





If there is an aerial cable "terminal box" on it, necessitating frequent climbing, it will likely have "steps" of wood and iron.

So it will stand, barring accident, faithfully serving until long exposure to the elements has sapped its strength-when a new pole must take its place.

And, for that new pole, the telephone company must pay today just about 140% more than it would have had to pay five years ago!
