**Death of Jess Merwin.**  
The death of Jess Merwin occurred this (Tuesday) morning at 7:00 o'clock at the home of his father-in-law, L. Ballou, deceased having fallen a victim of pneumonia resulting from a relapse with the flu. Funeral services will be held tomorrow afternoon, the Rev. John Power, assisted by the Rev. Thos. P. Grant, conducting, and interment will be made in Brady cemetery.

Mr. Merwin was born 46 years ago last September in Michigan. He had lived the greater part of his life in Texas, however, and was well known throughout the Brady country. He first came to Brady as a member of a construction crew on the Frisco, when that system extended its line from Brownwood to Brady. For the past three years he had made his home in Fort Worth, being employed in the construction department of the Santa Fe. Prior to going to Fort Worth, he had made his home in Brady for the greater part of the ten years previous.

His marriage to Miss Mary Estelle Ballou occurred in Brady fifteen years ago. His wife and his step-mother, Mrs. Emma Merwin, of Fort Worth, survive. His step-mother is expected to arrive here tomorrow morning for the funeral.

Mr. Merwin was a genial, whole-souled man, and was highly esteemed by all. He was well-informed in railroad matters and enjoyed the confidence of his employers. Early in the year he suffered a severe attack of the flu, from which he never fully recovered. Last week, while out on construction work, he was taken with a relapse. He came last Tuesday to Brady to join his wife, who was visiting her parents here, but in spite of all that loving care and medical attention could do, pneumonia developed with its fatal consequences.

Austin, April 21.—Motion for rehearing was overruled by the supreme court today in the woman's suffrage case, thereby making final decision of the majority court, sustaining constitutionality of the law allowing women to vote in party primaries.

### CHICAGO CAPITALISTS MAKE STILL FURTHER INVESTMENTS IN COUNTY

#### VISIT DAY AND OTHER OIL FIELDS IN-COUNTY AND ARE GREATLY IMPRESSED—EXPECT TO RETURN HERE ABOUT THE 15TH AND BUY MORE ACREAGE.

A party of Chicago capitalists, headed by Maurice E. Daley, well-known restaurateur of Chicago, spent Thursday and Friday of the past week in McCulloch county, visiting the Thad O. Day field, 11 miles north of Brady on the Hall-Dutton tract, where they were so greatly impressed by the Day pool that they were loud in their praises of McCulloch county and its oil development, foreseeing here the possibility of bringing in a new oil field that will take rank with the best fields in Texas. This belief was further strengthened when the party visited the new White well near Mercury and also the Cunningham & Devine locations in the northeast part of the county.

Making up the personnel of the party were Messrs. Maurice E. Daley, Frank J. O'Brien, N. J. O'Hanley, J. H. Clark and A. L. Tomm, all of Chicago. Just a month ago Mr. Daley,

McCulloch county acreage. His second visit here served to add to his enthusiasm and the deals just closed are reported to have been for a large amount of acreage and at a good figure.

After visiting and seeing Day No. 1 on the pump, the party was taken by Mr. Day to the location of White well No. 2 in the Mercury community, where they found the well standing 90 feet in oil after being cleaned out. Casing was already on the ground and testing out of the well was merely waiting upon the pump which had been shipped out from Brownwood. From the White well the party went to the Cunningham & Devine location, where they found both tests rigged up and ready to spud in.

While the party had but a limited time to spend here, they were so greatly interested in local developments that they plan to return here about the 15th of next month for further investigation and investment.

### Death of Mrs. Kellett.

The death of Mrs. Bridgett Kellett occurred Friday afternoon at 6:00 o'clock at the residence of her niece, Mrs. John R. Winstead, of Waldrip, with whom she had been making her home for a long number of years. Mr. Kellett at the time of death was nearly 80 years of age, and her demise resulted from old age and complications, following a brief illness. Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon at 3:00 o'clock, Father Hutson conducting, and interment was made in the Marion cemetery.

Mrs. Kellett was born in Ireland, coming to the United States when only 7 years of age. She was numbered among the early settlers of McCulloch county, having come here in the late 70's or early 80's. She enjoyed a wide acquaintance over this entire section, and news of her death will be learned with sorrow by all her many friends. Mr. Kellett was a good, Christian woman, and had been a life-long member of the Catholic church. Her good works and her noble influence will long be remembered and felt by those with whom she came in contact.

Attending the funeral services were her daughter, Miss Hortense Kellett of Fort Worth, and son, Henry Kellett, and wife of Novice.

### TEXAS-MEERS WELL IS DRILLING FOR 1400 FOOT SAND—FOUR GAS SHOWINGS

The Texas-Meers well is going right on down, said Jeff Meers, president of the company. Mr. Meers and son, Harl, have been here the past few days for supplies and material for their well, and expect to return to Paint Rock at once to continue supervision of operations there. According to Mr. Meers, the well has just had a quarter million ft. of gas, but in order not to delay operations, the drill, which is now at the 900 ft. level, is going right on down to the 1400 ft. sand, in which the Shultz well had a good showing of oil. Four gas flows have so far been encountered in this well, the first at 80 ft., the second at 350, the third at 736 and the fourth at 800. Each one of the gas showings developed about a quarter million cubic feet of gas.

"Just as long as folks who work for wages demand fifteen dollar silk shirts, three-dollar silk neckties and two and a half-dollar silk socks, they will get them. And while they're buying that sort of stuff you may lay your heaviest bet on their also buying the best suits of clothing the market affords."—Temple Telegram.

There is much argument pro and con the overall fad (or fashion). Staid church members argued it between Sunday school and church times—and some were as strongly for the move as others were opposed. The pro side argued that the more overalls were worn the greater the production would become, and the greater the production, the lower the price. That is a fine line of argument in ordinary times—but in these extraordinary days, high price of everything is due as much to inability to get production as it is to high price of materials. So that theory of increased production and reduced price is easily exploded.

increasingly high prices. The best is none too good, is the motto of the greater percent of citizens. This fact was clearly demonstrated in an eastern city the past week. A clothier exhibited a window full of suits and overcoats, marked to sell at \$25 each. Not a single overcoat was purchased though it is still winter time in the north, and but one sale of a \$25 suit was made.

That clothier was right. The man who used to think a \$1.25 or \$1.50 shirt was just about the nicest thing on top this earth, now would not think of wearing anything cheaper than a \$15 silk shirt. The 50c cravat of our boyhood days is relegated to the attic and the cobwebs, and the \$3.00 cravat is just good enough for every day if we have a better one for Sunday and holidays.

Fifteen-dollar silk shirts and \$3.00 cravats and \$20 low quarters are out of harmony with overalls. Will we give up the silk shirts and cravats and kid shoes for overalls and hickory shirts?
