A period of five years will be provided for the final payment of these subscriptions but for the campaign to succeed, the sum of \$75,000,000 must be subscribed within the eight days. Many have expressed the belief that the subscrip-

tions will run to \$100,000.000. At a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention the \$75,000,000 to be raised was apportioned among the general inter


The interior of the Meers' home, with its Hallowe'en decoration, was as spooky looking as the white-robed ghosts who entered silently. Everywhere could be seen the fiery eyes of the black cat or eerie-looking witches riding away on broom sticks.

The guests were led, one at a time, into a darkened room where they were met by a huge white horse, with blood red eyes and nostrils, and conducted the witch's tent where a real gypsy told their fortune. They were then invited into a room and told to help themselves to hanging apples and apples floating on the surface in tubs of water, but they must use only their teeth.

Each of the guests was then given a spoon and told to fish his doom, which was written on a slip of paper, out of the witch's boiling pot. Many of these horrible dooms caused the guests to grow cold and turn pale with terror.

A number of old Hallowe'en games were then played, causing much merriment and laughter; after which the guests were invited into the dining room, where they were met by the fiery glares of the jack-o'-lanterns,





they were too small for men to risk their lives and time for. So Uncle Sam has stepped in assigning men from the Bureau of Biological Survey, Department of Agriculture, to Texas and New Mexico.

The rifle in the hands of the experenced hunter has been pronounced the only wild animal exterminator and the patrol or ranger system the only assurance of success in this work. Losses to Texas cattlemen at the hands of these wild animals have amounted to a tremendous figure. For instance, a lobo or gray wolf will destroy \$1,000 worth of stock in a year, according to figures prepared by the United States government. A panther, by the same authority, does \$500 worth of damage, while a bob-cat will inflict \$50 loss in twelve months. A coyote will do \$50 damage also. However, some Texas stock-men declare this table of losses per mimal is far too conservative.

Thirty-five hunters are now on Landon's staff. Their results are at-tested by the following: Mountain ons killed last year, 6; lobo wolves, 51; timber wolves, 610; coyotes, 6102; b-cats, 1,113.

Besides these the hunters captured many red wolves, stock killing dogs, ring-tails, skunks and badgers.

The expense of the hunters is apportioned among the stockmen, the state and federal agencies. But much of the expense money is returned in the shape of valuable skins and hides. Each skin taken by the hunter is sold and the proceeds used in paying his The lobo salary and living expenses. The lobo wolf is the chief enemy to the Texas stockman now because of his size and because of his tendency to travel n packs. Frequently though, these big wolves hunt alone.

As an evidence of the ferocity of these animals, Director Landon has een informed that one stockman near Ozona lost 250 calves recently at the nand's of the lobos.




