## STREAM OF GOLD FLOWING IN AS GOLDEN GRAIN SHIPS OUT

### BROKE JAIL IN BRADY SEPT., '16 —HELD IN DALLAS

Draper Stephens, a young man who broke jail at Brady on the 12th of September, 1916, has finally been captured through the efforts of Sheriff J. C. Wall. A message from Dallas received by Mr. Wall Monday, announced that Stephens was being held in jail there for him.

The message was received from J. C. Gunning, captain of detectives at Dallas, and reads as follows:

"Draper Stephens in jail here—charged with bad checks. Our information he broke jail four city two years ago. Advise."

Sheriff Wall immediately notified the Dallas detective to turn the prisoner over to the prison agent, as Stevens was under two-year sentence from this county.

Stephens gave a check forged on A. W. Jones to J. C. Cadenhead, who was conducting a restaurant in Brady in 1916. He was convicted of the forgery and given a two-year sentence in the penitentiary. On September 12th, 1916, while awaiting arrival of the penitentiary transfer agent, he broke jail by picking the locks, and made good his escape.

### FIRE PARTIALLY DESTROYS BROAD BROS.' BARN SAT.

The barn on the farm of Messrs. Edd and Howard Broad, located five miles northwest of Brady on the Coleman road, was partially destroyed by fire shortly after dinner Saturday, the fire originating presumably from cigarettes or matches dropped among the bedding of the thresher crew camped at the barn. The flames were fought by the thresher crew, who used water from a windmill tank and also from the thresher engine tank, together with axes and hatches, so effectively that the fire was quickly extinguished.

The barn contained a quantity of hay and implements, which sustained some damage. Howard Broad estimates the loss at about \$200, covered fully by insurance.

The telephone report of the fire was the cause of false alarm being sent in to the Brady fire department, as it was thought the barn at Howard Broad's residence was the one on fire. The fire department responded to the alarm, but had their run for nothing.

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**HOME DEMONSTRATION DEPARTMENT**

It is a patriotic duty of the American woman to conserve food as much as possible. For although the war is over, hungry people remain to be fed. We must not forget the starving people in Europe are looking to America for food.

We have been given abundant crops and gardens and if all the surplus products are saved for winter use a great deal of food can be sent across the waters.

Small quantities of food can be combined and made into appetizing dishes. The following recipe is an excellent one for this purpose and it is easily prepared:

- Dixie Relish.**  
1 qt. of chopped cabbage.  
1 pt. of chopped white onion.  
1 pt. of chopped sweet red pepper.  
1 pt. of chopped sweet green pepper.  
4 tablespoonfuls of salt.  
4 tablespoonfuls of mustard seed.  
2 tablespoonfuls of celery seed.  
3-4 cupfuls of sugar.  
1 qt. of cider vinegar.

The two kinds of pepper are used to give color to the product. Soak the pepper in brine (1 cupful of salt to 1 gallon of water) for 24 hours; wash in clear, cold water for one or two hours. Drain well, remove seeds and coarse white sections. Chop separately and measure the chopped cabbage, peppers, and onions before mixing. Add spices, sugar and vinegar. Let stand over night covered in a crock or enameled vessel. Pack in sterilized jars. When ready to pack, drain the vinegar off the relish in order that the jar may be well packed. Pack the relish in the jars, pressing it carefully; then pour over it the vinegar which was drained off. Paddle the jar thoroughly to get every bubble out and allow the vinegar to displace all air spaces. Can and cook in boiling water for 15 minutes.

Another recipe which many of you may wish to use now is for:

- Preserved Watermelon Rind.**  
1 lb. of melon rind.  
1 lb. of sugar.  
1 lemon.  
1 oz. of lime.  
2 qt. of water.

Cut the rind into small pieces, remove peel and all pink part, and weigh. Soak over night in lime water (1 oz. of lime to 2 qt. of water). The following morning allow the rind to stand for 2 hours in clear water. Drain well, then drop into boiling water and boil rapidly for 10 minutes. Drain again and add gradually to the syrup (made by boiling together 2 cupfuls sugar to 1 qt. of water). Add to this the juice of 1-2 lemons and slices of lemon. Cook until the melon is tender and transparent. Allow to stand covered with the syrup until cold, and pack into the jars. Cover with the syrup after it has been boiled down. Put lid on loosely and heat in boiling water for 15 minutes. Then they are ready to put away for use.

Russell, Holmes & Callan on Martin ranch are having trouble with hole caving at 650 ft.

Leonard Petroleum Co. on Waring ranch, tools in the hole and casing collapsed above making a hard fishing job.

Devenish, Thomas & Ludlow on the James Russell and Russell and Westbrook ranches are drilling a water well to supply their needs, saving piping water 3-4 of a mile. This will give them water at the boiler and derrick.

Cochran and Stuart on Brandenberg ranch have spudded in.

Quaker Oil Co. on Bevans, Clark and Volkman ranches are getting ready to spud in.

Home Oil Co. on W. W. Russell ranch is a derrick.

Devenish, Thomas & Ludlow on Mears, Murchison, Bevans and Spiller ranches is a derrick.

Texas Development Syndicate on Ira, Bud and Louis Ellis ranches is a derrick.

### GOLDEN HARVEST BEGINS TO FLOW WITH SHIPMENTS

With the beginning of the movement of McCulloch county grain to market the past week, our great harvest of golden grain is being turned into a harvest of real gold. While the shipping of the grain has only begun, G. M. Bennett, local railway agent, reports ten cars of oats and seven cars of wheat having already been shipped, each of the shipments averaging 1,000 bushels to the car, and the cars averaging 32,000 pounds for the oats and 35,000 pounds for the wheat.

J. U. Silvers, who has charge of the public scales at the Mayhew Produce Co. reports 325 truck and wagon loads of grain as having been weighed by him the past week, the loads having a minimum of 1500 pounds and a maximum of 6,000 pounds. The great majority of the loads ran between 3,000 and 5,000 pounds.

### SMITH & JERGENS WELL DRILLING AFTER SETTING CASING AT 505 FT.

J. W. Waymire, who is superintending operations on the Smith & Jergens well, Survey No. 42, was in Brady Monday and reported having set the 15 1-2 inch casing and drilling being resumed at 505 feet.

Walter Bevil reports the best showing of oil and gas yet had in the well of the Lohn Oil & Gas Co. of Alvarado on Survey 595. This showing was had at 241 ft.

M. B. Jensen, who is drilling a well for R. C. Newton, et al, on Survey 106, reports having drilled through 60 feet of very hard lime rock, and is now in black shale at 520 ft.

### DOLLARS AND DYNAMITE USED BY UNION OIL CO. TO WIN BACK OIL WELL

Considerable interest has been aroused among the local oil fraternity by the announcement of the proposed shooting of a well in the Orcutt district of California, more especially since the well that it is proposed to shoot is one of a number drilled by Jack Tait of this city. The article following is reprinted from a California paper:

"Dollars and dynamite are the combination upon which the Union Oil Company expects to win back a production from an oil well in the Orcutt district, which has gone astray. The largest charge of dynamite ever placed in an oil well in California will be set off this week when Ford Alexander, expert "shooter," and a corps of Taft oil workers drop 1000 pounds of 100 per cent glycerine into the hole of the No. 7 well on the Hartwell lease at Orcutt.

"The well is one which has been a good producer, but because of hardening sands has fallen off to almost nothing, due to the fact that the oil cannot reach the perforations in the pipe. Experts are quite sure that the proposed shot will loosen the formation and allow the oil to seep through the perforations, thus bringing the product within reaching distance of the pumps.

"This work is watched with interest by operators all over California because, if successful a number of companies will try the plan out in wells which have dropped off in production due to similar causes. A few years ago Ford Alexander set off an 800-pound charge in a well in the Montebello field. The dynamite at that time was of a lesser degree of glycerine, but the action proved a success."

## THE TEACHING OF GERMAN.

The action of the lower House of the Texas Legislature in refusing, by a two to one vote, to accept the amendment of the Senate eliminating the appropriations for the teaching of the German language in the State institutions of higher education is, of course, an exhibition of ordinary good sense. The idea of abolishing the teaching of a modern language like German from the curriculum of an institution of learning simply because it is the language of an enemy country, is one that did not occur to the French during nearly five years of occupation of their own soil by that enemy. And has anyone heard of the leading German universities abolishing the study of the French and English languages?

Gentlemen who make such proposals confuse two things. One of the greatest needs in this country in connection with the Americanization of foreign-born citizens is that they be required to learn our language. For this reason all elementary courses of whatever character in the public schools should be taught in the English language. The trouble is that we have been making concessions to foreign-born communities. At the time we entered the war it was discovered by many that we had a number of public schools in Texas where children born in this country were taught everything, even such studies as arithmetic and geography—in the German language. Such children were brought up in German-speaking homes in communities in which the bulk of the population is of German descent. The first language they learned to speak, and frequently the only language, was German. It was argued that they ought not to be put to the trouble to learn English when they became of school age, and the result was that in some schools English was merely an incidental study. This is the kind of thing that should not be permitted. Children educated at the public expense no matter what language they speak at home, should be educated as Americans.

But that does not mean that American college students should discontinue the study of German and that ultimately the American people should become a people totally ignorant of the German language. Such a proposal as that is silly. The House, therefore, showed its good sense in restoring the appropriations, which are comparatively small, for the teaching of German in the University, Agricultural

and Mechanical College and other State institutions.—Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

## HONORS OF WAR.

In a riot in Brest, France, Sunday a large number of American soldiers and sailors were wounded, some of them seriously, by French sailors who resented the act of an American in tearing down a French flag and trampling upon it. There is no disputing the fact that Americans, especially the soldiers and sailors, thought far better of the French people before the war than they now think of them, and this is due to no fault of the Americans but to the ingratitude of the French and their disgusting insolence. Talk to any of the Americans who saw service in France and they will tell you their opinion of the French in forceful language.—Goldthwaite Eagle.

Yes, everything is going to the extreme; the returning soldiers tell us that the French are so lazy and filthy that they kept their pigs in the basement of their homes which had never been cleaned until our doughboys made their entrance in that sunny land and the officials demanded that they "clean up" for the boys. Then when they arrived in Germany they found that those fool women scrubbed the streets every day and the sidewalks twice a day, and swept the highway clear across the Rhine when the American boys were coming and when they got there the houses were so clean that they were not allowed to smoke inside, but had to go to the barn. If they ever get the bone-dry motto over there, there will be something doing.—San Saba Star.

Before the armistice was signed, any paper which would have published an item like either of the above, would have been thought guilty of being a German propagandist. Nevertheless, it appears a lamentable fact, since numbers of papers have published similar accounts, as related by returning soldiers, and several of our boys have told us the same thing. One returning soldier remarked that there was but one thing for which he would have stayed overseas, and that was to have the U. S. soldiers in battle against the French. This is a peculiar state of affairs, especially since there is no question but what the U. S. saved the allies from ignominious defeat.
