# MCCULLOCH'S BUMPER HARVEST--75,000 ACRES SMALL GRAIN

## LUCKY STONE OIL CO. SPUDS IN ON SURV. 1059 WED.

The Lucky Stone Oil & Gas Co. of McKinney, Texas, Wednesday spudded in on Survey 1059 (Beckham tract) 1 mile east of Lohn for a 500-ft. shallow well.

The Lohn Oil & Gas Co. of Alvarado which has been waiting on a 10-inch bit, also resumed drilling yesterday on Survey 595.

Drilling is progressing steadily at the Douglas Oil Co. well on Survey 1134, and is now at a depth of about 1600 feet.

An unexpected delay has caused resumption at King well No. 1 on Survey No. 401 to be postponed until Monday.

Smith & Jergins are still rigging up, and expect to be ready to spud in on Survey No. 42 within a few days.

With the exception of one string, all the tools have been recovered from the hole at the Texas Oil & Refining Co. well on J. H. Gibson Survey No. 1, and the drillers are hopeful of having this last obstruction out at once.

Moore Bros. have completed rigging up on Survey 495 and expect to spud in within the next few days.

The setting of 6 1/4 inch casing at the J. E. Morgan well, State School Survey No. 2, has been successfully completed to the depth of the hole, the casing being set in cement. Drilling operations will proceed as soon as the cement sets.

The C. E. Thomas well at Salt Gap Survey No. 1351, has experienced some little delay, but expects to be drilling again within a day or two. At Whiteland, Survey 1237, the Thomas crew has succeeded in getting hold of the lost bottom joint with a spear and is stripping it out.

The Texas Eastern well on Survey 302 is making slow but steady progress at around 1200 feet, with the hole standing about 1100 ft. in water.

Among the visitors here this week have been J. B. Felz of Gainesville, who has been looking after acreage and interests of Gainesville parties, and W. O. Bucy of Greenville, whose company, the Park-Winner, expects shortly to begin operations in the shallow field.

## RUSSELL WELL GOES OVER THE DERRICK SHOOTING BY HEADS

Ballinger, Texas, May 27.—Shooting by heads the Russell oil well fifteen miles east of here went over the derrick several times Saturday and Sunday, when the drillers shifted the casing in work preparatory to shooting the well.

This well has gushed several times every time the casing has been removed or shifted since the bit reached a depth of 2,390 feet. After drilling to 3,500 feet the casing was pulled to the 2,390-foot depth and arrangements have been under way to shoot the well for several weeks. The intermittent gushing has again attracted the scouts and several arrived here today to watch developments. No date has been fixed for shooting the well.

## CAMP SAN SABA CITIZEN FINDS THAT SHEEP RAISING IS PROFITABLE INDUSTRY

F. W. Otte was in town Wednesday bringing us his renewal subscription and a mess of the tenderest beans that ever grew for good measure. In addition he gave us an invitation to visit his place near Camp San Saba and see what else grows there—and we expect to take advantage of the invitation first opportunity. Mr. Otte is greatly interested in sheep, and finds the industry not only a pleasant occupation, but a profitable undertaking as well. Mr. Otte has some of the best Delanes in the county, which he has crossed with Rambouillets, resulting in some of the finest stock imaginable. Lambs of this breed, a year past old, sheared 12 to 15 pounds and Mr. Otte says the wool this year is as fine as he ever saw. His increase has been better than 100%, for with 23 ewes he has raised 27 lambs. Out of the flock he has lost but one, which was probably carried off by a varmit. At that he says his increase does not quite equal that of a Mason county ranchman who boasts of having a flock of 18 ewes and 36 lambs.

## SIMPLE BUT SURE METHOD OF KILLING OUT THE WORMS

G. E. Coburn, one of the leading citizens of the Pear Valley community, offers the following simple remedy for eliminating the cut worms and other pests that are now destroying the young cotton. Mr. Coburn says he has given the remedy a fair trial and finds it most effective.

The plan is to use a half tea cup of coal oil with each planter box of cotton seed. The worms, and all pests in general refuse to touch coal oil, or even come near it, and the seed thus south side of the square for 10 these pests.

In addition to keeping the worms from eating the cotton, the coal oil also prevents the larvae from hatching, thereby also destroying what might later become an additional menace to the crop.

The remedy is simple and is worth a trial by those who have not yet planted cotton, or who are having to replant.

A message was received here Wednesday from parties at Garden City stating that Quinn Walker was quite seriously injured on his ranch near that place, and requesting that a doctor be brought there at once. ## SUFFRAGE LOSS CONTINUES AND DEFEAT LIKELY

Returns continue to run unfavorably for the suffrage amendment. The majority against it in 201 counties is 6,210, and the forty-seven counties to be heard from seem to promise little help, judged by the votes of adjoining counties which have reported.

The totals from 201 counties are: For suffrage 95,174; against 101,384. For prohibition 102,480; against 89,779.

For salary 80,021; against 110,560. For home ownership 100,179; against 89,934. Complete returns from McCulloch county are as follows:

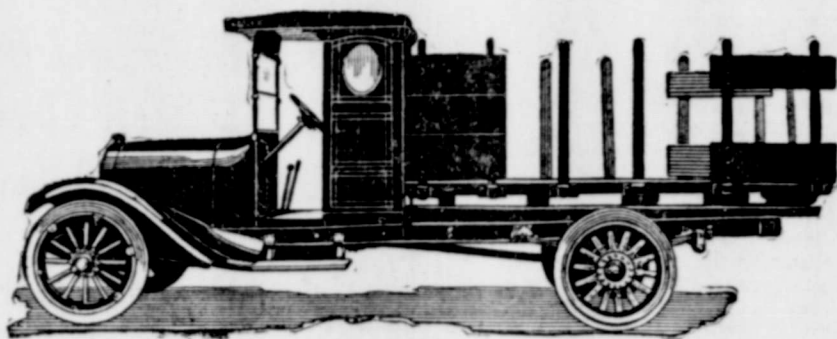

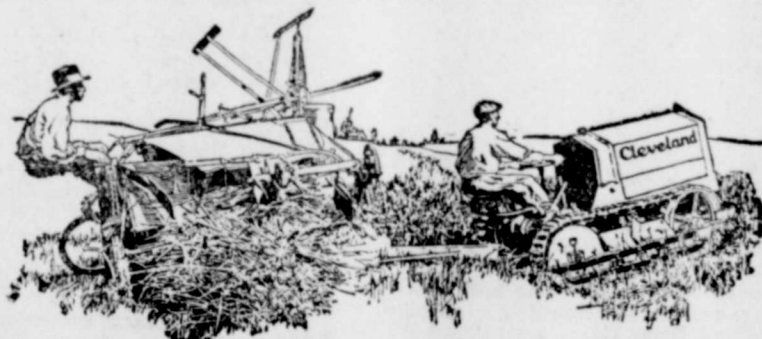

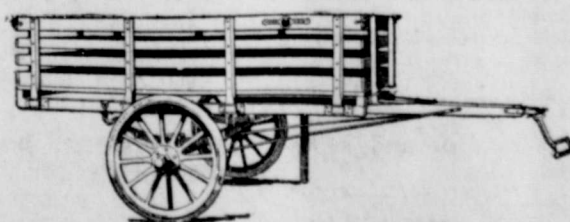

**FATHER OF JACK TAIT  
MADE FIRST SUCCESSFUL  
TEST OF THE AIRBRAKE**

Jack Tait, field superintendent for C. S. Thomas, is the possessor of an interesting clipping from the Steubenville Ohio, Herald-Star, recounting the fact that Jack's father, now deceased, was the engineer on whose train the first practical test of Westinghouse's new invention, the air-brake, was first made, and of the thrilling incident that proved its worth beyond a question of doubt. The paper mentioned the fact in commenting upon a romance story published in the New York Tribune upon the occasion of the fiftieth anniversary of the Westinghouse air-brake.

The article in the New York Tribune was as follows:

The New York Sunday Tribune has fiftieth anniversary romance story about the Westinghouse air brake and the local interest is about the part of the late Dan P. Tait, of Steubenville took in it. It says:

"Commodore Vanderbilt and many other railroad magnates were approached in vain. All regarded the air-brake idea as too visionary to be worth a trial. Finally young Westinghouse managed to persuade the Parhandle Railroad authorities at Pittsburgh to place a trial train at his disposal, he to equip it at his own expense and to guarantee to make good any damage. And the last money he owned, a \$50 bill, he handed to the engineer, Daniel Tait, just as the train, with a number of railroad officials, aboard, pulled out of the station. Three minutes later a most fortunate accident occurred. About half a mile from the station was a grade crossing unprotected by gates. As luck would have it, a teamster with heavily loaded wagon was crossing the track at this point just as the first train ever equipped with an air-brake came rushing down upon him at thirty miles an hour. There was no time to pull back, and the teamster in fright belabored the

horses with his whip. The horses plunged and reared and the wagon, its wheels catching the rails, fell over with the driver underneath. Tait grabbed the air-brake valve and gave it a twist. With a grind and a shriek the brake shoes gripped the car wheels and the train stopped a few feet from the terrified driver, who had given himself up for lost. Some of the passengers had been thrown from their seats by the sudden stop, but they forgot their bruises in their delight at the saving of a human life and the dramatic demonstration of the effectiveness of the air-brake. It was suggested that the train return to the station, since further proof was unnecessary, but the majority voted to continue on to Steubenville, and during the round trip the wonderful possibilities of the air-brake were fully shown."
