## PULLMAN SER-**VICE RESTORED** AND IMPROVED

Effective yesterday morning, the Frisco railway restored through pullman service from Fort Worth to Menard. Not only has the pullman service been restored, but it is improved in form, and an effort has been put forth by railway officials to make the service adequate to the needs and requirements of this section.

The pullman now running through to Menard is a 12-section car, and instead of the three sections, as were heretofore reserved for Brady, six sections in the middle of the car have been set aside for our citizens. The section reserved for Brady are Nos. 3, 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10.

for all they were worth. One of them had his mask and face blown off; yet he was trying to talk, with the tears rolling down over the raw flesh. He died five minutes later.

One night, while I was lying back in the trench trying not to think of anything and go to sleep the bombs began to get pretty thick around there, and when I could not stand it any longer I rushed out into the bay of the fire trench and right up against the parapet, where it was safer.

Hundreds of star shells were being sent up by both sides and the field and the trenches were as bright as day. All up and down the trenches our men were dodging about, keeping out of the way of the bombe that were being thrown in our faces. It did not seem as if there was any place where it was possible to get cover. Most of the time I was picking dirt out of my eyes that explosions had driven

into them. If you went into a dagoet the men already in there would shout, "Don't stick in a bunch spread out? While you were in a dugout you kept expecting to be buried alive and when you went outside you thought the Boches were siming at you direct and there was no place at all where you felt I called it.

But the fire bay looked botter than the other places to me. I had not been there more than a few minutes when a big one dropped in and that bay was just one meas. Out of the 24 men in the bay only eight escaped.

I surely wished I was the gunner officer. I would have enjoyed it more if I could have got back at Fritz somebow. But I was not the gunner officer and I told him so. I had to shout at him quite a while before he would believe me. Then he wanted me to find the ganner officer, but I did not know where to find him. If could have got to our guns I guess ! would have had another medal for working overtime, but I missed the chance thera.

About this time another bomb came over and clouted out the best friend I had in my company. Before the war he had been one of the finest singers in the Paris eyern houses. When he was with us he used to say that the only difference between him and Caruso was \$2,500 a night.

A pollu and I dragged him into a dugout, but it was too late. One side of his face was blown off; the whole and four fingers of the right hand

I stuck my head out of the dugout and there was the captain discussing the matter with himself, cursing the Germans from here to Helgoland and putting in a word for the bombs every once in a while. All up and down the trenches you could hear our men cursing the Germans in all kinds of languages. Believe me, I did my bit and I could hear somebody else using good old United States cuss words. too. It certainly did not make me feel

Up the trench the third bay was simply smashed in and the Germans were placing bomb after bomb right in it and in ours. The captain yelled out that he was going up to the next bay to examine it, but no more had he got there than he had his heed taken clean off his shoulders.

At daybreak our trenches were all pounded in and most of our dugouts were filled up. Then Fritz opened up with his artillery fire right on us. Many of them came half way across, then dropped their guns and ran for our trenches to give themselves up. They could not

have got back to their own trenches. It was a shame to waste a shell on these poor fish. If they had been civvies the law would revent you from hitting them-you know the kind, They could hardly drag themselves along.

That is the way they look when you have got them. But when they have got you-kicks, cuffs, bayonet jabsthere is nothing they will not do to add to your misery. They seem to think that it boosts their own courage.

"An artillery fire like ours was great fun for the gunners, but it was not much fun for Fritz or for us in the trenches. We got under cover almost as much as Frits and held thumbs for the gunners to get through in a harry. Then the fire died down and it was so quiet it made you jump.

We thought our passepet was busted up a good deal, but when we looked through the periscope we saw what had happened to Fritz' tresses and. believe me, they were practically ruined.

Out in No Man's Land it looked like Woolworth's five-and-tan; everywhere were gray uniforms, with timeups and accouterments that belonged to the Germans before our artillery and machine guns got to them. Our stretcher bearers were busy,

carrying the wounded back to first aid dressing station, for, of course, we had suffered too. From there the blosses were shipped to the clearing station. The dead lay in the trenches all day and at night they were carried out by working parties to "Still park," as





## The McCulloch County Shallow Field

The first of the new shallow wells was begun early in September, 1918, on Survey No. 1105, drilling with an ordinary water well rig. Oil sands were reached at 211 feet and, after being shot, the well tested out around a 25-30 barrel producer—the oil testing 42.5 gravity—the same high grade as is had at Ranger at 3200 odd feet. The well proved such a splendid investment, that five additional wells were immediately contracted on the same tract. Three of the five struck oil sands at the same depth as Well No. 1, but have not equaled the production of No. 1 because they were not shot. Well No. 5 passed through dry sand at the 211 ft. level, but at 224 feet, struck a new oil sand, harder and darker than the regular Lonn sand, and, when shot, No. 5 developed around 35-40 barrel production. Well No. 6 has just been drilled into the oil sand, and is ready to be tested out.


Two months after the first shallow well was begun, the Prairie Oil & Gas Company struck the same sand at 380 feet in their deep test on Survey No. 89, two miles northwest of the original shallow field, the sand being estimated as good for a 40-barrel daily production. As the Prairie Oil & Gas Company is drilling on the Salt Gap-Ranger anticline, the picking up of the Lohn sands in this deep test makes all the northern and western part of McCulloch county look good for a shallow field.

Geologists state that with the picking up of the Lohn sands at 380 feet, the Brownwood sand should be encountered at 1250 ft., the Ranger sand at 1925 ft., and the Lower Bend at between 2500 and 2600 ft.

The wonderful possibilities of the shallow oil production in McCulloch county is responsible for no less than 40 new wells having already been contracted, some of which are already drilling; others are now getting rigs on the ground, and all of which will be drilling as soon as rigs and material can be placed on the ground.

Under favorable conditions, a well may be completed in a week or ten days. The production runs from 10 to 40 barrels. The oil tests 42.5 gravity.





TOOLS ARRIVED FOR RUSSELL OIL WELL; MAY-DEVELOP AT 2300 FEET

A mandrel and other tools for prosecuting the work in the Russell oil well, arrived here Tuesday and were rushed out to the Russell ranch, and work will be resumed at once, according to employes of the Gulf Production Company, who were here Tues-

The mandrel will force its way through the crooked casing, and as soon as the casing is straightened out the drill will be sent to the 3500 foot depth as per contract. Unless there are better indications of oil when the 3500 foot mark is reached, drilling will no doubt be suspended and another well spudded in as soon as the derrick can be constructed and the ork made ready.

It is reported that the Sinclair Company is preparing to drill a short ways east of the Russell well. The Gulf Production Company have a corps of engineers and geologists on the ground making surveys now, presumably for the purpose of establishing a site for the next well.

While no definite announcemen has been made, it is believed that ar effort will be made to develop the present well at the 2300 foot depth where a pretty good showing of oil was found, if oil is not found in paying quantities by the time the drill reaches 3500 feet. The casing will be pulled to the 2300 foot mark, and the well plugged up and shot at this point.-Ballinger Daily Ledger.
