SWCD To Elect New Zone Director

An election of a soil and water conservation district director to serve in zone three on the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District is scheduled for October 1, 1991 at the Friona State Bank, announced McFarland C. Osborn, chairman of the board. The election will be held at 10 a.m.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district director election, a person must own agricultural land within the district where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county, all or any part of which is in the district and the voter must be 18 years of age.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district director must own land in the zone he represents, be 18 years of age and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live in a county, all or part of which is in the district. Soil and water conservation district directors serve four year terms of office.



Highland Park Upends BHS

A stingy defense by the visitors, coupled with a potent passing attack, spelled doom for the Bovina High School Mustangs in their bid for season win number three last Friday at Mustang Field, as the Highland Park Hornets prevailed, 20-

The class AA Hornets were intent upon getting into the win column for the first time in the 1991 season, after having suffered defeats in their first two games at the hands of two potent football teams, Happy and Sunray.

Highland Park quarterback Joe McGill threw for two firstquarter touchdowns, and they proved to be as much offense as their charged-up defense would need, as the Hornets held Bovina's ground game to minus six yards for the evening.

McGill connected on an 11-yard scoring strike to Cedric Wells to open the scoring and give the visitors a 6-0 lead in the first quarter. Highland Park's PAT kick failed following that touchdown.

Later in the same period, Jason Cox hauled in a seven-yard touchdown pass from McGill, who then passed to Wells for a two-pointer and Highland Park had a 14-0 lead. Bovina never could sustain a drive, and that turned out to be the halftime score.

In the third quarter, the Mustangs finally had a drive that paid off, as Kory Mitchell and Hector Guevara teamed up on a 35-yard scoring play. Mitchell was the passer and Guevara was the receiver, as the fullback pass combination worked for a score for the second consecutive week. Angel Porras' kick made the score 14-7, and got the Mustangs back in the ball game.

However, that proved to be the high point of Bovina's offense for the evening, and Highland Park salted away the win with another touchdown in the fourth quarter. Matt Johnson completed the scoring drive for the Hornets with a one-yard plunge. The kick again failed, but the Amarillo team had extended its lead to 20-7, and that turned out to be the final score.

"We gave them two touchdowns right off the bat, but held them after that and played to our ability, but we had dug too deep a hole to recover," said Mustang Coach Rock Stanley, who had said prior to the game that it would be a dog-fight.

Pacing Bovina on defense was defensive back Corey Kirkpatrick, who had ten unassisted and two assisted tackles. Stanley said that three of Kirkpatrick's tackles were of the touchdown-saving variety, and one was of the "crunch" variety.

The loss left the Mustangs with a 2-1 season record, heading into their final non-district game at Plains on Friday. Highland Park improved its season ledger to 1-2.
