we should increase the production of peanuts, soy beans, velvet beans, week. cow peas for human food as well as for feed and forage. Then increase liver. our supply of meat, and eggs, and

Save all possible waste products or the farm. Economize on time, labor phone. Use the best implements and more horse power and less hand power. Sell excess products of the farm and pay living expenses. A surplus of hogs poultry, eggs, soy beans, peanuts, milo and other products that you can grow should be produced for sale from the farm besides the production of cotton.

It is highly important that the practical farmer look after the care of the horses' shoulders. Sore shoulders are caused by neglect. The hor-ses that have not been worked have very tender shoulders, and too, most horses are thin and do not have the cushion of flesh over the shoulders to protect them that they usually have had. If the farmer will bathe the shoulders of the horses and mules at noon and at night in clear water, then clean off the collar before putting on each time, and see that the
