There seems to be some doubt in the minds of the farmers regarding the objects and aims of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation. There is one thing that especially appeals to us and that is the fact that we are in absolute control of every dollar which we pay into this organization and we urge that every farmer in McCulloch County join this organization as the farmers all over Texas, and in fact the United States are doing.
