



One of the most interesting inform-l talks heard by Brady cit zens was iven by Miss Ida Taylor, returned ssionary to China, at the Baptist urch on last Saturday afternoon The occasion was a reception given for Miss Taylor by the ledies of the Baptist church. A large number availed themselves of the opportunity meet Miss Taylor and to her from er own lips the story of the progress ade by the Christian missionaries in china. Miss Taylor has spent four-een years in the work, her last visit o the U. S., and to her parents, the ev. and Mrs. J. H. Taylor, having

Miss Taylor has been located in Feng, Chowfu, China, in the northrn part of the nation and near the oast at Manchuria. There are two nissions in the place, one conducted by the Baptists and the other by the Presbyterians, each of whom number about five workers. In the course of ner work, Miss Taylor walks about ten miles a day, and averages talking seven hours a day. In the course of a year, she is at home about thirty days in all; the balance of the time she is engaged in carrying on her missionary work in the interior, sleeping on the stone beds of the native and resting her head upon their wood-en pillows. Miss Taylor's talk chiefly concernd the manners and customs of the hinese, and during the two hours on nore she spoke, the ladies attending ere held enrapt. 



The Chinese women have their feet bound, and the bandages are never removed fro mthe time of binding until death. Those who adopt the Christian religion, unbind their feet, and they eventually become normal The Chinese street shoe is again. made of hemp, closely woven and rasembling in texture a panama hat. These may be padded, and for wet weather a wooden block is fastened to them. They are very serviceable A comb, long-stemed tobacco pipe, padded stocking, child's cap tingling bells, back scratcher, dolls and toys were some of the other articles exhibited, all of which were iewed with interest.
