Bennett is part of the re-organization followed by a separation of the Santa plans of the Santa Fe, following the Fe's and Frisco's now joint interests, return of the railroads to private ownership on March 1st. Mr. Bennett came from Galveston to Brady over eight years ago, on November 3, 1911, to be exact, in the capacity of Santa Fe agent. Since the taking over of the railroads by the government during the war, and the consequent merger of the local Santa Fe and Frisco offices, he has acted as joint local agent for these two systems. Mr. Bennett has been in railway service for the past quarter centurn, starting as agent, then was with the traffic department for a period, then back to the agency, and now again in departmental work.
