to last night, in addition to the two cases mentioned above, had disposed of the following:

Francisco Perez and Rejino Adame, who had just been indicted for theft of a sheep from E. W. Harris, were placed on trial this morning. The jury found them guilty and assessed punishment of four years in the penitentiary, but recommended a suspended sentence, which was given. The joy of the Mexicans was unconfined.

Suits to try title are now occupying the attention of the court.

Martiana Sepeda Triveno vs. Carlos Triveno, suit for divorce. Dismissed at cost of plaintiff.

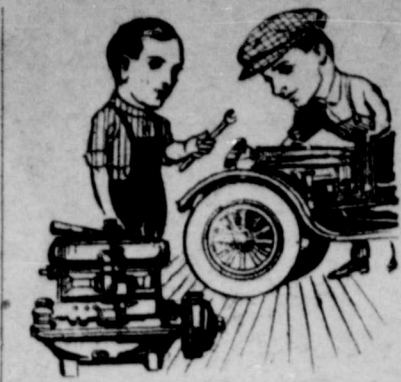

QUEEN HAD STORMY CAREER

Liliuokalani, Last Native Ruler of Hawaii, Was Dethroned Two Years After Succeeding to Power.

Lydia Kamekeha, Queen Liliuokalani, the last native ruler of Hawaii, was proclaimed queen in January, 1891, and two years later, on January 16, 1893, she was dethroned. She was born in 1838, and succeeded to the throne on the death of her brother, the wild and dissipated King Kalakaua. It soon became apparent that the feminine monarch of the "Pearl of the Pacific" was reactionary in her tendencies. Although she had taken as her spouse an American, John O. Dominis, a native of Boston, she was not friendly toward Americans, and not at all in sympathy with the progressive reform party, which had been successful in the revolution of 1887. The queen's husband died a few months after she gained the throne, and soon after that the queen became more than ever reactionary. It soon was apparent that she proposed to abolish the liberal constitution of 1887 and to restore the old despotic regime of absolute monarchy. A committee of safety was formed, and the day after she had proclaimed a new constitution in the direction of absolute power she was dethroned and a republic formed. In January, 1895, a royalist rebellion fomented by the ex-queen was foiled, and she was sentenced to modified imprisonment for five years, but, upon penning a renunciation of the throne, she was released.

EITHER BLUE OR NOT BLUE

According to Scientists, There Are but Two Colors for the Eye—Law of Heredity.

What is the color of your eyes? In the light of science there are only two sorts of eyes—blue and not blue. It is a fact that all eyes are blue or blue-gray in ground, but a great many have some other pigment in front of the iris. Hence appears a strange law of heredity.

In a village of Burbage, Leicestershire, England, recently an interesting experiment was made. A group of members of the British association was drawn up in line along one side of a narrow lane.

FAMOUS TREES OF NEW YORK

Poplars in Two City Parks That Are Known to Be About Seventy-Five Years Old.

Three of the finest trees on Manhattan Island are the magnificent old poplars in Gramercy and Stuyvesant parks. Gramercy has one, near the center of the square, while the other two are in the western half of Stuyvesant park, near Second avenue. They are about seventy-five years old, and are decidedly the oldest trees in the lower part of Manhattan Island.

Their nearest rival stood, until a few years ago, in East River park, overlooking Hell Gate, not far from the ancient John Jacob Astor summer home. Beneath its shade Washington Irving is said to have rested while a guest of the Astors. It was blown down in a severe storm several years ago.

Stuyvesant park has several fine poplars, but the two on the west side of Second avenue, which bisects the park, are the best survivors of the days when that popular east side recreation place was laid out. They date from about 1836, when the park, from Fifteenth to Seventeenth street, was given to the city by Peter Gerard Stuyvesant, a great-great-grandson of the Dutch governor, Peter Stuyvesant.

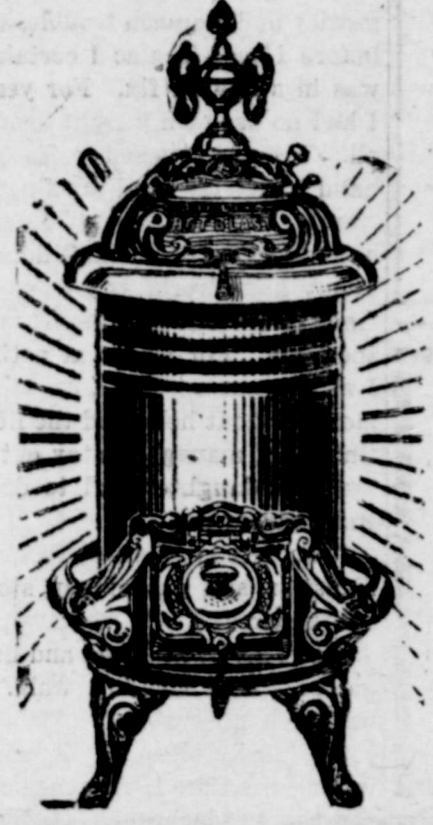

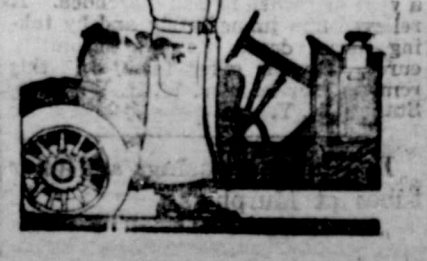

WILL MARK ALL OUR HIGHWAYS WITH MILE POSTS

At the regular meeting of the Brady Y. M. B. L. last Tuesday afternoon, it was decided to merge the McCulloch County Highway league with the Y. M. B. L. This action because the membership of each is practically identical, and the objects of the highway league are also the aim of the Y. M. B. L. B. A. Jones, who is 2nd vice-president of the Y. M. B. L. holds the office of president of the highway league.

A committee composed of F. R. Wulff, chairman, H. C. Samuel and G. C. Kirk was appointed to select sign posts for the county highways, and see to their erection. It is the plan to place a post at every mile upon all the highways traversing the county, and it is proposed to have these posts of timber 4x8 inches in diameter, and ten foot in length, set four foot deep in the ground, which would leave six feet projecting above the surface. Inquiries are now out as to the cost of such markers. Should this plan be found practical, McCulloch will be able to boast not only of as good roads as any in the state, but of the best marked highways.

Another committee composed of Bailey Jones, G. R. and W. N. White was named to represent the league and to co-operate with city and county in improving the public square. This matter has been so long delayed, and the square is in such bad condition

that something must be done at once, and it is hoped by mutual co-operation between these three bodies to attain the much desired improvement.

Yet another action of the Y. M. B. L. was the adopting of a resolution addressed to Governor Hobby endorsing a wild animal bounty. This bounty has become a National necessity by reason of the depredations made upon sheep, cattle, hogs and chickens, etc., by varmints, and in view of the President's call for food conservation and the need of the army for greater production of wool, this bounty has become an economic necessity.

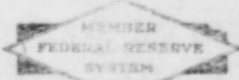

APPORTIONMENT OF COUNTY HIGH- WAY FUND REC'D

A warrant in the sum of \$1,356.75 was received from the State Highway department Sunday, by County Treasurer June Coopender, being McCulloch's apportionment of the new state highway tax. The law provides that half the amount received by the highway commission from the licensing of motor and other vehicles, shall be returned to the county from which it originated and is to be used for maintenance purposes only.

The tax imposed this year was for a period of six months only, from July 1, 1917, to January 1, 1918. Next year the tax will be for the full year, ending January 1, 1919, and the county apportionment is sure to be more than double, since many new vehicles will be in use and will, therefore, require license.

GRAND JURY RETURNS NINE INDICTMENTS

The following is the report of the grand jury for the September term which adjourned Saturday after having been in session all week:

To the Honorable J. O. Woodward, District Judge:

We, your grand jurors, duly empanelled and organized as such, for the September term, District court, 1917, respectfully submit to you the following report of our efforts:

We have been in session six days and have examined seventy-eight witnesses from various districts of this county. We have thoroughly examined all alleged offenses that have been reported to us, and have found the crime status to be very low in this county. We searched diligently for evidence in all cases reported to us, and found only nine bills, five felonies and four misdemeanors, after examining 27 cases reported to us for examination.

We have been unable to find any evidence of bootlegging going on in the county, and all laws seem to be well enforced so far as found. But it is a suggestion of the Grand Jury that some of the officers in Brady be more prudent, and better acquaint themselves with the extent of their authority.

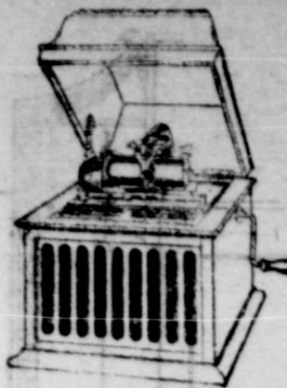
We have visited and examined the jail and found it to be in good condition, but found the courthouse to be in need of plastering, as recommended by the last Grand Jury, which we have discussed with each of the Commissioners; also brought to their attention the absence of sign boards, or mile posts, at all cross roads. We had a number of road overseers before us to see that they fail not to erect these mile posts substantially, indicating where the roads lead to, and the distance to each place.

The commissioners were instructed to have the City of Brady remove the fire bell from the dome of the courthouse in accordance with instructions from last Grand Jury. We also recommend that an expert auditor be employed by auditing committee to check up all the county records.
