

The Tucker Oil Co. has found the production in their first shallow well at Lohn so satisfactory that they will drill five more wells at once. The announcement, made in last week's paper, was this week confirmed by W. F. Roberts, Jr., of Lohn, who will have ctive management of operations. As stated last week, the production of the first well tested out 20 barrels per day, which is the best of any well he sand cutting the washers on the wash the well out thoroughly again before continuing pumping. The well stands 130 feet in oil and water, being in the proportion of one part oil to two parts water, and this depth has not been lowered by continuous pumping during the nine-hours' test. WILL YOU HELP **OUR BOYS ABROAD?**

Every Man, Woman and Child Can Join to Send News of This Town Into the Front Line Trenches.

WHOLE NATION MOVES TO BANISH SOLITUDE

Our Heroes Are Calling From Over There-Give What You Can to Help Those From Home.

Every citizen interested in the boys of his home town now at the front, and in the brave women who equally are serving their country abroad, has an opportunity to show his appreciation of the sacrifice they are making. The opportunity comes as a result of the generosity and thought of Colonel William Boyce Thompson of New York, who has conceived and put into execution what is known as the Home Paper Service.

Under the plan, every man and woman in foreign service will receive the town newspaper, and so be kept in constant touch with the places and the people they know and love.

Every branch of the United States Government is interested in the plan. The Government realizes the importance of keeping those in the service happy and constantly in touch with their home ties and associations. Nothing is more depressing in a national emergency than the spirit of loneliness in those serving their country, and officials know that nothing can dispel this feeling more effectually than reading the home town newspaper.

Publishers of newspapers in all parts of the country-this newspaper included-have grasped with pleasure the plan outlined by Colonel Thompson. and they have agreed to co-operate in every way.

Under the ruling of the War Industries Board newspaper publishers are forbidden to send their newspapers free, even to soldiers. The newspaper must be subscribed for in the regular way, the only exception being soldiers who formerly were in the employ of the newspaper and who left that service to enlist. Colonel Thompson therefore proposes that the public in each community contribute to a fund so that the home newspaper (in our case this newspaper) may reach every man and woman now in the service of his coun-

Anyone may contribute to the fund, and any sum may be contributed. It is not necessary to contribute the entire amount of one subscription. It does not matter whether the rich man sends one hundred dollars or the poor boy little girl sends in five cents. Each gift will be a message of love and helpilness to the home town folks "Over There." The money will be lumped to one fund, out of which subscriptions will be entered as fast as the oney is received.

Contributors who send in the full rice of a year's subscription may, if ey wish, designate to what particular rson they wish the newspaper sent, ut if the name given is already listed s receiving the paper, then the pubher reserves the right to apply the bscription to some less fortunate soler boy or noble woman who is just as nely for news of home and home

The name of every contributor to this home paper service will be pubished in this newspaper, and the name of everyone entered for a subscription will be published as well as the number of those remaining whose subscriptions have not been covered.

If the amount of money received shall be more than is necessary to send the paper to every person from the town now in the service, then the balance will be turned over to the Re-

The plan is endorsed by the publisher of this newspaper without any thought of profit, either directly or indirectly, but with a sincere desire to help keep the home fires burning and to send to our heroes and heroines news of our town, to keep their hearts warm for us and to let them know

they are constantly in our minds. The publisher, of course, cannot make a profit on circulation, and additional circulation such as this will becirculation from non-purchasers sent far across the sea-can have no added value to the advertiser.

These facts are stated so that every contributor may feel that every cent contributed goes to the good cause.

CENSUS TAKEN OF TEXAS SILOS

FORT WORTH CHAMBER OF COM-MERCE SAYS ONLY 6,625

There are 6.625 silos on the farms of Texas and their combined capacity is 7,210 tons, according to an agricultural census which has just been com pleted by the Research and Publicity Bureau of the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce. This is an average of one silo to every 63 farms or one silo to every 2,000 head or livestock. The census includes returns from all but nine of the 252 counties of Texas. Those not report ing are unimportant agricultural counties and complete returns from these will not materially change the totals. Five years ago there were only 500 silos in Texas and two hundred of this number were in Brazoria County, which was the first Texas County to adopt the sile as a perma-

nent part of farming equipment. In making the silo survey only the most reliable authorities suked and data on which the census is based was procured mainly from United States Farm Demonstration Agents, County Food Administrators, Country Bankers and Secretaries of the various Texas Chambers of Com

That the silo is rapidly becoming a universal agricultural institution in Texas is indicated by the fact that less than two dozen counties in the State have no silos, while forty-one counties have fifty or more each.

Gulf Coast Country Leads.

South Texas has more silos than any other section of the State. This applies especially to the Gulf Coast numerous. Brazoria and Wharton Counties have 300 each and rank ahead of other counties of the State. both in total number and capacity. Nueces and San Patricio Counties each have 100 silos. The Panhandle country is also thickly sprinkled with these modern feed storages. Lubbock County has 200; Potter County 110; Dallam 60; Donley 40; Hansford 40. and several other Northwestern Texas Counties have as many as twenty each. The under-ground or pit silo is generally used in this section of the State.

Due principally to a shortage of farm labor and feed crops the silos in Texas are filled to only 80 per cent of their capacity this year, while in a few communities County Demonstration Agents report that silos have not proved successful and in some instances have been abandoned as impracticable. This is said to be largely due to a lack of understanding on the part of their owners and where farmers have carefully fol-lowed the advice and instructions of the United States Farm Demonstration Agents the silo has invariably proved indispensable in livestock


