About the greatest community promotion we know about --- bar none --- is Bovina's Religious Emphasis Day.

The promotion encourages church attendance on a certain Sunday, that's all. In this case, it's March 7.

Representatives of all community organizations participate, young and old alike. The cost is not great, less than most any project you can imagine and the idea has the support of all members of the community.

And it's hard to find a project which offers all those advantages.

Probably the best advantage is having the support of everyone.

That terminology might be stretching the point just a tad, but there is no real opposition. Even those people who don't plan to participate in the project don't knock it. They seem to think it's a good thing for everyone else even if they don't plan to be concerned themselves.

Last year's promotion, which had a goal of 1000 in attendance at Bovina churches on that particular Sunday, was highly successful and the backers of it were pleased at the results of the work they did. The goal was exceeded, of course.

At that time, we didn't know if Religious Emphasis Day would become an annual event or not, but it has been scheduled again for this year and the attendance goal has been raised 100 to 1100. We wondered why that figure wasn't 1101 or 1171, since this was '71, but we didn't ask.

In our line of work, we've seen our share of small town community projects and the RE Day here gets our vote for being the best we've ever known about.

We recommend it to any community which is interested in having a project involving most of its citizens with a minimum of expense and disagreement.

It's a good thing.

The weekend snowstorm or blizzard was almost as severe as it was brief and offered only a minimum of moisture to aid in breaking the current drought, which has been in effect since Fall.

The depth of the snow on the level in the fields wasn't enough to offer sufficient moisture to break the droughty conditions, farmers tell us.

From a moisture standpoint, the snow was better than none at all, and that's about all that can be said for it.

We notice, though, that weatherman Willie Williams is pointing out that a more substantial amount of moisture is predicted in the not-too-distant future. Willie seems to think that moisture will be forthcoming long before Spring.

That's encouraging.

Evidently our Texas Tech friends have been using the snowstorm to divert conversation away from Saturday afternoon's regionally televised basketball game in Lubbock between the Texas Aggies and the Red Raiders.

At least we guess that's what they're doing because we certainly haven't heard much comment about the game.

We did call one Texas Tech friend following the game, but he said he didn't much want to talk about the game on the phone. We got the impression he'd just as soon we'd hang up if that's all we had to talk about.

Due to another commitment, we didn't get to see all of the game. However, we were able to witness the final few seconds of regulation play and then the overtime period. The overtime period might have been the best part, anyway.

Southwest Conference basketball has a reputation of being weak, comparatively. But the teams are usually well matched and the schools get a lot of sport and rivalry from playing each other. Saturday afternoon's game on TV was no exception to that rule.

Official figures for Bovina on the 1970 census have turned out to be 1428, a gain of a few over the unofficial report issued several months ago. This makes for a 38.8 per cent increase over the 1029 total of 1960.

The total population figure for the county is 10,509, according to our friend Bill Ellis of The Friona Star, who has been doing some checking with the census people in Dallas. This makes for a 9.7 per cent, countywide from '60 to '70.

# Blizzard Hits, Paralyzes Area

## Mills Critical After Accident

In a serious accident in Sunday's blizzard, Alfred Mills of Bovina, an employee of Texas State Highway Department, was struck and seriously injured by a pickup driven by Rodney Brewer of Sunray about 9:30 Sunday morning near Black on Highway 60.

Mills and Clemente G. Lopez, also employed by the highway department, were trying to free their vehicle from a drift when the pickup driven by Brewer struck Mills and pinned him momentarily between the two vehicles.

Visibility was near zero at time of the accident.

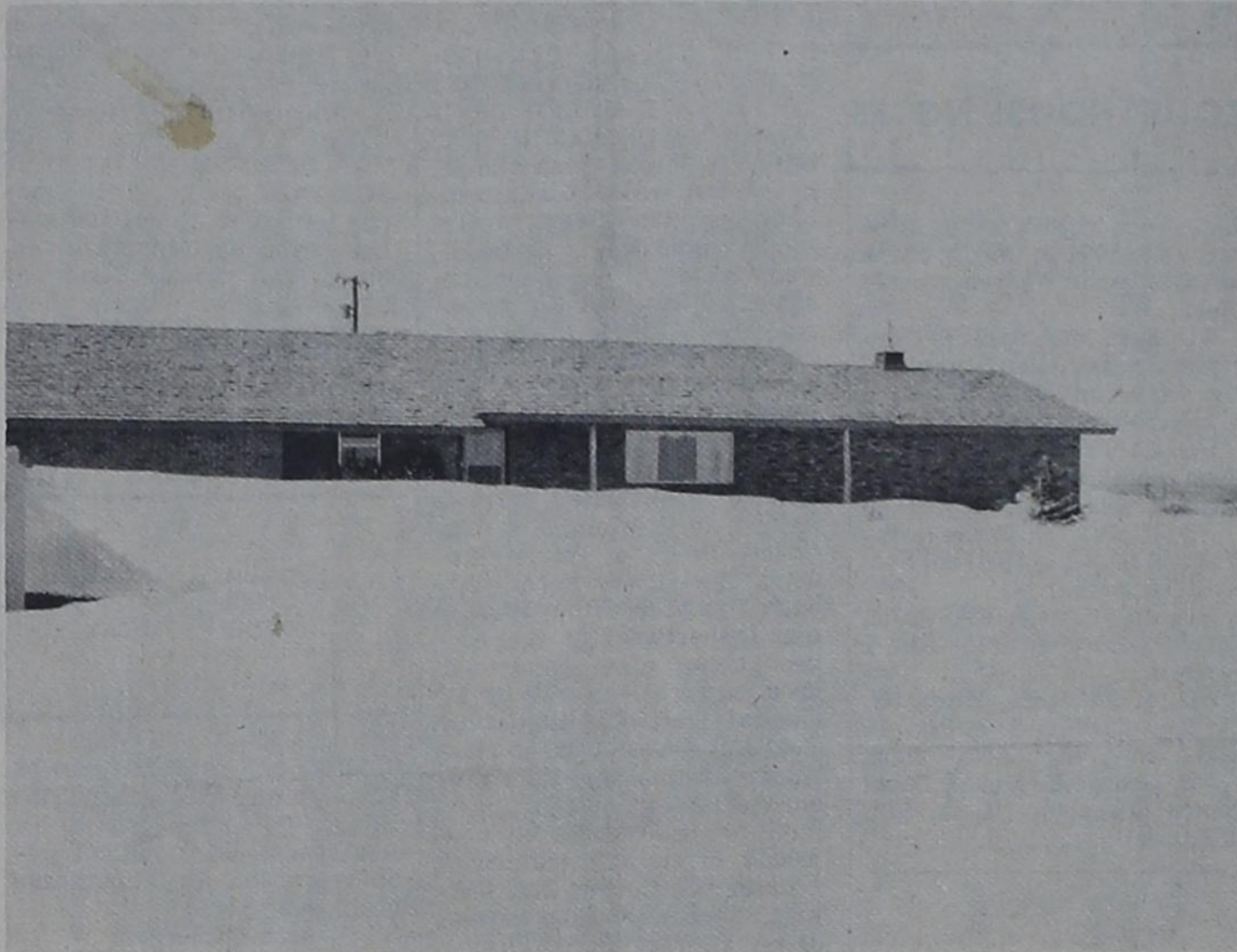
Mills and Lopez were taken by Claborn ambulance to Farmer County Community Hospital in Friona where it was

determined that Mills suffered compound fractures of both legs, severe bruises to his head and arms and internal injuries. Lopez was treated for shock and bruises and released Monday afternoon.

An attempt was made to transfer Mills to an Amarillo hospital Sunday, but roads were blocked. He was taken to Deaf Smith County Hospital in Hereford and transferred to High Plains Baptist Hospital by DPS helicopter Monday noon.

Mills is in critical condition, according to highway department officials, and will be unable to undergo surgery on his legs for at least two weeks.

Mills has been with the highway department some 20 years.

## Storm Brings Little Moisture

An area-paralyzing blizzard, consisting of blowing snow, high winds and freezing temperatures, struck here late Saturday night and continued through Sunday.

Though it was brief, with the bulk of the fierceness lasting just a little over 24 hours, this was the worst spell of severe weather of the winter.

The snow began near midnight Saturday night and continued until mid-afternoon or after Sunday.

Except for drifts, there was little accumulation of snow. Total amount of the snow was difficult to determine because of the way it was drifted by the high winds, but it was estimated at four or five inches.

Only a trace of moisture was recorded from the snow.

The blowing snow created hazardous driving conditions at best and at worst, driving was impossible. Numerous vehicles were abandoned in snow banks and some minor acci-

dents were caused by the weather.

Alfred Mills, a Bovina man employed by the state highway department, was seriously injured in an accident near Black on Highway 60 (See separate story).

Winds accompanying the blizzard were estimated to be in the 30 to 50 mile-per-hour range.

A problem created by the blizzard, which is still being worked on by livestock men, was the straying of thousands of cattle in this area. Wheat pasture cattle were reported strayed and mixed together during and after the storm. The task of locating the cattle, sorting them and getting back to the right fields began Monday and is apt to continue for the rest of the week.

This area was evidently on the west side of the blizzard which paralyzed the entire Panhandle of Texas. The storm was considered more severe here, for instance, than it was at Clovis.

After the storm let up late Sunday, it was just a question of having things thaw out and getting back to normal conditions. Temperatures warmed considerably in Monday's bright sunshine and much of the snow melted. Snow in drifts is expected to remain for several days, however.

## Schools Out Monday After Storm

Students in Bovina Schools received an unexpected holiday Monday as icy and snow-covered roads caused school to be canceled that day.

School was to have been dismissed Friday for students with a work day scheduled for teachers, according to L. F. Jacobs, school superintendent, but school will go on regular schedule Friday with Monday being considered a work day for teachers in Bovina Schools.

"This keeps us on schedule as far as school days and teacher work days, unless the weather hits us again," reports Jacobs.

Six weeks tests will be held Wednesday, Thursday and Friday and school will be dismissed at 2:30 p.m. Friday, according to Jacobs.

## Running Water Draw -- Project Needs Two Easements

The multi-million dollar Running Water Draw Watershed Project is nearing the stage where a construction date could be set, according to Parmer County Soil Conservation Service officials. With only two easements to be cleared and with the sponsoring local organizations working on these, the construction contract could be assigned as early as the 1972 fiscal year.

The three floodwater retarding structures will have annual estimated benefits of \$136,000. This is not including the aesthetic and monetary benefits they will generate as potential recreational areas.

Clovis has already begun recreational area development around the lake site in New Mexico. Lazbuddie is in the early planning stages for recreation development of the Lazbuddie lake site. The Bovina site is not well suited for recreational or agricultural use because of its small size. However, if Lazbuddie and Clovis develop their lake sites for recreation everyone in Parmer County will have water recreation facilities within easy driving distance. People in surrounding areas would also use these areas which will bring outside money into the area.

The impounded water in these lakes will not be but about eight feet above the Ogalla formation or water bearing strata.

It is expected that approximately 3,600 acre feet of additional recoverable water will enter the Ogalla formation as a result of the installation of the structures. Most of this recharge water will remain in the area and will eventually be used for irrigation or domestic purposes. Otherwise, this water is spread over the flood plain and is lost through evaporation.

These sites are destined to be a valuable asset to this area. Their value will increase as the years go by - and it's all just around the corner.

### PUBLIC NOTICE

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**  
**NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 5)**  
Special Election May 18, 1971

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-a, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amended, providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services to or on behalf of:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years;

"(2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;

"(3) Needy blind persons;

"(4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children.

"The Legislature may prescribe such other eligibility requirements for participation

in these programs as it deems appropriate.

"The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws making matching funds available to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of State funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of State funds to or on behalf of any needy person shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; provided that the total amount of State funds paid for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of the children shall not exceed Fifty-Five Million Dollars (\$55,000,000) during any fiscal year.

"Provided further, that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate federal statutes, as they now are or as they may be amended to the extent that federal matching money is not available to the State for these purposes, then and in that event the

Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons.

"Nothing in this section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 51 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer nor to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on May 18, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment removing the limitation on the total State appropriations for assistance grants for the needy aged, the needy disabled, and the needy blind, and setting a limitation on total State appropriations during any fiscal year for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children."

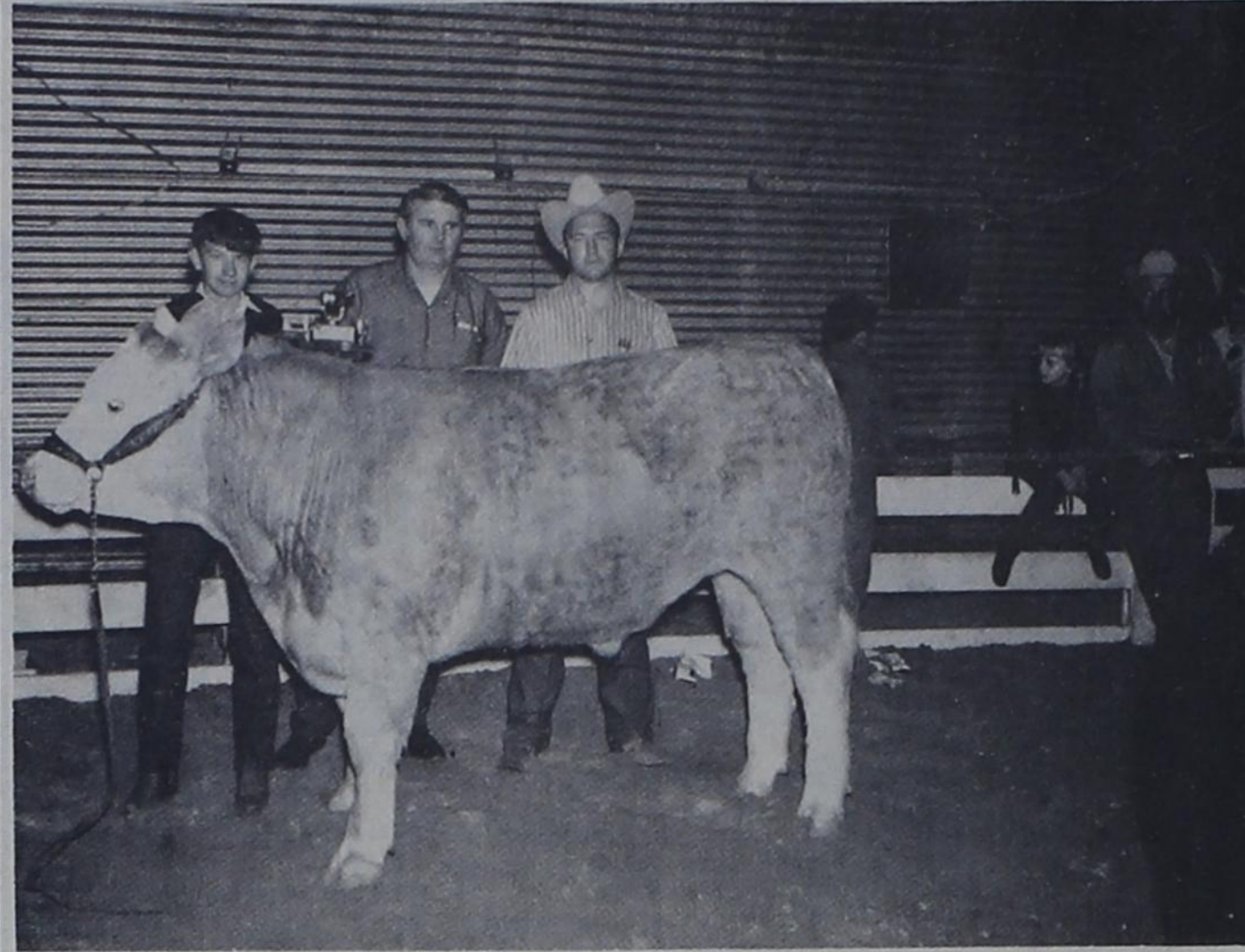
