POLITICAL RACES haven't necessarily reached the fever pitch in this area, but we nevertheless have an important election coming up Saturday in the primary.

The race which carries the most interest for folks in these parts will be the county judge's race, where Archie Tarter, the incumbent, is opposed by Paul Fortenberry.

Elsewhere on Page 2 , the Blade presents its editorial recommendation in this race. As our friend Dolph Moten often stated, these recommendations are free of any extra charge--and you can do whatever you please with this latest one.

But we sincerely hope you will consider the factors we set forth in the editorial.

Bovina, as well as the rest of the county, has a lot to gain, we believe, from the election.

Many things are changing across our county. We believe that it's time for a break from some of our traditional politics, and open the door for a new era in our county.

But regardless of how you vote, it's important that you VOTE. In the last Democratic primary, less than 40 per cent of the qualified voters in Parmer County bothered to cast their ballots. This probably would compute to less than 30 per cent of the residents of voting age.

It's hard for us to believe that less than one in three people care about the business of their county and state. Yet, the record speaks for itself.

Take those few minutes out of your schedule this Saturday. It doesn't really take that long. And it will qualify you to complain, should something not suit you in county or state politics during the next four

ABSENTEE VOTING closed on Tuesday for the Democratic primary in Parmer County, and those of us in the outlying areas from the court house are reminded that in order to vote absentee in a countywide election, quite an effort is involved.

In order to cast an absentee ballot in a county race, one must visit the county clerk's office. This necessitates a round trip of 25 miles for Bovina residents, 36 miles for those living in Lazbuddie, 50 miles for Rhea residents, 50 miles for Friona voters, 65 miles for those in the Black community, and 70 miles for those at Lakeview.

Of course, it's the same mileage when you have to go to pay taxes, report for jury duty, purchase auto tags, etc., but people are a lot less likely to drive 25 or 50 miles just to vote absentee.


We wonder if deputy absentee boxes could not be located in, say, three strategic county locations, similar to the way the tax assessor-collector makes a "road appearance" for auto tags each year.

It would help if you only were given a special day, or week, when you could vote absentee in Bovina, for instance. This would be a big service to the voters residing outside the county seat,

Primary elections for both Democrats and Republicans will be held across the state and in Parmer County Saturday.

Two items on the ballot-the race for Parmer County judge and the Pari-Mutuel wagering referendum-are expected to do more to draw out voters here than any of the other races on the ballot.

Only 10 contested races appear on the Democratic ballot with even less, two, on the GOP ballot. The wagering referendum does not appear on the Republican ballot. In the GOP Primary, the only contested spots are those of governor and lieutenant gover-

Polling places for the Democratic Primary will be the American Legion Hall on Third Street.

Opponents claim that money that should go for the family food budget, rent and clothing will be wagered on horses if the measure passes.

Quarter Horse breeders in the state are among the strongest supporters of the referendum, stating that more Quarter Horses are raised in Texas than any other state, yet all the millions of dollars wagered on races goes out of state because Texas has no pari-mutuel windows at the tracks.

The referendum is not binding on legislators-it is merely a public opinion poll that may, or may not, result in a change of the current laws.

Regardless of the outcome of the referendum, inclusion of the proposition on the Democratic Primary ballot is expected to bring out voters in greater numbers than might have otherwise been expected.

It is important that we elect a man who will attempt to get the most possible revenue for Parmer County and for its individual precincts. Tax money should be returned to the people as it is needed.


Paul Fortenberry says he will work for the best interests of ALL of Parmer County.

Having known Fortenberry for a number of years, and knowing first hand of his business experience and abilities, we do not hestitate to recommend him to the voters of this area.



# A MESSAGE TO PARMER COUNTY RESIDE

From County Judge Archie Tarter

I am running for a second full term as Parmer County Judge, having previously been elected for the unexpired term of Loyde A. Brewer, now deceased, and for one full term.

I promise nothing to each of you except honesty, integrity and proper fulfillment of the duties of this office to the best of my ability and knowledge regardless where you reside in Parmer County. This county as a whole has been, and always will be, considered in any official decision I have to make so long as I serve as your County Judge. I believe in and shall always work for a financially sound county government. I believe at this time our county is on a sound financial basis.

A few of the financial changes since I have been serving as your County Judge are as

The available county funds have been increased from \$404,764.13 to a present balance of \$584,468.81, being a total net increase of \$179,704.68.

The County Judge also serves as Ex-Officio County School Superintendent and administers the Parmer County Permanent School

The Permanent School Fund has been increased from \$576,825.60 to the present balance of \$732,109.63, being a net increase of \$161,284.03.

When I went into office as your County Judge, this county was receiving only \$19,000.00 annually from the Permanent School Fund for the schools of our county. The funds were being held on short-term bonds and I cashed the same and placed all of them into long-term Federal bonds. These bonds are increasing in value approximately \$30,000.00 each year since purchase, and should continue to increase accordingly. In addition, these funds are paying interest into the available school fund which is distributed annually to the Parmer County schools on a per-student basis. In 1974

\$30,865.28 will be distributed from this fund to our schools. Law prohibits the Permanent School Fund from being consumed, and it is regulated as to how it can be invested.

As each of you know, in the last several years State and Federal funds have been severely limited for construction of farm-tomarket roads. Most of the available funds have been spent in metropolitan areas and in areas around larger towns such as Lubbock and Amarillo. However, Parmer County has received some money for farm-to-market road construction and the County itself has spent some money for rights-of-way and easements for such construction during my tenure of office, as follows:

- [a] Farm-to-Market Road 1140, consisting of 4 miles, located East of Friona to connect U.S. Highway 60, and Farm-to-Market Road 2397 \$43,133.33 spent for rights-ofway and removal of utilities
- [b] Farm-to-Market 1172, consisting of 11 miles, connecting from State 86 to U.S. 60 NE of Lazbuddie, \$49,732.31 spent for rights-of-way and utility line removal
- [c] Farm-to-Market Road 292, consisting of 1 1 mile, connecting U.S. 60 to U.S. 70-84 NE corner of Farwell - \$6965.00 spent for rights-of-way and utility line removal
- [d] Farm-to-Market Road 214, approximately 2 miles - Removing utility lines, easements and rights-of-way for construction of a new overpass to be located immediately South of Friona, in the very near future - \$163,548.27 spent by **Parmer County**

I support expenditure of all future money received for farm-to-market road construction wherever the need is greatest in the

In addition, approximately \$42,000.00 has been spent for repairs, maintenance and up-keep to the Parmer County courthouse building, including installation of central heat and air-conditioning, District Courtroom repairs, installation of modern glass doors at the entrances, and renovation of the hall-

Parmer County is scheduled to receive \$516,000.00 Revenue Share Funds from the Federal Government. Of this amount, approximately \$220,000.00 has been received and the remainder will be received between now and the end of 1976. \$225,000.00 of this amount has been allocated for construction of new jail facilities in compliance with the Federal Court ruling of Judge Sarah Hughes. The remainder will be spent for the best benefit of Parmer County.

During the last six years I have disposed of over 680 criminal cases filed in the County Court, as well as handling many civil cases and other court proceedings. As County Judge I have carried out the duties of my office on a full-time basis to the best of my knowledge and ability. Many of you I have come in contact with one way or another while I have served as your County Judge. I would hope to meet and visit with each one of you personally before election day but know this is impossible.



Edward E. Thomas, state conservationist for SCS, said "Local conservation districts and SCS technical people are redoubling their efforts to help farmers and ranchers get new cropland acres under a conservation plan and to apply measures needed to stop excessive soil erosion. These include the newer minimum tillage techniques as well as crop rotation, striperopping, terracing and contour plowing.

"There are also some acres that should not be used for crops at all," Thomas added. "They ought to be left in grass or trees."

Thomas said environmental degradation caused by erosion and soil blowing will almost certainly arouse adverse public

"Runoff and erosion from sloping land reduces crop vields," he continued. "Soil blowing and erosion cut farm profits by reducing the benefit of fertilizers and by lowering vields. Farmers who allow soils to erode waste energy. It takes more fuel and fertilizer to produce a good crop on eroding soils than on stable soils."


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# Mother's Day Dinner Slated

A fried chicken dinner is scheduled to treat Bovina mothers Sunday, May 12, on Mother's Day.


The event is sponsored by Bovina Lions Club and will be served in the school cafeteria from 12 noon until 1:30 p.m., according to a spokesman of the organization.

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
