A trip through the famous cataomps, or underground quarries of Paris, is described by Rupert W. Gillett, Fort Worth soldier, in a letter

Gillett gives an interesting description of the catacombs. The old quarries were first turned into catacombs ong ago when the Paris business district overflowed into old cemeteries, and, on unearthing the skeletons of the dead, the thousands of unclaimed

bodies were put into the quarries. Gillett took the trip through the place with a number of comrades. He says that the arm and leg bones were stacked like cordwood along the corridors of the catacombs, while the grinning skulls festooned the walls in varied designs.

PROCLAMATION By the Governor of Texas

The Government of the United States is endeavoring to disseminate principles of Thrift among the people of this nation, that they may learn to avoid waste, save wisely, spend wisely and invest their saving safely and judiciously.

The Government is offering the people of the United States the opportunity of making safe and judicious investments through the medium of Thrift Stamps and War Savings Stamps, that they may have money invested for any future emergencies or opportunities which may arise.

It has been decided to designate the eight days from June 29th to July 6th, A. D. 1919, inclusive, as-

"THRIFT MESSAGE WEEK"

in the Eleventh Federal District, during which time Thrift Messages will be delivered and the benefits accruing from a life of Thrift pointed out;

The entire State of Texas is within the boundary lines of the Eleventh Federal District;

THEREFORE, I, W. P. Hobby, Governor of the State of Texas, do hereby officially proclaim the eight days from June 29th to July 6th, A. D. 1919, both inclusive, as Thrift Message Week, and do call upon the citizens of the State of Texas to join in its observance.



"BATTLE BALL," NEW GAME, MAKES HIT

Two Hundred and Fifty Men on a Side-Invented by Army "Y" Man.

Military officials at the head of the Camp Travis athletic council, Camp Travis, Tex., are much interested in a new game of mass athletics which is the invention of Lu Ringsmuth, an Army Y. M. C. A. secretary. The game combines much of the science of rugby football, soccer ball, volley ball and basket ball, and games have been played at Camp Travis with as many as 300 men on a side.

Using five ordinary footballs and an ordinary football field, with goal posts at the ends, the game brings into play a "skirmish" line and a "defense" line of players. The balls are placed on a line at the center of the field. and at a given signal the "skirmishers" race up to be the first to kick the ball. It is then kept in play by kicking, throwing as in forward pass in football or passing in basket ballthe aim of each side being to get all five balls through the opponent's goal posts or over the goal line. To get the ball through the goal posts means a score of four, but to get it over the




