The case was continued on application of the defendant, and was set for trial on Monday of the second week of the September, 1919, term of court. Report of Grand Jury.

To Hon. J. O. Woodward, Presiding Judge District Court, McCulloch County, Texas:

We, the grand jury, impaneled for the February term of court, 1919, herewith submit the following:

We have been in session four days, have investigated every violation of law that has been reported to us, and after careful consideration of same we are glad to report that we have been unable to find sufficient evidence to warrant the finding of but a single indictment, that a felony. The morale of our county surely was never better. We believe all our officers, both city and county, are doing all that's in their power to suppress crime of every kind.

We have carefully looked over the county property. The jail is well kept, but find that repairs need to be made on water connections; there is also a leak in the roof that needs attention.

The court house is as clean and well kept as a faithful janitor can make it.
