The 3200 foot sand is making an exceptionally strong flow of gas, said to be strong enough to raise a dead weight of 150 pounds. The log of the Gulf well shows that that the first showing of oil was at 1945 feet, first showing of gas at 1955, second showing of oil at 2290, second showing of gas at 2590, third showing of gas at 2805. fourth showing of gas at 2876, fifth showing of gas at 2973, and the sixth at 3200. The last gas is of such capacity as to necessitate rebuilding of the derrick. - Coleman Democrat-Voice.




