





Co-operative Marketing Farm Products. By D. H. Henderson.

Voca, Texas, July 21. Editor Brady Standard:

In this article I want to give the readers of The Brady Standard some of my conclusions after many years experience as a farmer:

I have been a farmer for thirty years or more-in fact, I have worked on a farm all my life. I am no howler, never was, and do not want to be looked upon as one now. However, I have observed during these years that the farmers are the worst treated of any class of people on earth. And too, the farmer is the bone and spine, so to speak, of the whole civilized world. Let the farmers fail and the wheels of progress fail to revolve.

I said the farmers were the worst treated of any class of people. Why? I will try to show you: the merchant buys his goods and they are his. They belong to him. What does he do? He prices them at a profit, above cost. The manufacturer prices his product at a profit above cost; no one steps in to price their goods. The doctors price their work; the lawyers price their work-no one to step in and price it for them.

The farmers-they work, they toil, they produce the foods and material to feed and clothe the peoples of the world. Now, they make this stuff. It belongs to them; have they not a right to price it at a profit above cost? Sure they have. Do they do it? No Well, who does? The other fellow O, I see! Why is this?

As I see it, it is for the lack of appreciation in marketing upon the part of the man who produces. Is there a


