Blower Recovers Waste Cement. The bags in which cement is shipped have a considerable return value. because of the character of the material entering into the manufacture.

so that all large consumers find it necessary to see that these are gathered up and returned to the sement plant.

Heretofore it has been regarded as sufficient to turn the bag upside down and shake it as a means of emptying. But recently it has been found that this method is wasteful in the extreme, and the cement is now recov-

half to two sacks of cement are recovered per 1,000 sacks cleaned. Two men can clean 2,000 sacks a day, besides sorting, counting and bundling them. The cement recovered maks a credit to the cost of handling of about \$2.50 a day.

### Sell Many Door Locks.
